OCCURRENCES RECORDED IN BRIEF FORM.

Matters That Interest Everybody—Notes From All Over—Little of Everything Easily Read and Remembered.

An educational congress for French-Canadians is proposed for Ottawa in September.

The Presbyterian women of Canada raised \$72,245 for missions during the past year.

Seventy-seven persons were killed by automobiles in New York during the past twelve months.

At Berlin Emma Cooper, a widow, aged thirty-six years, committed suicide by drinking carbolic acid.

The police commissioners, Toronto, propose to assume absolute control of street parades and processions.

Allan Stuart, convicted of theft, escaped from the Oshawa lock-up by tearing up a portion of the floor.

The city of London's right to enter into a contract with the Hydro-Electric Power Commission is upheld.

The emperor and empress of Russia will pay a visit to Brest, on board the imperial yacht Polar Star, in June.

Six prizes will be given for the six best essays on the question of physical training and military drill in the schools.

Five hundred pianos and nearly ten thousand revolvers have been found in the Vildiz Kiosk, the palace of the deposed sultan.

The Berlin police administration, convinced that many crimes can be best traced by women, is establishing a corps of women detectives.

The Atikokan iron mines, west of Port Arthur, which have been shut down for about eighteen months, are to be opened again immediately.

Rev. Dr. Armstrong will shortly announce his pastoral resignation to give all his attention to the principalship of Ottawa Ladies' College.

Toronto citizens waited upon the Ontario government, this morning, and urged a substantial grant for the establishment of a provincial museum.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier will move that the house of commons sit on Saturdays until the end of the session.

The Guelph Ministerial Association has passed a resolution condemning large hats worn by women, and requesting that they be removed in church.

At Nelson, B.C., the grand jury returned a "no bill" in the case of Lord Shelto Douglas, charged with shooting with intent to kill J. B. Rowlands.

At Stratford, Ont., Frank Roghmond is on trial at the assizes, for the murder of Mrs. William Peake, of the township of Downie, in September last.

Seven men were killed and four others were fatally injured in dynamite explosion near Nimrod, Mont. A steam shovel, upon which they were working, struck a charge, exploding it.

Prof. F. H. Brown, principal of East Syracuse, N.Y., high school, dropped dead in his wife's arms, on Wednesday morning, just as he was opening the school, from heart disease.

Dr. Elliott Villazon, first vice-president of the Bolivia republic, was elected president to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Ferdinand Guachalla, who was killed last May.

Arthur H. McBride, New Westminster, father of Premier McBride, and one of the early pioneers of British Columbia, died suddenly, Tuesday morning. The late Mr. McBride was seventy-three years of age.

W. W. Ramsay, former president of the German National bank, Pittsburgh Pa., convicted of bribery, was, on Wednesday, sentenced to eighteen months at the Western penitentiary, and to pay a fine of \$1,000.

All the protests in the province of Quebec in connection with the dominion elections have been dropped and the members of the house of commons from the province of Quebec, both liberal and conservative, will be left undisturbed in their seats.

Local Victorian Nursing. Miss Hulse, local Victorian Order nurse, reports that during April she attended ten cases. Of these, four were Methodist, three Roman Catholic, two Anglican and one Presbyterian. Fees collected amounted to \$9.75.

Donations of clothing and provisions were received from the executors of the late Miss Gildersleeve, and from Miss Strange, Mrs. John Norris and Mrs. P. H. Stover.

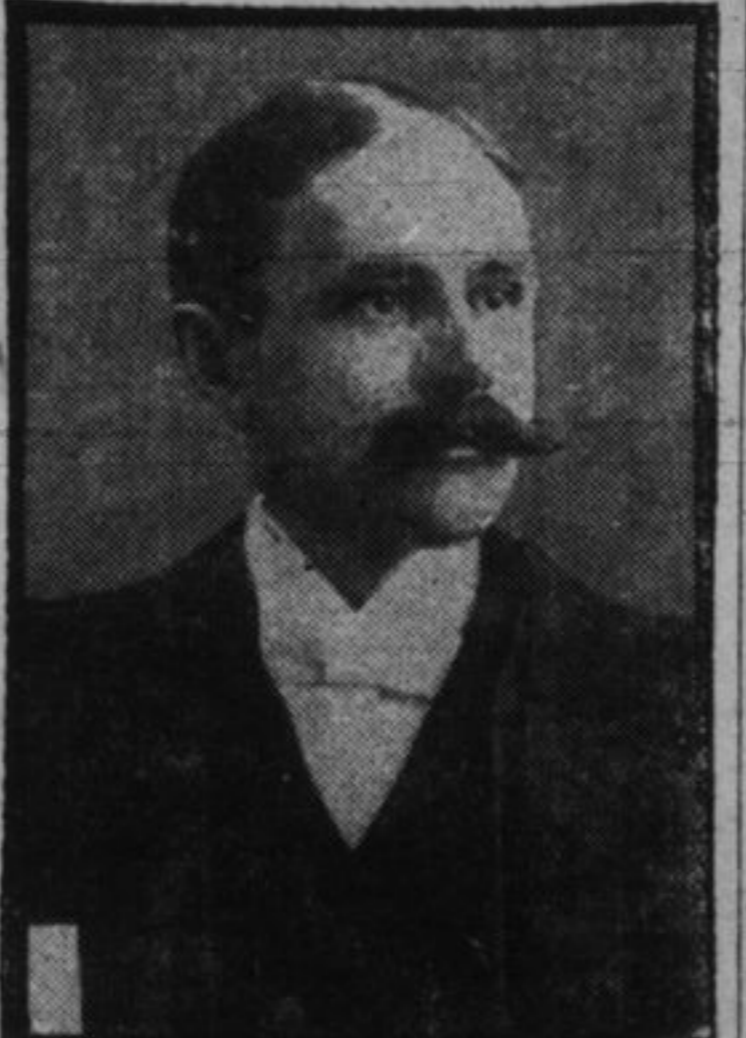
