Knapp, government agent, has already received many applications from farmers for help, and has placed several men in good positions. Adjutant Parsons, of the Salvation Army, is also in receipt of a considerable number of applications.

The wages run from \$20 to \$25 a month. Adjutant Parsons, to show what good wages the right kind of men can command, stated that a farm laborer at Barriefield had a free house, garden and firewood, and was paid \$25 a month.

While the demand for farm help is brisk, no difficulty is anticipated in meeting it. The supply, which is made up mostly of English immigrants, is equal to the demand. The English farm hand is largely employed around here, and, in most cases, gives good satisfaction.

MORALS FOR PICTON

DECIDED UPON BY THE TOWN COUNCIL.

Remarkable Jump Over a Pony By a Runaway Horse—Rural Mail Delivery on the Sand Banks' Road.

Picton, April 8.—The town fathers have set themselves a standard for the public morals, by passing a by-law against drunkenness, disorderliness, vagrancy and begging on any public highway, against any display of indecent literature or pictures and the performance of any indecent or lewd show. Councillor Newman is anxious that all dogs shall be taxed, but the council, after the second reading, left it over till next time. Mayor question of the stringent enforcement of the law, which is an enthusiastic yachtsman, brought up the matter of the law compelling yachts, row boats and canoes to carry the regulation lights on the waters, and the council vested in him authority to see that the law was carried to the letter.

The spring assize court will be held, in Picton, on Tuesday, May 4th, with Chief Justice Meredith presiding. It is two years since a case has been up for trial in the county court house.

One of the fine horses of John H. Allen's celebrated stables was being exercised, yesterday, by Trainer Cole, and when on the upper part of Main street, it became frightened and gave a sudden sharp bolt that gave its liberty to the buggy. Standing by the curb was H. R. Burton's pony, attached to the cart. The Allen horse gave a great leap and cleared the pony and rig, and dashed on down town to the stables. The pony was unharmed.

The promise of the Laurier government made during last fall, and much laughed at at that time by some has been fulfilled and residents of the Picton to the Sand Bank Road, a much travelled and thickly-populated highway, now have free mail delivery, daily. Every day the mail is delivered to their boxes erected in front of their homes. The system has just gone into force and there are twenty-two families being served. Fifteen more requests have come in, for boxes. J. W. Whattam, of West Point, is the new stage driver, and beside his regular contract for carrying the mails he gets \$1 extra for the box and its erection, but the service is free. If anyone wants to write to any resident of this road, the address is R. M. D. No. Picton.
