TOOK PRECEDENCE

HIS OATH AS MASON TOOK FIRST PLACE.

Ho Would Not Injure a Brother Mason—Some Things Disclosed at the Montreal Enquiry.

Montreal, May 7.—The inquiry in connection with the police station was brought before the Royal Commission, Judge Cannon, to-day. A side-light on the situation was furnished by Fred. Lectaire, the theatrical man, who, yesterday, told about the \$1,000 commission Pierre Pelicier was to pay Aid. Proulx, chairman of the police committee, when the Lectaire property was sold to the city for a police station. Fred. Lectaire was recalled and told the commission that he was a Freemason, a member of Coeurs Unis lodge, and that his oath as a Freemason took precedence with him, when testifying, or in other words he would not injure a brother Mason. A number of experts were called with reference to the value of the property and there was a good deal of conflicting testimony, some claiming that the price was too high and others that it was not.

DISASTROUS PRAIRIE FIRES.

Four of Family in Critical Condition.

Swift Current, Man., May 7.—A disastrous prairie fire has raged about forty miles north the last two days. A family named Klein were burned out and four of them are in a critical condition. A child perished in the flames. South about twenty-five miles the entire township is burned over and only a few thousand acres of pasture left. The fire started from a German village. Johannes Hadick, aged sixty-four, a Hollander, out fighting the flames, can't be found. Mounted police are so busy prosecuting fire cases that they cannot attend to all complaints. Sergt. Bottley's men are played out. Hay is scarce and now settlers are deprived of pasture.

OSLER ATTENDS EX-NURSE

Delays Visit to Brother—Hasten to Bedside.

Baltimore, Md., May 7.—Dr. William Osler, the noted physician, on arriving in New York last week, on his annual trip to visit his brother in Canada, learned that Mrs. Eugene L. Opie, whom he had, before her marriage, often called in as nurse in his most delicate cases, was ill at his home in Larchmont. He immediately changed his plans and hastened to the bedside of Mrs. Opie, who was being attended by Drs. J. M. L. Finney and Howard A. Kelly, two of the leading surgeons of Hopkins hospital staff. The three physicians worked hard, but to no avail.

ONE OF GORDON'S VETERANS

Committed Suicide After Bird-Let Him.

New York, May 7.—Inquiries concerning the identity of George P. Armstrong, who was found dead in his cottage in East Rutherford, N.J., a suicide from gas, indicate that he was formerly a captain in the British Royal Artillery, and had won a medal for gallantry for service under Gordon in the Sudan, and had carried him self off with credit in India. His suicide followed the departure of his bride for New York, Friday evening, although her relatives in Brooklyn said last night that her absence from him was to have been only temporary. They were married only on April 17th last.

FRAUDULENT WEIGHING.

Employee Accused of Manipulating Scales.

New York, May 7.—Criminal proceedings as an outgrowth of the government's suit against the American Sugar Refining company, which resulted in disclosures of wholesale underweighing of sugar imports, were begun by the federal authorities, yesterday. Thomas Kehoe, for many years a checker on the docks of the company in Brooklyn, was placed under arrest, charged with being one of the men who took part in fraudulent manipulation of the scales, as a result of which the American Sugar Refining company recently paid to the government \$2,134,000 in back duties.

OBJECT TO LAND GRANT.

The Western Liberals Prefer a Cash Grant.

Ottawa, May 7.—The western liberal object to the proposed land grant, decided that they would not support the request from Winnipeg for a grant of 250,000 acres of federal lands in the west, to be devoted to financing the world's fair and Selkirk Centennial celebration at Winnipeg in 1912. They believe in adhering strictly to the government policy of the land for the settler only, and will support instead a proposition for a liberal cash subsidy for the exhibition.

Killed in Adana.

Adana, Asiatic Turkey, April 28, via Constantinople, May 6.—Rev. Stephen R. Trowbridge, a missionary of the American board of commissioners for foreign missions, estimates the number of Armenians killed in the province of Adana since the outbreak of the anti-Christian riots at 23,000.

TOO MANY HOLIDAYS.

Russian Will Try to Eliminate Twenty-Eight.

St. Petersburg, May 7.—Contending that Russia suffers from too many holidays, the council of empire has entrusted to a special commission a bill which would eliminate twenty-eight of the annual holidays. There are at present ninety-one public holidays in Russia, including Sundays, the celebration of which is declared to involve an annual expense of a billion dollars. Many of the holidays fall upon the season of work in the fields and it is said that this is one reason why agriculturalists are so backward in this country.

No Packers' Combine.

Ottawa, May 7.—In parliament, to a question by Mr. Seasmith, Peterboro, as to the existence of a packers' combine, which kept down the price for hogs to the farmers, Hon. Mr. Fisher said a year ago he had an investigation made, and found that the Canadian packers were apparently paying or Canadian hogs as much as they reasonably could, and realize a fair profit on the finished bacon they sold in England in competition with the world. It had been found that there seemed to be a larger profit realized through the sale of bacon in Canada. That profit was distributed between the factory and the retailer somewhere, but who was taking it could not be determined.

Welland, Ont., May 7.—William Gilmore's barn, near here, was struck by lightning and burned with contents. The stock was saved. There is some insurance.

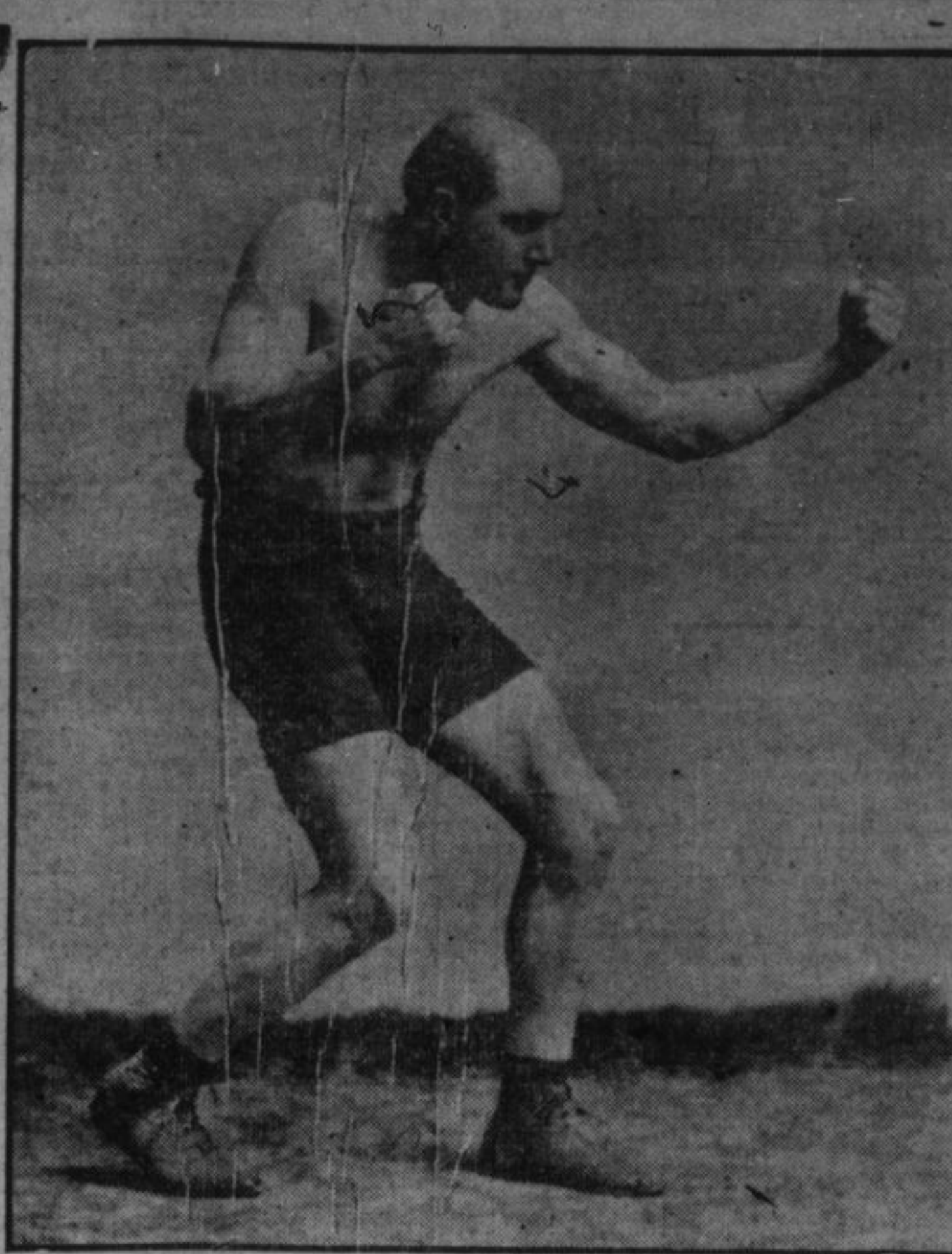

INDIAN CONSPIRATORS

EIGHTEEN SENTENCED IN COURT AT ALIPUR.

Were Found Guilty of Taking Part in An Anarchist Plot—Two Condemned to Death, Ten to Transportation For Life. Calcutta, May 7.—Sentences were handed down in the court of Alipur, a suburb of Calcutta, in the cases of the thirty-five natives who were arrested here last summer, charged with complicity in the Anarchist conspiracy of May, 1908. Two of the men were condemned to death, ten to transportation for life, three to transportation for ten years, three to transportation for seven years, while seventeen were acquitted. Ashutosh Biswas, a public prosecutor, who was engaged in the conduct of these cases, was shot dead in the Alipur court last February.

Think This Over.

"The average educated man gets a salary of \$1,000 per year. He works forty years, making a total of \$40,000 in a lifetime. The average day-laborer gets \$1.50 per day, 300 days in the year, or \$450 in a year. In forty years he earns \$18,000. The difference, or \$22,000, equals the value of an education. To acquire this earning capacity requires twelve years at school of 180 days each, or 2,160 days. Divide \$22,000 by the value of an education, by \$160, number of days required in getting it, we find that each day at school is worth a little more than \$10 to a pupil. Can't afford to miss school, can we?—Supt. Adams, of Fayette, Ohio, College.

More Than An Officer Could Stand.

Boston Herald. There is a man, who served as a special police officer in a suburban town for several years but never made an arrest. A few days ago the keeper of the lock-up was much surprised to have this officer bring in a man in a helpless state of inebriety. "Why, Bill," said the keeper, "how is this? You have been an officer nine years and this is your first arrest." "That is true, Dan," said the officer, "I have taken many persons home when intoxicated rather than bring them here, but when a man gets drunk and lies down on the lawn in front of my house and goes to sleep, that's more than I can or will stand."

Big Hydro Scheme In France.

France is considering an enormous hydro-electric undertaking. The plan is to dam the Rhone below the rapids some thirteen miles from the Swiss frontier and utilize the water in a fall of 220 feet. The entire upper valley of the Rhone would thus be formed into a long, narrow lake. The plant would generate 240,000 kilowatts, half of which would be transmitted to Paris, about 280 miles distant, at a tension of 120,000 volts. It is estimated that the work would cost about \$16,000,000 and could be completed in seven years' time.

Keeping The Hands.

Keep at hand a jar of oatmeal or cornmeal, and after washing the hands with soap and warm water, rub the meal thoroughly over the hands. A cake of pumice stone will take off obstinate spots. If the hands are wrinkled from long immersion in water dip them into vinegar before washing them. Dry every part of the hands carefully on a soft towel and rub in any healing lotion or cream that you find agrees with your skin.

Training For Boys And Girls.

Miss Kate Gordon, of New Orleans, is president of the Juvenile Court circle, is leading a movement to establish a state industrial school, providing manual training for boys and girls. She proposes a tax of 75c on every \$1,000 to pay the expenses. The women taxpayers of Louisiana, who have a right to vote on all questions relating to taxation, have pretty generally let it be known that they are willing to pay their share to establish the school.

Two-Thirds Right.

PITH OF THE NEWS.

The Very Latest Called From All Over The World.

Hamilton's civic holiday is on August 2nd. Caledon Presbyterian church was struck by lightning. Dr. Elias Clouse was elected president of the Empire Club, Toronto. An early flotation of \$375,000 Toronto four per cent. bonds at 102 1/2 is probable. It is said that Cape Colony is to get seven extra seats in the South African union. Eighteen men, convicted of complicity in an anarchist conspiracy, have been sentenced in India. Three anarchists testified at Flushing, yesterday, that Capt. Hains was insane when he shot Amis. Rev. J. H. Teney, Emily and Omeene, has been appointed rector of St. Philip's Anglican church, Toronto. The Young Turks have found that vast sums of money and rare jewels have been spirited away by friends of Abdul Hamid.

Through the will of the late

Johanna Moylan, Part Huron, Roman Catholic institutions of London benefit to the amount of \$6,750. Between 150 and 175 persons were injured, many fatally, shortly before midnight, when an iron guard rail, in the balcony of the national guard armory, on Western avenue, Seattle, gave way. Balmy Castle, the large frame farm house of Charles McLellan, Scarborough township, was destroyed by fire on Thursday, with practically the whole of the furniture. SS. Hesperian has reached Glasgow from Boston; S. S. Virginian, inward, passed Cape Magdalen this morning; SS. Tunisian left Mobile, this morning, for Montreal. Napoleon Houli, Ottawa, who married a girl in a romantic manner, was today sentenced to three months at hard labor, for having falsely sworn to the girl's age. Miss Jessie Brown, Jacksonville, Fla., shot and killed Earl P. Adams, her sweetheart, following the announcement of Adams' engagement to another woman, was acquitted in court. At Sealord, Del., in a struggle over a bottle of whiskey in a small canoe, on the Mantookes river, the frail craft capsized and three men and a woman were drowned, all sinking before they could be reached. The Queensboro inquest in the case of Jerry Clarke, who, with his wife, was drowned through the collapsing of a bridge over Black Creek, resulted in a verdict that the bridge should have been better inspected by county officials. In Washington, Irving Beck was shot fatally, it is believed, by Albert Willard, with whose fourteen-year-old daughter Beck, who is thirty-three years old, recently eloped. Beck refused to let Willard know where he was keeping his girl wife. At Jacksonville, Fla., R. A. Humphreys who shot and killed both his sixteen-year-old wife and Thomas McManus when he found the two together in his home, has been acquitted of the crime. The mother of Mrs. Humphreys committed suicide because of grief over her daughter's death. Juro Majurec, Buffalo, N.Y., a laborer, twenty-two years old, was found dead, on Friday morning, lying under a window of his boarding-house. There was a deep stab wound on the right side of the body, and a knife or some other weapon had penetrated the side. The police believe the man was murdered. Three persons were injured and the windows of every house in the neighborhood shattered, early to-day, by the explosion of a bomb that Policeman Patrick McMahon had discovered in front of a stable at Charles and West streets, New York, and carried into the street just as it blew up. McMahon was seriously injured.
