**OCCURRENCES RECOUNTED IN BRIEF FORM.**

Matters That Interest Everybody—Notes From All Over—Little of Everything Easily Read and Remembered.

Montreal is to have a home coming week, Sept. 13th to 20th.

Windsor council has made by-laws against the smoke nuisance.

A steamboat service is proposed from Cleveland to Port Stanley.

Four-year-old son of Matthew Sheedy, of Osceola, was drowned near his home.

J. Milone, an Italian laborer, touched a live wire at Brantford and was killed.

William Smith, Hamilton, was killed at Lethbridge by falling from a bridge.

Saskatoon has been selected as the seat of the University of Saskatchewan.

The French government has decided to expel Cipriano Castro from Martinique.

A horse in California has been asleep for two weeks and is now only recovering.

Eighteen-month-old son of William Welton, Detroit, swallowed dozen pills containing strychnine, and died.

Frederick Clark, Montreal, for attempting to murder his sister, was sent to penitentiary for four years.

There is great Easter traffic. At Montreal 20,000 went off for holidays and 60,000 were handled at Toronto.

There was rough-and-tumble fight in Bellevue hospital, New York, between visitors and male nurses. Men were finally subdued.

John Neville has been arrested at Hamilton on a charge of shooting Constable Smith on March 2nd. Neville denies any guilt.

A Toronto cat, owned by Mrs. Ayres, Bloor street, gave birth to a kitten with only two legs. It is healthy, and will live.

Stratford police unearthed \$400 worth of jewelry near race stables, and Roy Close and David McDonald, both aged twenty, are under arrest.

Hon. George F. Grahame, minister of railways and canals, will be tendered a banquet by the Montreal Reform club, on Saturday evening, April 17th.

Mrs. Minnie Young, widow of H. D. Young, wealthy junk dealer, was found dead in the cellar of her home, with her skull battered in. No arrests made yet.

At Middletown, N.Y., during the high wind, John Delahoyde, an employee of the Erie railway, was blown in front of a train and instantly killed.

Plans are now prepared for great railway link of 282 miles, from the Atlantic seaboard, to South Dakota; company with capitalization of \$659,000,000.

Leaving notes telling of a suicide pact, Hermann Bartlett and Bella Fugh jumped together into the Mississippi river at Alexandria, Mo., and were drowned.

George Washington, a negro who brutally assaulted Mrs. Ella Curtain, at Philadelphia, was given twenty-five years in penitentiary and \$2,000 fine. He is fifty-six years of age.

Six yaks have been shipped from Hamburg for the western part of Canada. They were sent to Canada by the Duke of Bedford on Ernest Thompson Seton's suggestion.

Rev. Edward Bucher was told, at Baltimore, that he could not have post unless he was married. Inside of couple of hours he wedded Miss Alta Welsh, and got the desired post.

At West Chazy, N.Y., on Wednesday afternoon, Elida Eldred and Warren (died, brother and sister, were killed while driving in a buggy by the falling of a tree during a heavy wind-storm.

Winter has returned to Montreal.

A pen-knife found in the Kappelle house in Hamilton, where Constable Smith was shot, is said to have belonged to Neville, under arrest for the shooting.

According to a despatch from Toulon, the Republique du Var says that the machinery of the French submarine boat, the Circe, was recently tampered with with the object of causing a disaster.

George O. Barclay, a member of the Rochester club, died Saturday, in Philadelphia, suddenly, after an attack of appendicitis. Barclay was known as "Deerfoot" in his best days, because of his speed on the bases.

Mrs. Ida Dickinson was arrested at Baltimore for assaulting her husband. She admitted the charge, stating that he deserved it, as he had married her for better or worse, and that she got the worst of it. The magistrate dismissed the charge.

Tea dealers in the United States got stung. They feared increased duty on tea and rushed to Canada for stocks. They bought by the carload stuff that Canadian dealers were only too ready to part with. Now congress has put tea on the free list.

A romance that had its inception in a sick room at Evanston, Ill., found its culmination at Sandwich, Ill., when Alpheus L. Fry, of Jordan, a few miles from St. Catharines, married Miss Josie K. Paine. While attending the North-Western University, Mr. Fry was taken suddenly ill, and Miss Paine nursed him back to health.

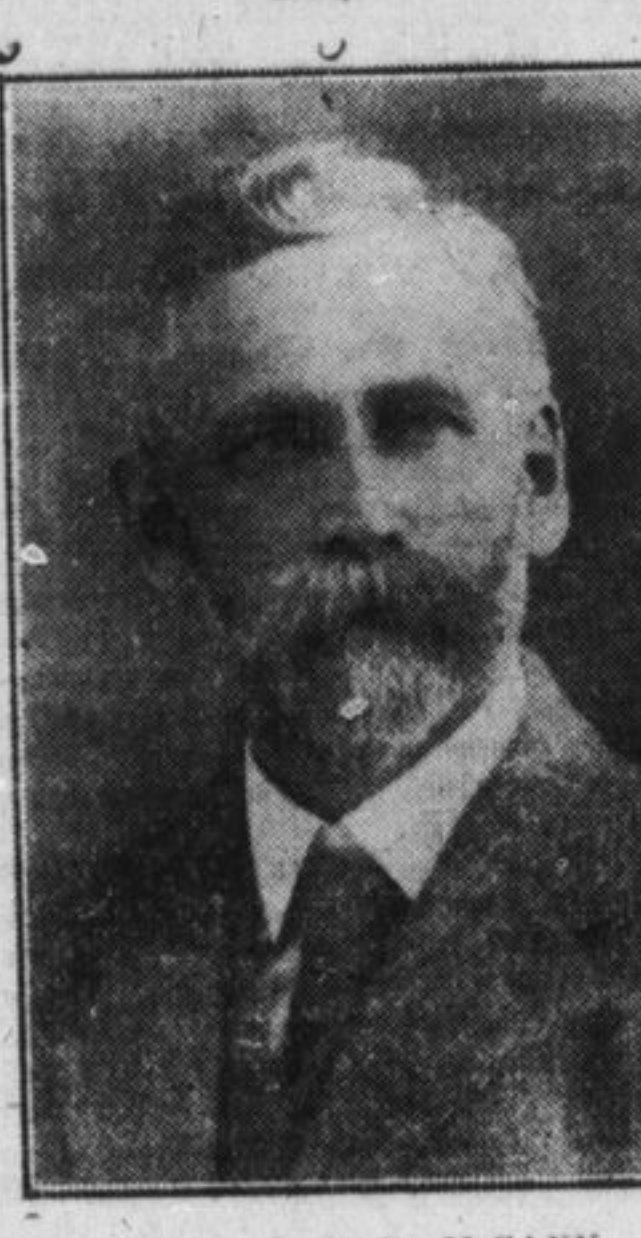

**Two Hubbies Are on the Lookout For Their Wives.**

The Grand Trunk train, which left the city at 3:19 o'clock, Thursday afternoon, carried away two married women, who cleared out without notifying their husbands or children. The women left on the west-bound train, and their present whereabouts are a mystery to their husbands. The wife of one woman said that her husband took away his money, bank books, watch and chain, and some clothes. He had no idea that she was going, and seemed very much worried over it. He said that he had never heard the slightest rumor of anything being wrong and that he gave her no reason to leave him. He said that the other deserted husband was going to sell out his furniture and get after the runaways. Both men lost considerable, in fact everything of value that was around the house was taken by the women so it is alleged. "I will follow her and get a settlement," said one husband this morning.

The police were notified, and asked to assist in locating the women.

**READY FOR ACTION.**

**If the Tribesman Should Try to Sack Town.**

St. Petersburg, April 10.—A message from Teheran, to-day, says a British cruiser, off Bushiere, in the Persian Gulf, has cleared for action preparatory to bombarding the city in the event of the Tangistini tribesmen, who are in rebellion, attempting to sack the town. Many Europeans are in Bushiere, and it is feared, the tribesmen will attempt a massacre. Marines are in readiness to land and protect the foreigners. The authorities of Bushiere have proved wholly incapable of resisting the rebels.

**Death Of Swinburne.**

London, April 10.—Algeron Charles Swinburne, the poet and essayist, who was stricken with pneumonia a few days ago, following an attack of influenza, died, this morning. He was seventy-two years old and a bachelor.
