Board of Works on Tour This Afternoon—Victoria Street Residents' Damage Claims—City Engineer Has No Hope For Flushing.

The Board of Works had a meeting on Thursday afternoon. Aldermen Graham (chairman), Toye, Harty, Kent and Free being in attendance. The engineer stated that two street watering carts were ready and could be in operation on Saturday, if necessary. Street scraping would begin next week after the first rain.

The chairman said that the remainder of the walks reported by the engineer as requiring to be replaced would be inspected on Saturday afternoon. These walks are in Cataraqui and Frontenac wards.

A petition from residents of Rideau street against street watering had to be refused, as the street watering by-law, fixing the area has been passed by the city council.

The engineer reported that the first department had refused to loan the Board of Works any old hose for flushing purposes and to buy 400 feet of old hose from the department would cost \$80. The by-law was looked up and it was shown that flushing was entirely in the hands of the city engineer.

The board adopted the engineer's report recommending the connection of a sewer on York street, near Frontenac street.

In regard to the claims of Victoria street residents for damages to their houses through the overflowing of the sewer, the city solicitor reported he had received statutory declarations from the claimants as to the amount of the damages. One of the claimants, Rev. Mr. Pierce had reduced his amount from \$15 to \$5. The total amount claimed was \$196.38. The matter was left in abeyance.
