TURNED TO GERMANY.

Asking the Kaiser to Save His Throne.

Constantinople, via Philippopolis, April 20.—The sultan has turned to Germany in his hour of trouble, and is asking assistance from the Kaiser to save his throne.

Hold The Forts.

Constantinople, April 20.—All the forts surrounding Constantinople from the Sea of Marmora to the Black Sea are now occupied by the constitutional troops and the soldiers supporting the Young Turks.

Proclaimed Emperor.

Berlin, April 20.—A despatch to the Lokal Anzeiger, from Constantinople, says it is rumored Mohammed Rechal Effendi, the heir apparent to the throne, has been proclaimed sultan at Salonica.

Resigned Offices.

Constantinople, April 20.—Tewfik Pasha, the grand vizier, Edhem Pasha, the minister of war, and Nazim Pasha, representing the feroce in the capital, sent their resignations to the sultan last night.

Thousands Massacred.

Constantinople, April 20.—No less than 5,000 persons lost their lives in the massacres that have been going on in the Vilayet of Pasha for the last three days.

It is expected that a strike of the sailors on the great lakes will be ordered.

The form of the provincial license for temperance hotels will soon be approved.

Ten freight cars were thrown off the railway track near Port Credit, the damage totalling \$1,000.

Owing to the break-up of the roads the post office will only accept letters for delivery at Gowanus and district points.

Two hundred lady teachers arrived at Guelph to take a three months' course in the Ontario Agricultural College.

A note found among the papers of John Davidson, the missing Scottish poet, indicates that he has committed suicide.

The population of Winnipeg, about which there has been so much speculation, is placed at 122,500 by the assessor.

Rev. Father Collins, parish priest of Brantford, Ont., died Monday afternoon after a brief illness of cancer, in his fifty-third year.

Aylmer, Que., decided to renew all six of its hotel licenses, despite the fact that the number exceeds that allowed by law in proportion to population.

Frederick A. Lee, the defaulting teller of the Northern Crown Bank, Saskatoon, arrested in Los Angeles, has arrived at Winnipeg. He waived extradition.

Edward Meiler, who made a specialty of swindling clergymen and has recently been working in Westmount, had struck a snag, was convicted and goes to jail for a year.

The Hamburg American liner Amerika, en route from New York to Hamburg, is ashore off Altonbruch, near the mouth of the Elbe. It is not believed she is in any danger.

A boathouse at Ward's Island, belonging to Frank Ward, was burned on Tuesday morning, together with Toronto city's lifeboat and two ice boats. The loss is about \$2,000.

The duties formerly performed by commissioner of Rights J. F. Fraser, recently dismissed, are to be permanently taken over by J. G. McPhail, of the marine department.

W. J. Anderson, of the Bank of Montreal, Ottawa, for the past seven years, and in the service of the bank since March 1st, 1859, is retiring at the end of this month on pension.

A. M. Lewis, who acted for a Toronto hotelman in the action to upset the Toronto license law, announces that an application will be made to-morrow to carry the case to the court of appeal.

It is too late for the passenger steamship line to get the proposed new insurance plan working this year, the meeting for discussion of the project has accordingly gone over until June.

At Hamilton, Ont., Police Magistrate felt, made a record, this morning, by imposing a fine of ten cents on J. O. Rickman, charged with assaulting Henry Webb. The assault was a trivial affair.

Toronto railway made another fine earnings record last week, reporting an increase on only one day and gains exceeding \$1,700 daily on three days. Total earnings were \$71,635, an "increase for the week of \$8,297."

At Norwood, Ont., the barn and sheds of the King hotel, with contents, consisting of hay, grain, one horse, one cow, and two dogs, were totally destroyed by fire on Monday night. The loss is partly covered by insurance.

At Woodstock, Ont., P. J. E. Dugit, deputy registrar of Oxford for twenty years, while temporarily insane, committed suicide in his office on Tuesday morning. He was found dead with a leather surgeon's pen knife through his heart.

At the conference of the Roman Catholic archbishops of Canada in Ottawa, the matters to be considered will be mostly those relating to discipline and kindred affairs. The delegates will be reported to Rome and will not be announced for perhaps a year.

Five thousand bales of cotton, estimated in value about \$250,000, were burned, Tuesday morning, in a fire, which for several hours threatened to destroy the plant of the St. Louis Compress company, Little Rock, Ark., valued with its contents, at about \$1,000,000.

This month in immigration to the North-West, North Dakota leads with three thousand, Michigan, Iowa and Minnesota twelve hundred each, Illinois and South Dakota eight hundred each. The average is two hundred a day from the south, excluding children.

Elizabeth Davis, a middle-aged woman, was arrested at Richmond, Ont., Monday and brought to county jail, charged with bigamy. It is claimed she was married twenty years ago to Charles Davis, who is still alive, that ten years ago she was married to Frederick Rogers, and that last February she was married to Martin Cronk Wright with whom she was living when arrested.

She is the daughter of Alex. Brown, a millionaire Baltimore banker. As she is his sole heir, at his death she will come in for several times the amount of her dot. The wedding was most elaborate.

The bride wore a gown of white satin trimmed with point lace that had been worn by her grandmother, and her lace veil, also an heirloom, was held in place by a diamond horseshoe, the gift of her sister, Mrs. B. Howell Griswold, jun. Her jewels were a comb of amber set with diamonds and a diamond barrette, the gifts of the bridegroom, and her engagement ring, an immense solitaire. She carried a white prayerbook, from which fell a single shower of orange blossoms.

WANTED TO CELEBRATE.

Canadian Raised Union Jack at Pittsfield, Mass.

Pittsfield, Mass., April 20.—There was almost a riot at "The Kilowatt," a boarding-house for Stanley electrical engineers on North street, yesterday, when "Jack" Islesworth, a Canadian, hoisted the Union Jack over the Stars and Stripes.

A school teacher, Miss Margaret Riley, who notified it first, notified the police, who told the engineers to place the flag right. In fifteen minutes a hundred persons threatened to tear down the British flag. Islesworth got busy and hoisted it down but only after a threat was made to Capt. John Nicholson, to call out the militia. The Canadian said he wanted to help celebrate Patriots' day.

FALSELY ACCUSED.

This is What the Wife Says About Affair.

Port Huron, Mich., April 20.—"It was a quarrel three years old," said Mrs. Ralph Pringle, speaking of the trouble between herself and her husband which culminated, Sunday morning, in Capt. Pringle shooting to death George B. McKinnon, Moorestown, at St. Clair, Mich. "My husband had no reason to be jealous, but he accused me, and for three years could not forget his suspicions. I had never even seen McKinnon for a year."

When Pringle was arraigned, Monday, he stood mute. He will be examined April 23rd. An inquest will be held, Coroner Falk deeming one necessary. The body of McKinnon has been turned over to relatives and will be buried, today, at Moorestown.

Lots Of Soft Coal At Duluth.

Duluth, April 20.—It is conservatively estimated that 2,000,000 tons of coal are on the docks here at the present time. Some of the largest coal receivers here do not expect to receive any more soft coal for two months.
