### HOME FROM ENGLAND.

James A. Minnes and H. W. Richardson Have Returned.

James A. Minnes, of the wholesale drygoods firm of Minnes & Minnes, returned home on Saturday morning, after six weeks' absence in the old country. He visited the various large centres in England, Ireland and Scotland, and also Paris, in behalf of his business house. This was Mr. Minnes' twelfth trip across the ocean.

To a Whig representative he stated that the business conditions were very good in the old country. The prices in woollens and linens were stiffening, and cotton prices were also picking up. There had been quite a depression in the cotton market lately. Paris is where Mr. Minnes purchases his firm's dress goods.

The patriotic and unexpected offer of New Zealand to give a warship to the British navy caused great enthusiasm in England. Mr. Minnes said, the message of the Canadian parliament, on the matter of naval defence, and the general opinion was that Canada could always be counted upon to be at the right hand of the motherland when danger threatened the empire.

H. W. Richardson was with Mr. Minnes to and from England. They went over on the S.S. Celtic and returned on the S.S. Empress of Britain, landing at St. John, N.B. Mr. Richardson's trip was principally for a rest and change, but he visited his grain firm's agents in Britain and Europe.

### WOULD COST MUCH MONEY

To Connect the Dead Ends of the Water Mains.

To connect the waterworks dead-end mains throughout the city would cost a great deal of money, and it is doubtful if the \$13,000 balance of rest fund would cover the cost. Superintendent Hewitt, when asked to-day, how many dead-ends there were, stated that there were more than one would imagine. He produced a plan showing that they extended all over the city. To connect some of them would mean excavating distances of 600 to 700 feet, and in places there was much rock to be encountered.

It might be advisable, the superintendent said, to connect some of the downtown dead-ends in order to secure a better fire supply of water, but under present conditions there would be no increased revenue to the waterworks department. Mr. Hewitt stated that the department had quite sufficient pumping power for domestic supply.

If the water supply was to be increased, more engine power would sooner or later be required.

### UNDERGROUND FOOTPATHS.

Beneath Champs Elysees, Where Motor Cars Pass.

Underground passages for pedestrians are to be built at various points along the Champs Elysees, Paris, which the constant stream of motor cars now renders impassable from morning till evening. The congestion of other Paris streets also has brought to an alarming extent, and all thoroughfares round the Opera are blocked up by the traffic for hours, and afternoons.
