WILL OPPOSE ENTRY TO SEND REPRESENTATIVES TO WASHINGTON.

Mill Owners Say Removal of Duty Would Be Disastrous to Them and Their Employes.

Ogdensburg, N.Y., May 7.—Ogdensburg lumber interests are again alarmed over the situation at Washington, and the Skilling, Whitney & Barnes Lumber company, of this city, which is the city's main industrial reliance will be represented at a meeting of protest, to be held in the New Willard hotel in Washington.

The rumor that the senate will favor the removal of duty on dressed lumber is the cause of the present alarm. Manager Strong, of the local company, states that such a step would be a grave menace to the milling of lumber here. After the tariff bill passed the house, the sections relating to the duty on rough, dressed and manufactured lumber, while not wholly satisfactory to the lumber industry of Ogdensburg, were nevertheless not regarded as of too threatening a nature and were accepted in the spirit that all sections would have to give and take a little, for the general welfare.

The reason the present situation causes anxiety here, is because lowest freight rates are made from such points as Ottawa to New York and New England points. Therefore, were mill and yards, such as are in Ogdensburg, opened in, or close to Ottawa, and have free entrance into the United States for manufactured lumber and box shooks, there would be no further necessity, or advantage, in stopping off lumber to be milled in Ogdensburg. Mr. Strong maintains emphatically that if the bill goes into effect, as at present proposed, it would be disastrous to the local firm and to its employes. Personally the members of the Ogdensburg firm might benefit, in that they hold large tracts of timber land in various parts of Canada, but they claim removal of duty on dressed lumber, would cripple the Ogdensburg industry, almost immediately.

MONTREAL PRODUCE MARKET.

The Prices Paid For Various Products. Montreal, May 6.—Butter is down again in price, with a 2 1/2c. about as high as can be obtained for fancy goods. The downward movement was hastened to-day by heavy receipts from the factories, over one thousand boxes arriving on this market during the afternoon. Holders are selling their stock regardless of cost, realizing that they can replace with better goods at far less money during the next few days. Yesterday dealers were looking for a 2c. market, but, to-day, they are talking 20c. in the country at the end of this week, and it is quite probable that this price will be realized.

The British dealers seem to be running short of supplies of cheese, and orders have been coming in to-day thick and fast, asking for immediate shipment, and paying full prices for anything available. At the country markets to-day prices ranged all the way from 11 1/2c. to 12 1/2c., the latter price ruling at Beloeil, where all the cheese offered were white. At Brockville 12c. was paid for both white and colored. These are high prices for this time of the year, and it is doubtful if they will be maintained.

There is no change to note in the situation as regards eggs. Prices are steady at 19 1/2c. to 20c. per dozen for selected stock.

Dressed hogs are meeting with a fair demand.—Prices have been well maintained with fresh killed abattoir stock quoted at \$11.25 to \$11.50 per 100 lbs.
