### GAVE FINE LECTURE

#### REV. C. O. JOHNSON SPEAKS AT OPERA HOUSE.

On the Subject, "Love, Courtship and Marriage"—Master Wilfrid Morrison Assists in Musical Programme.

"Love, Courtship and Marriage," was the title of a most interesting lecture, given at the Grand Opera House last night, by Rev. C. O. Johnson, a former pastor of Queen street Methodist church. The lecture was given under the auspices of the Y.W.C.A., the proceeds to be devoted towards the fitting out of a gymnasium for the young ladies, and there was a fair attendance.

There was also a short musical programme, which consisted of solos by Master Wilfrid Morrison, of Toronto, and selections by the Sydenham street church choir. Master Morrison sang three selections in sweet voice, and was warmly applauded. His efforts put forth in Kingston during the past few weeks have been much appreciated and he will always be a favorite with Kingston audiences. The quartette, composed of Messrs. Harold and Harvey Angrove, Sergt. Harte and William Eva rendered a couple of selections in fine style.

George Mills ably filled the duties of chairman and in his opening remarks referred to the Sydenham street church, in the physical department, stating that he was pleased to know that the Y.W.C.A. was also about to take up work of this kind. The Y.W.C.A. was doing a grand and noble work and deserved good support.

In introducing the speaker of the evening Mr. Mills stated that it was fourteen years ago that Rev. Mr. Johnson was pastor of Queen street church and he paid a warm tribute to his work while here. Kingstonsians were glad to welcome him back. Mr. Mills further stated that the subject of the address was not one selected by the speaker himself. It had been selected by the young men or women, or both. However, there was a good deal in it, and it was sure to be of interest.

In his opening remarks Rev. Mr. Johnson stated that it required all kinds of people to make a world, and then went on to show how we all selected our "opposites." Society, he said, would get out of balance if this were not so. "Some women marry very homely men," he added, "and some men would never get a wife if this was not the case." Woman's superiority over man stood out prominently. They were not made of rough clay, but of delicate china, and she was a person who could put her heart into "little things and it was for this reason that we loved her.

Turning to the question of bringing up children the speaker said: "Each the children to tell the truth and teach them to govern themselves. You cannot always be near them; they must go beyond you. All this has to do with the making of character. You ask the question, 'What is wrong with so many of our young men to-day?' You are anxious about the future of the young men and women. But it is only the young man who can say 'no' to himself who can say 'no' to evil. He alone can master evil. No young man is of value unless he can master himself. "We talk about courtship, and it is looked upon by many as something to make a jest of. Marriage is important, and courtship is just as important too. Some mothers are very anxious about the company their daughter keeps, and this is one reason why some young men will not go into the home, because they are not ready to be looked over. Don't court over the gate; it is tolerably hard on the gate, and remember that no man's love is better than his character. I am glad to know that there are thousands of splendid Canadians who are not living for the express purpose of getting married. I have travelled all over, but I have seen a great many women, but if I had to marry a thousand, although I hope I never shall, I would select a Canadian, because there are no more graceful or home-honoring women in the world, than the Canadian women.

"And don't marry for money. Money will never make you happy. It can never buy happiness. Happiness comes from harmony. You must be harmonious to be happy. Don't speak cross words to your husband, and kind words to your neighbor. John Brown. You don't have to live with John

### REAL ESTATE HIGHER THAN IT HAS EVER BEEN IN KINGSTON.

#### What Real Estate Agents Say—Property Five Per Cent Higher—Rents Have Also Increased Materially.

"There has been a big improvement in real estate conditions in Kingston during the past year," said D. A. Cays, representative of the Whig, in reply to a query as to how things in that line were moving. "During the past few months I have sold quite a number of properties, and the prices secured were five per cent. higher than could be got a year ago, so that there is a big improvement in real estate in this city."

Mr. Cays also said that rents were higher than a year ago. This is particularly the case with houses that have rented for from ten to fifteen dollars a month. There is a big demand for houses of that price, and, accordingly, the rates have been increased two and three dollars a month. In a few cases houses that rented last year for fifteen dollars a month are now held at twenty. There is a great need for more houses that will rent for from ten to fifteen dollars a month. Mr. Cays looks for still greater improvement in real estate conditions during the next year.

Another real estate agent told the Whig this afternoon that he had made about ten property deals within the past month, and this would go to show that real estate is booming. "How about the prices?" he was asked. "Very good."  
"Higher than last season?"  
"Yes, a little higher."  
Asked if the rents would go up the agent stated that there would be an increase.

#### BUILDING BOATS.

##### A Busy Scene at Coward's Boat Factory.

A very busy place these days is Coward's Boat Factory, near the old McLeod tannery, on River street. When Mr. Coward first came to Kingston he started building motor boats, skiffs, etc., in the old block house on Sydenham street. Now he is entrenched on the banks of the Great Cataract, where his products can be easily launched when completed. At present he has no less than eleven motor boats under construction, some of these for use in home waters and others going as far as the Atlantic seaboard, on the east, and the plains of Alberta on the west. Mr. Coward's business is steadily developing, and he now gives employment to eight or nine carpenters. Boats are finished in all stages of construction, as the buyers may wish. Some purchasers want only the knock-down frames, while others want a semi-finished hull.

Among the boats on order, or being built, are the following: Two for Perth, seven for Montreal, four for Ottawa, two for Winnipeg, eight for Graysen, Sask., two for Toronto, two for Picton, one for Woodlands, Que., cruiser for Picton, N.S., one for Westville, N.S., one for Campbellton, four for St. John, N.B., eight skiffs and four canoes for Lethbridge, Alta., one for Nelson, B.C., and one for Victoria, B.C.

#### FIRE IN Y.M.C.A. BUILDING.

##### Soon Extinguished—Was In a Dangerous Place.

At 9:06 o'clock, Monday evening, the fire brigade received a call from the Y.M.C.A. corner. Both squads were quickly on the scene, the upper station naturally arriving first. Fire was discovered in the top flat of the association building, in the quarters occupied as a residence by the janitor, Mr. Hamilton.
