LIVELY PICTON TOWN

TOOK AWAY BUSINESS FROM NAPANEE.

Inspector Devlin Criticized Over a Deportation Matter—What the Liquor License Commissioners Did.

Pictou, April 22.—If the opinion, officially, of the board of trade is to be taken as evidence of the thoughts of Pictouians, generally, then Pictou favors the passing of the daylight bill now being aired in the federal house. M. Y. McLean, M.P., for South Huron chairman of the committee which has the bill in hand and who, by the way is an uncle of P. C. McLean, editor of the Times, wrote asking the opinion of the board of trade, and at the annual meeting held Tuesday night, the bill was approved of with unanimity. J. de C. Hepburn, last year's vice, was made this year's president. I. F. Fraser was elected vice-president, and P. C. Macneil re-elected secretary.

Pictou merchants are very anxious to hold the trade with the Adolphus town shore which was taken away from Napanee when the Glenora ferry was established. Many, however, object to the high bonus paid the ferryman, and it is now proposed to put a steamer on the Crescy to Pictou route. Hepburn Bros. are willing to do this. If they are given a bonus of \$350 for five years. They have secured a six days' option on a Brockville steamer, a little larger than the steamer Reindeer. A committee from the board of trade is now canvassing the town merchants in the attempt to raise the money needed.

When Minkler, a Greenbush farmer, was fined \$10 for drinking after he had been listed, he told the court that his brother-in-law, Lighthall, had given him the wet stuff. Yesterday, however, his evidence on this score was rather conflicting and Lighthall's case was dismissed by Magistrate Currie. The same thing happened to J. Hudgin, who was said to have furnished "Tom" Tober with spirits after his name had been put with the other prohibited ones. Inspector Saxsmith has over 100 names in his "Indian" book.

If Inspector Devlin, government emigration officer, was in town just at present he would have some pretty plain talk directed to his ears. It would come from charitably-disposed persons, all of whom are pretty much incensed at treatment that six English families have received. These half dozen families, of some thirty persons, made application to be deported. All necessary was done to this end. Inspector Devlin came to town and told the families to be ready to leave on a day's notice, and they rid themselves of their possessions, limited at best. For two weeks now these families have slept on the floor and there have been instances of illness. One family was stoveless until one was procured by charity. Rev. W. L. Armitage has drawn the attention of his congregation to this "most acute case of need" and a committee of men are taking the matter up with the department, at Ottawa, seeking the immediate deportation of these destitute people.

The license commissioners are rather inclined to secrecy since their meeting of Saturday. The Queen's Globe, Royal and Pictou hotels were all given a renewal of their licenses. That of the Quinte was held in abeyance, pending a meeting of the creditors of the hotel. The retail liquor business of the Williams must close up and the commissioners have given three months' notice to this effect. The Teemseh must make some improvements before the license will be extended, it is understood.

CABINET RESIGNS.

Francis Joseph Asks Count Andrassy to Act.

Budapest, April 22.—The Hungarian cabinet resigned yesterday and the emperor king, Francis Joseph, has asked Count Andrassy, minister of the interior, to form a new cabinet.

The resignation of the ministry of Premier Wekerle is due to internal divergencies of opinion which have resulted in the breaking up of the coalition of political parties, by which the premier was supported in his efforts to secure the establishment of a Hungarian state bank independent of the existing Austrian State banking system.

The Colonist, of Victoria, publishes a false telegram from R. L. Borden. Typographical error.

The Mayes affidavit gives the date 1907 instead of 1905. Typographical error.

The report of the Landry commission prints \$430,000 instead of \$43,000. Typographical error.

It is a singular thing that these typographical errors never occur except to the detriment of the advocates of those who commit them, and the worst of it is that these gentlemen do not give the same publicity to the correction as they did to the error.

It requires no cleverness for the average politician to be rude, but it does call for skill to "pink" an opponent without soiling his coat. The commonsense will make a capital mistake if it forgets what is due in civility, courtesy and gentlemanly behavior to a British parliament. They should not require the speaker to keep order with a megaphone, but should observe the British practice of quieting at his first word. There is something in the fact that a parliament should be a "gentleman's club." At all events, every member of parliament, should strive to act like a gentleman while he is in the chamber.

Even in Port Arthur and Fort William, where all public utilities are owned and operated by the municipalities, there is grave dissatisfaction with the present methods and results. The people are talking seriously of government by commission and of leasing the joint street railway to a private company. All this simply proves that municipal success is as difficult of attainment as private and personal success. Every form of human enterprise seems to have its difficulties.

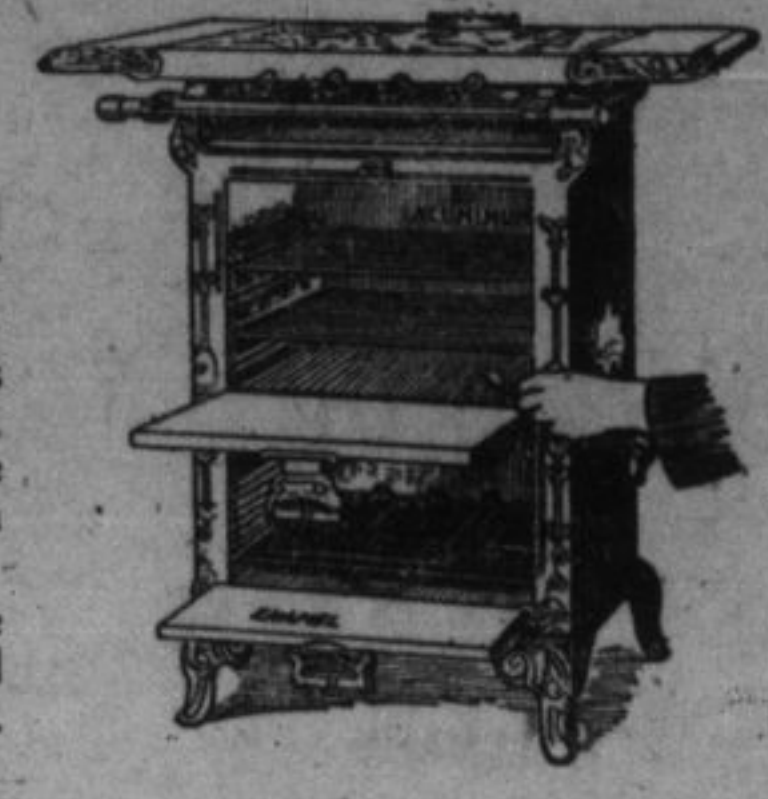
