THE EASTER MUSIC

THERE WAS A RICH VOLUME OF IT.

The Risen Christ Was the Theme of All Song—Able Did the Choirs Set-Forth His Glory and Graciousness.

Queen Street Methodist church was bright with flowers on Sunday, the first evidence of the resurrection of nature; it was fitting that the lesson should appeal on Christ's resurrection day—a bright, glad time. The congregations were good, the sermon in the morning fitting and timely and the music breathing the spirit of thanksgiving that death had no more dominion over man. The anthems were joyous and well sung by a large choir, the ladies being appropriately gowned, black hats, white waists and dark dresses. The soloists were of first order and were Miss Kathleen O'Hara, John Shea and John Marshall. During the morning service Mr. Milne, Toronto, sang, very finely, an Easter masterpiece.

Sydenham Street Church.

In Sydenham Street Methodist church special Easter services were held. The pastor, Rev. Charles A. Sykes, occupied the pulpit on both occasions. His morning theme was "The Resurrection of Christ, a Historical Fact." Mr. Sykes delivered an interesting sermon that was greatly enjoyed. The music by the choir at the service was especially fine: "O Bells in the Steeple," an Easter carol, was finely presented. The chorus, "O Praise the Lord," was also well rendered. Mrs. James Small, sang "The Lord is Risen," in her usual sweet voice. Harvey Angrove, another young Kingston vocalist, sang "Gloria." Mr. Angrove has a fine clear bass voice.

In the evening the male quartette rendered "Ashamed of Jesus." The quartette is composed of Messrs. William-Eva, Harold and Harvey Angrove and Sergt. Harriet Harold. Angrove was also a soloist at the evening service.

At Cooke's Church.

Appropriate music, in keeping with the Easteride, was rendered by the choir of Cooke's church. There were a number of fine anthems, a selection by the male quartette, composed of Messrs. Telfer, Lemmon, Smith and McLeod; a solo, "Resurrection Morn," by Mrs. J. Evans, and a duet by Mrs. Evans and Mr. Telfer, "Love Divine." The pastor preached at both the services, and there was a good attendance.

St. Andrew's Church.

The pulpit in St. Andrew's church was occupied at both services by Rev. Prof. Scott, D.D. The church was packed at the evening service, when the preacher delivered an interesting and instructing sermon, taking his text from John 11: 25, "I am the light of the world; whosoever believeth in me shall never be in darkness." The pastor preached at both the services, and there was a good attendance.

Easter At St. Paul's.

At St. Paul's church there was a special programme of music, provided by the choir. The selections included Te Deum (Sullivan), Magnificat (Bunnett), Nunc Dimittis (Bunnett), and an anthem, "Christ is Risen," taken from parts of Bible scripture. The organist displayed her well-known talent in a number of masterly pieces.

Rev. W. F. Fitzgerald, M.A., preached at both the services, and his discourses were in keeping with the day. He delivered two eloquent and forceful sermons.

At St. Mary's Cathedral.

The Queen of Festivals was observed at St. Mary's cathedral with much solemnity. At an early mass the members of various Catholic societies partook of holy communion. At 10:30 o'clock the archbishop celebrated pontifical mass. He was assisted by the priests connected with the cathedral. The choir rendered the Latin mass in an exceedingly creditable manner, the first number being the "Hae Dies." N. E. O'Connor and W. Bailey sang with much feeling "Et Incarnatus Est," in the "Credo." At the offertory the "Te igitur" was given with spirit by the choir. In the evening grand vesters were sung and the benediction of the holy sacrament imparted. N. E. DOING GOOD WORK

YOUNGWOMEN'S CHRISTIAN ASSOCIATION NEEDS HELP.

The Money Required For the Purchase Not Provided and a Floating Debt Created—Who Will Aid It?

About twenty-four years ago the Young Women's Christian association was founded for the benefit of the young women of the city. During that period it has been doing good work in a variety of ways to promote their physical, moral and spiritual well being. In this connection it may be stated that for some years it conducted the first kindergarten in Kingston, also the first sewing and domestic science classes. But it has in past years been greatly handicapped by inadequate accommodation, and has, in consequence, been obliged, frequently, to change its quarters. In 1907, when a change had again become necessary, an opportunity presented itself of securing a very eligible property for the purpose and in the hope that its enterprise would be supported by our citizens the board of that year decided to purchase the property it now occupies, trusting that, before long, a sufficient proportion of the purchase money would be subscribed to make the interest on the balance no greater than the rent formerly paid, while the site and accommodations were far superior to those for which it was now possible to rent. But notwithstanding some liberal subscriptions towards the purchase fund the interest on the balance still remains higher than the previous rent and owing to repairs, back rent and other expenses, a floating debt has been accumulated, which the present board is most anxious to wipe out, and now appeals to all interested in the well-being of the young women of Kingston to help them to set the association on a solid financial footing.

At three o'clock there was a children's service in the cathedral, the most interesting part of which, was the offering upon the altar of the Lenten boxes containing the self-denial offering. The dean addressed the scholars briefly, questioning them on the meaning of the day, and receiving prompt and good answers. Certificates were also presented to those who have passed an examination in a perfect recitation of the church catechism.

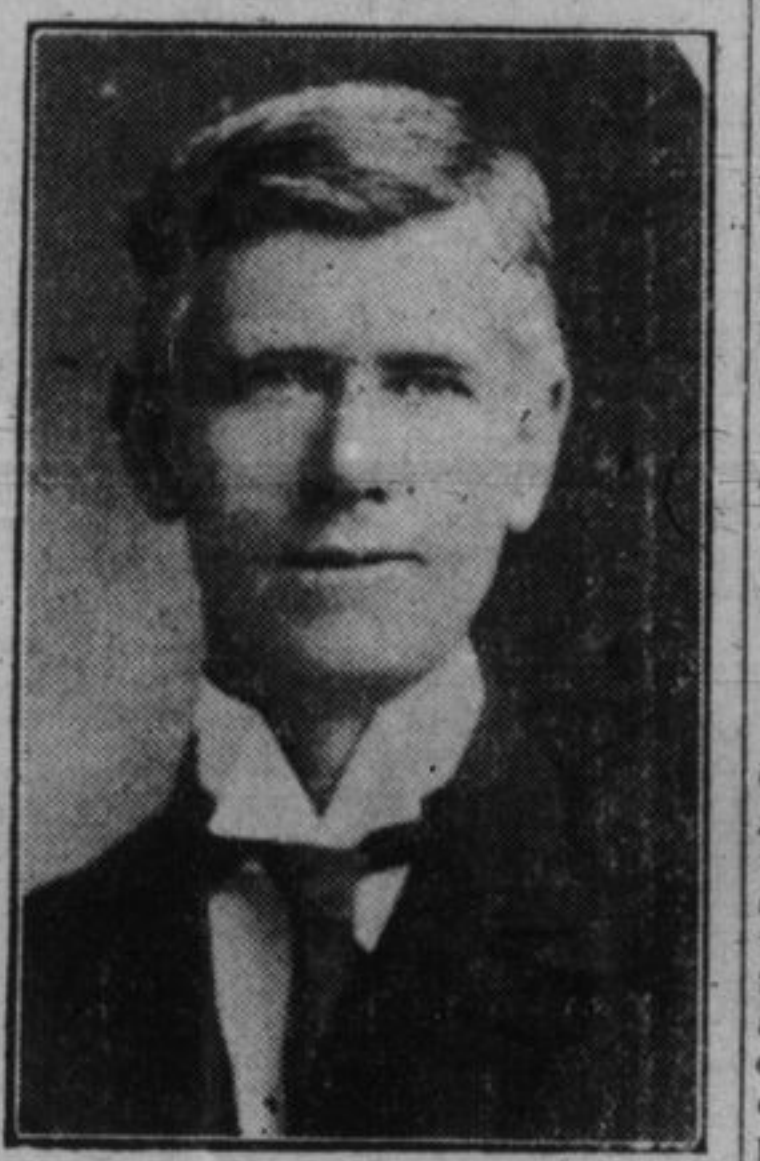
MAIL CLERK TWENTY YEARS.

TWO LAYMEN SPEAK

OF MISSIONARY ENTERPRISE

—EVANGELIZE WORLD.

Timely and well-balanced addresses were delivered in Queen Street Methodist church, Sunday evening, by Messrs. W. J. Crothers and John Nicolle, leading wholesalers, touching impressions of the National Missionary Congress, held recently in Toronto, and to which they were the church's delegates. Solid, practical and business-like were their reports, the central thought being that if God's work is to be done, then men and money must be provided, both easy of procurement if the spirit and sacrifice of Christ predominate in all hearts. It was inspiring, and far-reaching in influence, to hear men of stern business capacity proclaiming the old, but ever new story of redemption and salvation through Christ, that by the beneficent work of His grace an uplift would be given to humanity. Both recommended things, not to give as they did last year, or ten years ago, or last week, but as God prospered them. The more they gave, the more received was God's promise. System and consecration in missionary work, as in business, would result in a wide-spread gospel. Ahy did both laymen lay the cause upon the hearts of the people.

Rev. Mr. Sparring, in an impassioned address, fervid, eloquent and inspiring, and briefly, too, gave his impressions of the congress, the greatest movement of the century. Men would be lifted out of self as they studied God's word and its spread the whole world over. The laymen on leaving the church were presented with boxes of envelopes so that the systematic work of giving to the missionary cause might begin at once.

ADVICE TO YOUNG MEN.

Given By Rev. Dr. MacTavish in Sunday Sermon.

"Perhaps I am speaking to some young men who will be leaving the city in a very short time, going perhaps where they will not hear a sermon for months," said Rev. Dr. MacTavish, in Cooke's church, last night, "and in that case, I would like to give you some advice, and that is that you take your God, your Bible, and your religion with you. I the speaker said that the young men would be scattered all over the country, and he urged them to keep close to God. His discourse was an eloquent one, and was listened to with much earnestness, by the large congregation present."

Another point touched upon by Rev. Dr. MacTavish, was that some young men of to-day, did not show the respect to their parents, that they should. Children came to the city to be educated, and were afterwards ashamed of their father, because the latter perhaps lacked proper manners. The young man should not forget that it was his father who had worked and toiled hard to give him such an education, and that whatever he had received, was due to his father. Young men should not forget the old scripture "Honor thy father and thy mother."
