A GREAT SENSATION
CREATED OVER HIGH MEN
BEING ARRESTED.

Ten Members of the Diet Are Accused of Accepting Bribes and Directors of a Sugar Company Are Charged With Various Crimes.

Tokio, April 16.—A nation-wide sensation has been created by the arrest of ten members of the Soiyukai, a section of the diet, on charges of receiving bribes from the Dair Nippon Sugar company, all of whose directors are under arrest, charged with embezzlement, falsifying the company accounts and bribery. It is stated hundreds of business men and politicians will be involved before the entire affair is cleared up. The sugar company has been operating extensively and its foreign trade has been enormous, due, it is alleged, to favoritism at the hands of the officials. A grand investigation has been ordered.

POOR ARE BLACK-LISTED.

Doctors Combine to Refuse Medical Assistance.

London, April 16.—T. F. Roche, the medical officer of the Penarth district, told the Cardiff guardians recently, that impecunious patients were black-listed and boycotted by a combination of the junior practitioners at Penarth.

"I am told," he said in a letter, "that there are from 600 to 700 poor families already on this list. These cannot get a visit from a local doctor without first producing 3s. 6d., and it is part of the system that if on the first visit the case is likely to overtax the patient's capability to keep on finding ready money, the 3s. 6d. is to be handed back and the case declined altogether."

The result, said Mr. Roche, was that he was overwhelmed with patients as poor law medical officer, and he asks the advice of the board as to what he shall do in the future.

DESTROY COUNTRY.

There is Increased Activity of Mount Etna.

Palermo, April 16.—The complete destruction of the country around Mount Etna is threatened, to-day, as a result of the increased activity of the volcano. Inhabitants of the neighborhood have been warned to flee for their lives. Showers of cinders are falling for miles around and there is much uneasiness regarding the safety of several parties of scientists, who have been exploring both Mount Etna and Stromboli, the latter also being active again.

A Merchant Shot.

Elmira, N.Y., April 16.—Joseph McCann, one of Elmira's best known business men and one of the leading meat dealers of the southern tier, was shot down on the street, in the centre of the city, this morning, while on his way to his store. Two bullets entered his body. He was taken to the hospital and is not expected to live. His assailant is supposed to have been Raymond Gill, a young man who had been employed by Mr. McCann and who had been dismissed because of alleged short-ages in his accounts.

THE KINRADE CASE

THERE WILL BE NO RESUMPTION OF INQUEST.

Before the Date Fixed at the Last Adjournment—The Crown Has Been Busy in Virginia Recently.

Hanilton, Ont., April 16.—Statements that the Kinrade murder inquest will be resumed before the scheduled date, April 22nd, are without foundation, according to Coroner Anderson, who will not be held until that date and son. The coroner says the inquest he adds that he is completely in the dark as to the line of evidence to be adduced. All the crown officials profess complete ignorance of what will be doing, but it is thought, here, that the crown will have a surprise to spring.
Agents of the attorney-general's department have been working hard in Virginia and it is expected that something new may be brought to light in this connection but the authorities absolutely refuse to discuss the case.

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AT ROYAL MILITARY COLLEGE

Soiree of the "Cercle de l'Alliance Francaise."

A large number of guests assembled at the Royal Military College, Thursday evening, invited by the college branch of the French Alliance, to an entertainment. The programme was: Opening address, Cadet Crerar; song, "L'Inventeur," Cadet Smith; song, "La Carriante," Cadet Monk; comedy (in one act), "Le Cavalier Piache," Cadet Goldie de Lothbier; Mortimer, Wilnot, J. Dansereau, Symons; song, "Les Montagnards," Cadet Parker; recitation, "La Conscience," Sergt. L. Dansereau; monologue, "Un Francais en Ecosse," Cadet MacPherson; address, Prof. Lanos; song, "O Canada," Le Cercle; Dieu Sauve le Roi.
The play, which was the "Pieces de Resistance," was very successful and kept the audience in fits of laughter. Both de Lothbier, as "Madame Chapuzet," and Dansereau, as the respectable and fraudulent "Cavalier," showed unusual dramatic powers and their flirtation, while it left nothing to be desired, provided a good deal to be avoided. The fair audience was very envious of the beauty and toilette of "Helen" (Wilnot), and it was observed that the superb uniform of a French lieutenant was used to some effect by Mortimer to captivate his admirer both during and after the play.
Goldie, as "M. Chapuzet," and Symons, as the "hired girl," both carried out their difficult parts excellently. The latter is, it is understood, open to an engagement.
Cadet Crerar's address narrated the work of the "Cercle" during the past year, which has mainly consisted in discussions of subjects of wide interest. The secretary, (Cadet L. Dansereau) again manifested his uncommon ability as a rhetorician. An Anglo-Saxon would find it difficult to immerse himself in his part so wonderful an extent.
The intricate machine which Smith brought on the stage with him, undoubtedly justified his adulatory account of it.
MacPherson's efforts to explain the "atmosphere" he "created" in order to succeed with the lassies of Scotland were a fine tribute to the race he had been called upon to lineal at twenty-four hours' notice.
M. Lanos, the delegate of the "Cercle" to the Alliance Francaise, surprised the president, Major Morley, by an address with which he accompanied the presentation of a medal from Paris in recognition of the latter's services to the club during the past four years. The medal was then handed to Major Morley by Cadet Crasset, the vice-president, whose efforts to convey his sentiments were as unsuccessful as were those of the hapless recipient.
After the entertainment supper was served, followed by a dance. Mrs. Lanos was kind enough to receive the guests on behalf of the College Cercle.
