Tenders for Red River Bridge.

SEALED tenders addressed to the undersigned and marked on the envelope "Tender for the Red River Bridge," will be received at the office of the Commissioners of the Transcontinental Railway until twelve o'clock noon of the 8th day of April, 1909, for the construction and erection of a steel and concrete bridge and approach spans over the Red River between Winnipeg and St. Boniface, near the foot of Lombard Street, together with grading and approach spans over streets in Winnipeg.

Separate tenders must be submitted for the substructure and other works as per schedule, and for superstructure.

Plans, details and profiles may be seen and full information obtained at the office of the chief engineer at Ottawa, and also at the office of the district engineer at St. Boniface, Man.

Persons tendering are notified that tenders will not be considered unless made on the forms supplied by the Commissioners, which may be had on application to Mr. Hugh D. Ludeman, chief engineer, Ottawa, Ont., and M. S. H. Poulin, district engineer, St. Boniface, Man.

Each tender must be signed and sealed by and witnessed, and be accompanied by an accepted cheque on a chartered Bank of the Dominion of Canada, payable to the Commissioners of the Transcontinental Railway for the sum of \$25,000, for substructure and other work as per schedule, and for the sum of \$25,000 for steel superstructure and floor.

The cheques deposited by the party whose tender is accepted will be deposited to the credit of the Receiver General of Canada as security for the due and faithful performance of the contract accepted to its terms. Cheques deposited by parties whose tenders are rejected will be returned within ten days after the signing of the contract.

ABOUT TUBERCULOSIS

DR. GEORGE PORTER OF TORONTO INTERESTED.

At Meeting Held on Friday Night, in the City-League For Kingston, Will Be Formed at Another Meeting to Be Held Shortly.

There was only a small attendance at the public meeting, held in the City-League building, for the purpose of organizing a league for the prevention of tuberculosis, and it is indeed a great pity because a most instructive address was delivered by Dr. George D. Porter, of Toronto, representative of the Canadian Association for the Prevention of Tuberculosis. The proposed league was not organized at last night's meeting, but it is expected that one will be put in operation at another meeting of those interested, to be held shortly.

E. J. B. Peters briefly, before the meeting, the speaker, He referred to the great interest taken in the missionary conference, now being held in Toronto, where the largest building in the city, Massey Hall, had to be secured for the work along the line of tuberculosis had not been received in the same spirit as had the missionary cause. He referred to the great cholera epidemic in Kingston, in 1854, when about fifty people in the city died from the disease. But, after all, that was nothing compared with the number carried off every year by tuberculosis. The provincial government had considered that it was useless to vote money to fight tuberculosis, unless the municipalities were prepared to expend some money and erect a hospital for the prevention of the disease. On this condition the legislature agreed to vote \$4,000 to each municipality but so far London and St. Thomas were the only places that had taken advantage of this offer. He urged that we should take the first steps towards the prevention of the disease, in Kingston, it was said that we should erect a hospital.

The speaker gave a warm-welcome to the speaker of the evening, and small in numbers it would be sure to have some influence, and he hoped that so far as this district was concerned the question would receive more sympathy.

Dr. Porter gave a few figures in his opening remarks, stating that in Canada last year about 7,000 people died as a result of consumption, and that this year the figures would, no doubt, reach the mark of 11,700. In the province of Ontario alone from 2,700 to 3,000 people died each year from the disease. In the county of Frontenac there were 75 deaths every year. It was quite true, he said, to have the death, but it was unfortunate that they were all people between fifteen and forty-five years of age, just the period when they were of most use in the world. The prevention of the disease was the greatest question that every time the clock struck the hour, in Canada, there was a death from this dread disease, and why should not the people care? The speaker would not say that had been the citizens of Kingston had not turned out well to the meeting that they were not interested in a proper way. By many, the disease was looked upon as hopeless. About one in every eight of the present race was dying of the disease. It was an infectious disease, and occasionally hereditary, but the great question is "Is the disease curable?" It was curable, and the strongest proof of this statement was the fact that so many had had the disease and recovered. And if curable, how do we go about it? "The time to go about it is when you are run down, but not as the saying goes, you are at the bottom of the hill." A great many were urged to go to another climate. There was no earthly climate that would be suitable for all the year. "Canada had a good climate, a cold climate was just as good as any other climate for the consumptive. People in the south were sent to Canada, and vice versa. A man of wealth could take these changes, but for the man who had not the money there was "no place to go home again, since the day when you are down in sickness how do you expect them to do so when you are in Italy? It would be better, even if the climate is better, for you to stay at home.

The simple things were the best for such sickness. No "quack" medicine would make an old man young. The simple remedies were sufficient rest, good food, and pure air. A patient should be in the open air, but at all times kept warm. The one great question was to destroy the disease, and build up the system to resist it.

The speaker then referred to the benefit to be derived from organization. The small attendance did not discourage him, as some of the best results had been obtained, where there had been small gatherings. Reference was made to the good work being carried on in Berlin, London, Hamilton, St. Catharines and Ottawa. He urged Kingston to organize a society, which would be affiliated with the Canadian Association. The latter association was now political.

At the close of the address, on motion of Col. Taylor, and Rev. D. McCallum, a hearty vote of thanks was tendered Dr. Porter, and then the meeting was thrown open for discussion.

The chairman remarked that we in Canada were a great deal behind the United States, in this work, referring to the fact that many of the big churches on the American side had taken up the matter, and formed associations. He thought that some of the churches in the larger centres of Canada might also take it up. "We did not make a start we would never have a sanitarium in Kingston. There had been lack of municipal assistance for this work."

Dr. A. E. Ross and J. M. Platt spoke favoring the proposal to organize an association, and it was finally decided to have the chairman call a meeting in the near future, call all those interested in the matter, when it is hoped the association will be formed.

A TRAGIC EVENT.

Skinner Saved Stranger and Afterwards Drowned.
One stormy night in the winter of 1852 the Annie Jane, a new thruplanned vessel, was conveying a party of about twenty passengers and cargo for America, west of the western coast of Vatersay, and striking a rock heavily began to fill rapidly with water. There were but few dwellers on Vatersay at that time, two years having passed since the former inhabitants were compelled to leave the island, but the one remaining farmer and some shepherds did their utmost to help those on the doomed vessel.

The captain of the Annie Jane made a strenuous effort to rescue his wife and children, and he was already filled with water, but a faint cry from the stairway revived his hopes, and peering through the darkness he made out her familiar form and face. "Agnes, is it you?" he called, but her answer was lost in the storm. He bore her to the boat and she was safely not ashore, then back he went with splendid heroism to help those still on board. When the rescue work was completed he repaired to the shepherds' lone hut where his wife lay. She was still unconscious, and those about her moved on tiptoe lest she should be disturbed. Breathing a thanksgiving prayer the skipper bent down to kiss his wife. His lips were close to her forehead, but suddenly he started back with a wild shriek. She was an entire stranger!

"Well-rich mad with grief he pulled out his pistol and was ready to shoot, but he perceived at daybreak his lifeless body was found washed ashore along with the wreckage.

The memory of this tragic event is still fresh in the minds of many people living in the Hebrides to-day—J.M.

Pure Food Law.

An act just passed by Governor Stuart, of Pennsylvania, is enforced, trading in "rots and spots" spoiled and cracked eggs—will not be so remunerative in Philadelphia as it has been for some years. The new law prohibits the sale of any eggs which were partially decomposed or otherwise unfit for food, under penalty of a fine of from \$200 to \$1,000, or three to five months in jail. Another new Pennsylvania pure food law is one that prohibits under penalty of from \$25 to \$100 fine the sale of any adulterated "soft drink," and will, it is hoped, abolish the business in beverages made out of coal tar dyes and chemicals.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTHWEST WEST MINING REGULATIONS.

COAL.—Coal mining rights may be leased for twenty-one years at an annual rental of \$1.00 an acre. Not more than 3,500 acres can be leased to one applicant. Royalty, five cents per ton of QUARTZ.—person eighteen years of age or over having made a discovery may locate a claim 1,500 feet by 1,500 feet. Fee, \$500. An application must be extended on the claim each year, or paid to the Mining Recorder. When \$500 has been expended or paid and other requirements complied with the claim may be purchased at \$1.00 an acre.

CLAIMS.—Entry by proxy may be made at any agency on certain conditions by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

DEPTHS.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. Homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, or on a portion of it, at least 40 acres. If by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader if good standing may prevent a quarter-section along-side his homestead. Price \$5.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Purchased homesteads may be acquired on any available lands on other odd or even numbered Sections South of township 45, East of the Calgary and Edmonton Railway and the West line of range 26, and West of the third Meridian and the Sault Railway line. Duties.—Must reside six months
