Regarding Sydenham Lane.

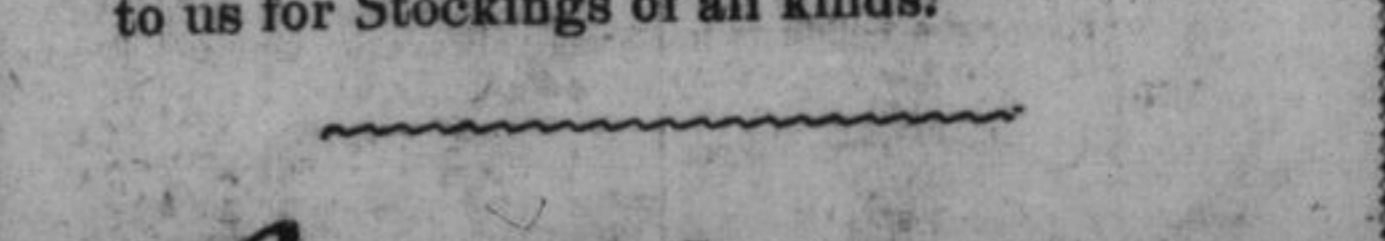
