

RIOTS IN OTHER DAYS

SMITH-TUPPER FRACAS IS BROUGHT TO MIND.

Last Friday's Disturbance in Common is Matched By Incident of the Seventies.

Ottawa, April 5.—While it is admitted that the incident of Friday night was the most disorderly that has occurred in the house for twenty years old officials recall what was perhaps the most exciting passage between two members of parliament that has ever taken place in this country.

It was the closing day of the MacKenzie parliament of 1874-8, and the Pacific scandal was the question that had split the house into two hostile camps. Just at the time that the commons was waiting for the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, Donald A. Smith (now Lord Strathcona) rose to a question of privilege and objected to a remark of Sir John A. Macdonald, who, he said, "insinuated that the bill (supreme court bill) was merely an arrangement by which the government could reward a member of the house for his service support, and that this member had been compelled to admit that he was interested in this monopoly."

"I mentioned," said Mr. Smith, "that there was not one relative of mine who drew one sixpence of public money, who held any place in the public service, and said, perhaps, it might be otherwise with those connected with and related to the right hon. gentleman."

Mr. Smith then proceeded to read from a newspaper report of the speech of Charles Tupper (Sir Charles) at Orangeville, and Mr. Tupper complained that Mr. Smith should refer to the matter at the moment that Black Rod was coming to the door, when there would be no opportunity to reply.

A more cowardly thing on the part of Mr. Smith was never ventured on in the house," said Mr. Tupper.

This raised a storm, and amid cries of "Order," Mr. Smith said: "The charge of being a coward I throw back on the hon. gentleman."

The gist of the Tupper speech at Orangeville was that when he (Smith) came to the conclusion that the government was going down, he made the bolt, and he (Tupper) had no doubt that he had had a great deal of reason since for congratulating himself on having jumped as he did."

Sir John's Denial.

Sir John and Mr. Smith discussed at some length some of the events leading up to the bolt of Mr. Smith in 1873, and to the Smith version Sir John replied: "There is not one single word of truth in that statement; not one single word of truth. The honorable gentleman is now stating what is a falsehood."

Mr. Smith: The honorable gentleman says that he did not say so; certainly the spirit within him said it, for the words came out of the honorable gentleman's mouth. If he did not say so, the "spirit" within him did.

Several times Sir John denied having uttered the expression complained of, and then Mr. Smith observed: "The honorable member for Cumberland the same evening told me that the right honorable gentleman was not capable of knowing what he said, and will he deny?"

This caused another uproar, and Mr. Tupper appealed to the chair. Was it competent for Mr. Smith to detail private conversations while falsifying them? "And his word passes for nothing here or elsewhere," he added.

Mr. Tupper: Coward, coward, sit down.

Mr. Smith: He knows—

Mr. Tupper: Coward, coward, cow-

Mr. Smith: You are the coward.

Sir John A. Macdonald: That fellow Smith is the biggest liar I ever met.

The Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod was then admitted and the session was at an end.

Hansard closes the incident, but it is matter of common knowledge that on the way to the senate chamber Sir John remarked: "I can lick that man Smith quicker than hell can search a feather."
