TIGHE TOOK GAS AND IT LOOKS QUEER AS HE WAS DRESSED.

Found Unconscious, Taken to Hospital But He Never Regained His Faculties—He Was Quite Popular.

Toronto, March 30.—Robert Tighe, a well-known mining man, having been with his brother, James, the first to take advantage of the Cobalt boom, was found unconscious from illuminating gas in the Albion hotel, this morning. He was at once removed to St. Michael's hospital, but, although artificial respiration was applied, he never regained consciousness. Tighe went to his room, last night, seemingly in good spirits. He was lying on the bed fully dressed when found. He was a member of the Tighe Mining Syndicate which formerly owned the mine at St. Michael's City. He was about forty years old and popular among those who knew him.

A Canadian duplicate of the American Power Boat Association's long-distance motor boat race, on Lake Ontario, has been established by the supporters of the Canadian Power Boat Association of a trophy from J. W. Commodore, of this city, secretary-treasurer of the Lake Sailing Skiff Association, for a long-distance and endurance race. The race which is a handicap, based upon speed ratings furnished by the owners of the competing boats, will be from Toronto to a point off Clayton, N.Y., and will be started on July 25th, a week ahead of the L.Y.R.A. regatta.

Every department of a newspaper is entitled to come within the statutes relating to libel and slander, and thus is enabled to take advantage of any protection they afford, as is the editor, manager, publisher or proprietor of a newspaper. This is the purport of a decision given, this morning, by a chief justice in a motion arising out of the war between two Hamilton sporting editors, Robinson, of the Spectator, and Mills, of the Times. The chief justice allows an appeal from the ruling of the master and decides that security for costs must be given.

ROBBER SHOT AND KILLED.

Officer Fatally Wounded in Lively Fight.

Trenton, Mo., March 30.—While heading a posse of citizens in pursuit of two safe-blowers City Marshal George Caraway was shot and probably fatally wounded here yesterday. The safe-blowers had robbed two stores at Spickard, near here. Local authorities were notified and when the robbers arrived on a train a lively exchange of shots ensued. Caraway dropped with the first volley. Three of the robbers were cornered this afternoon by the posse on a farm two miles south of Jamesport. There was a hot exchange of shots and one of the robbers was shot and killed. The two others surrendered.

CLEANED OUT SHOP.

Robbers on a Very Busy Street in Stratford.

Stratford, Ont., March 30.—Some time between 6 and 10:30 o'clock, last night, the jewelry store of W. H. Roberts, 56 Wellington street, was entered and about four hundred dollars worth of watches, rings, brooches, etc., taken. The robbery was a most bold-faced affair, the store being but a stone's throw from the police station and on a much-frequented thoroughfare and even the show window was cleaned out. It is thought to have been the work of professionals.

DO CHATHAM WOMEN SMOKE?

Says They Are Inevitable Users of Cigarettes.

Chatham, Ont., March 30.—Rev. W. H. Graham, pastor of the Victoria avenue Methodist church, created somewhat of a sensation in his church by announcing that information had reached him to the effect that the women of Chatham are inveterate cigarette smokers.

Says U.S. and Canada Will Fight.

Asheville, N.C., March 30.—That the American continent will eventually become one great republic, under the government of what is now the United States, is the prediction made by former Governor Folk, in an interview.

Governor Folk declares that a clash between the United States and Canada is inevitable and that it will come in the not far distant future.

LORD MINTO'S DANGER.

Viceroy of India Has Elaborate Guard.

Calcutta, India, March 30.—Lord Minto, the viceroy of India, is now going about guarded by the most elaborate police escort on record. On the occasion of his recent visit to university, the bazaars and streets in the vicinity of the university senate house were in the hands of hundreds of European and Indian police, including an armed force. The senate house and its galleries and furniture were searched before Lord Minto's entry. These precautions are declared to be the result of an anonymous letter received at the Government House, threatening an attempt on the viceroy's life.

CHASING INSURGENTS.

Said the Crowd Will Surrender Very Soon.

Oklahoma, Ok., March 30.—Paybreak, today, found the state militia upon the move in pursuit of Crazy Snake and his handful of insurgents, composed of negroes, Indians, and half-breeds. Scouts say the Indians are in precipitate flight towards the mountains and overtures of surrender are expected to-day. George Woodruff, attorney for the department of the interior, arrived to-day.

LONDON'S GRAFT CHARGES.

Real Estate Owners Want Royal Commission.

London, Ont., March 30.—In connection with the graft charges that have been made against members of the city council here, the Real Estate Owners' Association, will ask the government to appoint a royal commission to investigate and in addition will probably form a fund among themselves to press the charges if Andrew Carnegie will give a sum as he did in the recent Pittsburgh cases. Mr. Carnegie has been written to regarding the matter.

Give Up Barton Mystery.

Hamilton, Ont., March 30.—A despatch from New York states that the Pinkerton agency, which was engaged by the provincial government in 1906 to try to solve the Barton township murder mystery, has given up the job, after making fruitless efforts to trace the woman and to get some trace of her murderer. Superintendent Bailey of the New York agency is quoted as saying he does not think the mystery will be ever cleared up, unless the murderer makes a death-bed confession.

WANT CAMP AT PRESCOTT.

Asks Department to Allow 56th to Train There.

Brockville, Ont., March 30.—At a special meeting of the Prescott town council a resolution was passed and authorized to be sent to the militia department, requesting that the summer camp of the 56th Regiment be held there instead of at Petawawa. The council will guarantee to defray expenses up to \$250, and supply electric light and water.

Killed in Battles.

St. Petersburg, March 30.—In a pitched battle, in the streets of Tabriz, twelve nationalists have been killed and thirty wounded, and six thousand royalists have been killed. The first intimation of the rioting was brought, to-day, in despatches from Theran. It is feared that the casualties will be much heavier before order is restored.

Strange Tragedy in Rome.

New York, March 30.—A despatch from Rome says: Believing that he had communicated consumption to his daughter, who died of the disease, Napoleon Parboni, a republican agitator, stabbed a nineteen-year-old girl in the convent of the Sisters of St. Mary, and then ended his own life with the same stiletto.

White Girl in Chain Gang.

Athens, Ga., March 30.—Convicted of being an "undesirable," Kate O'Dwyer, a handsome young white woman, has been sent to the county chain gang, and is now serving in chains with negroes.
