Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations.

ANY PERSON WHO IS THE SOLE head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section (100 acres, more or less) of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency, Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

DUTIES.—Six months' residence upon cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section along-side his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Purchased homesteads may be acquired on any available lands on either odd or even numbered Sections South of township 45, East of the Calgary and Edmonton Railways and the West line of range 26, and West of the third Meridian and the Sault Ste. Marie line. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.

WEST MINING REGULATIONS.

COAL.—Coal mining rights may be leased for twenty-one years at an annual rental of \$1.00 an acre. Not more than 2,500 acres can be leased to one applicant. Royalty, five cents per ton.

QUARTZ.—A person eighteen years of age and over having made a discovery may locate a claim 1,500 feet by 1,500 feet. Fee, \$5.00. At least \$100 must be expended on the claim each year, or paid to the Mining Recorder. When \$500 has been expended or paid and other requirements complied with the claim may be purchased at \$1.00 an acre.

PLACER MINING CLAIMS generally, 100 feet square. Entry fee, \$5.00.

DREDGING.—Two leases of five miles each, of a river may be issued to one applicant for a term of 20 years. Rental, \$10 a mile per annum. Royalty, 25 per cent after the output exceeds \$10,000.

A NEW EXPLOSIVE

THE FENBERG STOCK CO. TO-NIGHT "THE HAWK AND THE DOVE"

Only Three Ounces Used—Shock of Explosive, Which Was Three Miles Away, Shook Buildings in City.

Evansville, Ind., April 30.—By pressing the key of a wireless apparatus, Charles Williams, aged eighteen, caused an explosion to take place three miles away. The blast was of such strength that it shook buildings in the city.

Young Williams is the inventor of both the wireless apparatus by which the explosion was caused, and the explosive, which is a new kind of powder, the making of which is his secret.

He says the new explosive is forty times as strong as dynamite, and that with his apparatus he can cause an explosion as far away as Chicago. The blast that shook the city last night took only three ounces of the explosive. Williams says he has entered into negotiations with government officials at Washington, with a view of selling his inventions.

The explosive was put in the top of an old tree, above the city, and the inventor then went back to his home and worked his wireless apparatus to cause the explosion.

PITH OF THE NEWS.

The Very Latest Culled From All Over The World.

Albert E. Segsworth, a former Toronto man, died at Washington, D.C. The Lake Superior Corporation will spend a million dollars on improving and adding to the plant at the Soo.

A despatch from Sydney, N.S., says four children were burned to death at Glace Bay, C.B., early on Friday, no details are given.

The steamer Phillip Mitch, with 320,000 bushels of grain consigned to the Grand Trunk elevator, Sprin, has arrived from Fort William.

The Dominion Iron and Steel company has received an order from the Great Northern Railway company, of England, for 5,000 tons of steel rails.

A generous citizen of Hamilton, who does not wish his name to appear, has offered to give \$5,000 towards the building of a boys' department in a new Y.M.C.A. building.

Theodore Roosevelt is about to leave the ranch of Sir Alfred Pease, on the Athl. river, for a point in the Mau Hills, near Machakos, where he hopes to bag a lion.

F. A. Acland, deputy minister of labor, is in Montreal in an effort to settle the cotton operatives' difficulty.

The Dominion Textile company has applied for a board of conciliation, and the men are willing.

Japan's Great Sinking Fund. The 28th August, 1908, placed a white stone in the history of Japanese finance. On that day the Katsura cabinet decided to lay aside every year at least 50,000,000 yen (\$25,000,000) for the purpose of paying off the principal of the national debt.

The minimum amount of 110,000,000 yen, provided in the national debt consolidation fund referred to above, allows not more over 25,000,000 or 30,000,000 yen for the principal. Therefore, the Katsura programme of laying aside 50,000,000 yen a year would raise the amount in no long degree.

If this policy be followed every year our war-debt will be redeemed very much sooner than the time specified—namely, thirty years. As a matter of fact, it speaks well for Japanese finance that in the very hottest period of the debt charge 151,183,514 yen in 1906-7, 174,390,457 yen in 1907-8 and 176,839,532 yen in 1908-9 in each case a much greater amount than the 110,000,000 yen planned.
