NEWS OF DISTRICT LOCAL NOTES AND THINGS IN GENERAL.

The Tidings From Various Points in Eastern Ontario—What People Are Doing And What They Are Saying.

Rural free delivery of mail between Renfrew and Burnstown is shortly to go into effect. James Mahan, 77, aged seventy-one years, died at his residence, Lanark, on the 18th inst. Thomas Macfarlane, veterinary surgeon, late of Ottawa, has opened an office in Carleton Place. The fire captain of Smith's Falls has had his salary increased \$25. There were fifteen fires in that town last year. Miss Violet E. McDonald, daughter of John Macdonald, of Smith's Falls, has been appointed principal of the public school at Carleton Place. A carload of marble antique has been shipped from Clyde Forks to Toronto. It is the product of the North Lanark Marble quarry on the lot of John Sweeney, fourth concession, of Darling.

Sutherland, Carleton Place, owns a fine young Jersey cow that gave birth to twin calves last week. This is the second pair within a year. The cow is not yet five years old and has given birth to five calves. G. F. Benson, of Cardinal, had a narrow escape from drowning the other day. He was out walking on the canal just above the landing when he stepped into a hole which had been cut for draining water and had then drifted over with snow.

A cow died at Madawaska after giving birth to a calf. The animal was owned by M. Shearn, section foreman, and when she was opened there were found 2 lbs. of hay wire, 1 lb. of three-inch nails, one teaspoon and six hair pins. The Presbyterian church, Balderson, was the scene of a very fashionable wedding Thursday morning when Miss Mary Lina, youngest daughter of James W. Allan, and the Rev. James A. Stuart, B.A., Sumbury, were united in matrimony, by Rev. J. S. McMillan. On the 15th inst. occurred the funeral of Kathleen Gosson, from the home of Daniel McMillan, of Mapotick, grandfather of deceased. She was a daughter of Richard Gosson, of Kars, and was visiting her grandparents when she was taken ill with appendicitis. The township of Darling is the present retreat of a strange individual who comes from nowhere and knows not whither he is going. He wanders in the neighborhood of Carleton Place, near Tatlock. He rarely enters the house and then seems ill at ease. His appearance has a Buffalo Billian resemblance—long hair, trailing, tawny moustache and a dreamy pre-occupied face. The neighbors are non-placed by his manner. He is a native of Ontario.

AN INDIANA TRAGEDY. Mrs. Russell Culbertson Forced to Swallow Poison. Vincennes, Ind., March 26.—Mrs. Russell Culbertson died yesterday, from carbolic acid poisoning. She was found bound and gagged in the shed at the rear of the home of her husband's father, Joshua Culbertson, late yesterday afternoon. Her arm and head were bruised as if she had struggled with assailants. After being carried into the house she said: "A man and a woman dragged me out of the house in the night and forced me to swallow something. Then she became unconscious and continued so until her death. Her husband, Russell Culbertson, declared his wife was murdered by persons whose identity he knows, but he will give no further information, except to the police." Mrs. Culbertson received several letters threatening her with death if she did not give up her husband. The handwriting has been identified as that of a woman who was a friend of her husband's before he married. In the pocket Mrs. Culbertson's apron the last of the letters was found. It bore only the word good-bye and contained a small plaster, skull and crossbones.

Kills Himself With Rifle. Auburn, N.Y., March 26.—Eneas Napoleon DeVoe, a son of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas DeVoe, of Oswego, killed himself with his favorite rifle in a toll house at the rear of his home. His folks assert that they know no reason for the young man committing the deed, although he has not been well for some time and had been acting strangely for a day or two. DeVoe was a bricklayer and was thirty-six years old. Smallpox at Newmarket. Newmarket, Ont., March 26.—The little village of Sharon, four miles north of here, is in a state of consternation over the fact that one of the guests at a dance held a few days ago had at that time contracted smallpox. The authorities have placed all those who were at the dance under quarantine, and practically the entire village, churches and schools are closed up. A Mile Missing. Watertown, N.Y., March 26.—Because some one of the New York Central's civil engineers was recently a bit more exact than his predecessors, the citizens of Watertown will save two cents when on a trip to the metropolis. The railroad company has discovered that it's a mile less from here to New York than had been previously calculated, and after April the fare will be \$7.13 instead of \$7.15.

Eleven Men Hurt By Fall. New York, March 26.—Eleven men working on a scaffold at the new Pennsylvania railroad terminal building here were precipitated to the floor of the building, thirty feet below, when the scaffold gave way. Some were taken to a nearby hospital in an unconscious condition, but it is believed that all will recover.

JUST ESCAPED IN TIME. Essex Man and His Wife Were Slightly Burned. Essex, Ont., March 26.—The residence of W. E. Wigle, was wrecked by fire, early this morning. The fire was discovered by the son, who quickly aroused the family, and a moment too soon, as the escape of the father and mother was then cut off, and both were slightly burned in getting out. Only a few of the contents were saved. The cause of the fire is unknown, but incandescence is supposed. The loss is partly covered by insurance.

Woman Kidnapper Identified. Chicago, March 26.—The woman of mystery in the Whittia kidnapping is no more a mystery. She is the daughter of William McDermott, for many years a member of the Chicago fire department. Her brother, William McDermott, was located in Chicago, today, and admitted that the woman is his sister.

Sailed From Moville. Montreal, March 26.—The Allan line steamer Corsican, from Halifax and St. John, via Moville, sailed from Moville at 9 a.m., on the 26th of March, with 21 first-class, 340 second-class and 670 storage passengers.
