

# FATAL ENDING TO TRIP

## MEMBER OF A HULL CLUB IN JAIL.

### Charged With Being the Cause of Another's Death—He Knocked Him Down For Trying to Act As Peace-maker.

Ottawa, April 3.—There has been a disastrous ending to an excursion of the Stay-out-late Club, a band of young men from Hull, Que. One of its members, Andre Sylvester, whose parents live at Montreal, having died from cerebral hemorrhage, another member, Napoleon Laroche, in jail on a charge of having caused his death. Fifteen members of the club were returning home, liquor having flowed freely among them, when, it is said, Laroche became troublesome. Sylvester acted the part of peace-maker but was knocked down for his pains. His head caught the ground and he never regained his senses and died some hours later. His alleged assailant was remanded and the inquest has been fixed for Tuesday.

Frank Murray and William McKay, two burly men, who robbed the boat and shoe store of Isaiah Pratt, on Thursday night, and got away with \$400 worth of goods, were arrested after a terrific fight on a C.P.R. train between Ottawa and Vankeek Hill yesterday afternoon. Detective O'Neira, of Ottawa, followed two suspicious valises that were checked to the Hill from Ottawa and spotted the men ten miles from Vankeek Hill. He placed them under arrest and a terrific battle ensued, the three men fighting all over the car. J. H. Downey, an immigration inspector from Winnipeg, came to O'Neira's help, as the men were handcuffed and taken to Ottawa. Murray is an old jail bird having just served a five-year sentence for burglary.

### LOADED SHELL FOUND.

#### It Belonged to Some Kind of Revolver.

Hamilton, Ont., April 3.—Although the detective, acting under instructions from the attorney-general's department, refuse to give out any information about the Kinrade murder case, it is understood that their search of the last few days in the neighborhood of the scene of the tragedy has been rewarded by the finding of 32 calibre, full cartridge. This was found in a yard near the Kinrade property. It may or may not belong to the revolver which the murderer used to kill Elmer Kinrade.

The mystery of what became of the revolver and the empty cartridge shells has been one of the most puzzling features of the case, and the officers have not only ransacked the house and inspected the plumbing, but had the sewer leading from the street opened up.

There was a heavy fall of snow the day after the murder. The warm weather of the past few days cleared the ground, and in the hope that this might reveal something, the detective have gone over the locality again.

One story was that they found five cartridge shells, but so far as can be learned, the single undischarged cartridge was all that was found.

### Dismissed the Case.

Hamilton, Ont., April 3.—Practically the entire Selman Stock company, which has been playing at the Savoy theatre all winter, appeared at the police court, this morning. Joseph Selman, manager, was summoned on the charge of refusing to pay half a week's salary, \$25, to Cecil Owen, one of the actors. Selman claimed Owen refused to go on the stage when ordered, it being understood that he was sore because the former leading lady, Margaret Hagen, and in had received her walking ticket. The magistrate dismissed the case.

# THE POLICY OUTLINED FOR CANADIAN TO PURSUE IN MISSIONS.

## The Churches to Be Asked to Have Weekly Mission Offerings—Board to Be Formed to Prevent Missions Overlapping.

Toronto, April 3.—Before the conclusion of the last business session of the Canadian National Mission Congress, to-night, H. W. Rowell, K.C., the president, will present the report of the special committee on Canada's National Mission policy, which will sum up the effect of the whole congress.

It is understood the committee's recommendation will include the following: (1) That the system of weekly contributions to missions be adopted by all the churches; (2) that the churches of Canada seek to double their contributions to the mission cause during the coming year; (3) that with a view to the possibility of church union and the necessity for preventing overlapping of home mission work, inter-denominational boards be formed to direct the mission work in certain cities and new localities.

King Leopold has offered a prize of \$500 for the best work on the progress of aerial navigation and how to encourage it.

Elie Albert, convicted of manslaughter at Rimouski, Que., was sentenced on Saturday morning to twenty-five years in the penitentiary.

A young Italian, sentenced to fifteen years in penitentiary for shooting his father, at Montreal, asked the judge to make it hanging.

The New York state legislature is considering a bill to fine landlords of first-class apartment houses who refuse to rent to tenants having children.

There is a bill before the Prussian diet to forbid foreigners holding or operating mines in the country without the special permission of the king.

Gordon A. Harris, Vernon, B.C., has received word from Ottawa of his appointment to succeed W. T. B. Preston as trade commissioner to Japan.

The Allan steamer Virginia, for Halifax, sailed from Liverpool on 2nd April with 55 first-class, 273 second class and 859 steerage passengers.

Mrs. H. H. Lane, Brockville, in the general hospital, died on Friday. Deceased's maiden name was Miss May Cook, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Bunting, Smith's Falls, has discovered a long lost half-sister, in the person of Mrs. Mary Munro, New York. They had heard nothing of each other for fifty years.

Peter Mehall and Stephen Tees were, it is believed, fatally injured, and James Zarrow was seriously hurt by a rock in the new Michigan Central railway tunnel at Windsor, Ont.

At the Hamilton police court Professor D. Arville, well known all over Canada, was found guilty of fortune telling, contrary to the statutes, and was remanded until next week for sentence.

Venezuela Geraci, trapped while waiting for \$3,000, the price of Dr. Peter Cutera's life, is believed by the Chicago police and the Italian colony to be the great lender of that name, head of the Black Hand Society in that part of the country.

The sad intelligence was received at Toledo, of the death, on Sunday, of Miss Mary Donovan, Wasasa, Sask. The deceased was the second oldest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jeremiah Donovan, Kitley. Death was due to appendicitis and peritonitis.

The suspension of John Dickinson & Co., New York, and Chicago, is announced. The firm holds membership in the Consolidated Stock Exchange and the Chicago Board of Trade. Liabilities are said to be about \$250,000. The suspension is credited to the plant of the McLaughlin Gasoline and Motor company and the flour and feed store of Samuel Wright, at Swansea, Ont., were completely destroyed by fire on Saturday morning. The total loss amounts to about \$20,000, and is partially covered by insurance.

It is not believed that the full reorganization plan of the Dominion Steel company will be announced right away, but it is felt that next week may bring an announcement that prepared shareholders will be rewarded for their long wait, with a small offering of the \$2,750,000 received from the coal company.

Fire, which, for a time, threatened the Kensington factory district of Philadelphia, on Saturday, burned out seventeen firms in the six story block bounded by Front, Laurel and Haydeck streets and Franklin avenue, causing an explosion on the second floor, which tore through four storeys and blew off the roof and was beyond control before the firemen arrived.

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Rim of Hat Tore Out Eye of Conductor.

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In the course of his duties Thomas assisted a young woman with a blonde ponytail and a hat of wide expanse to board the car.
