PURITY IN POLITICS.

The great consolation which the local government lays to heart, over the London political cases, conviction in which has been quashed, is that the liberals have not since made anything like a fight in London. The conspiracy trial, by the way, did not establish that the liberals were the only sinners in London. The local government was not pursuing any of its friends. It did not care how many of them had been engaged in political rascality. Through the evidence of certain persons (of which the judges in appeal did not think very much), the liberals were presented in a very bad light, and the machinery of the courts, was improperly used in their conviction. Now that the result has been cancelled it is not deemed expedient to make a new attack upon the defendants, because in the meantime London has been under conservative rule, and it is immaterial how the party conducts itself. There is no defence of wrong-doing on the part of the liberal party, in London or anywhere else, but it is downright hypocrisy to say that the conservative party in London did not offer the cause of the liberal party to exposure, and that it was spared the ignominy of it all through the care and consideration of a friendly attorney-general.

DIVORCE AND ITS COSTS.

The judicial reform of the day in England is the amendment of the law with regard to divorce. Hitherto the metropolitan court, sitting in London, has dealt with matrimonial cases, and the complaint has been made that only the rich can take advantage of the law since they only can stand the expense that attends its operation. It is now proposed that the country courts—or the circuit courts which are similar to our high or assize courts—shall have the power to hear cases and grant decrees like the metropolitan court. The assets of the individual will determine the location of the trial, and the law will provide that the particulars shall not be published, that at most the only public announcement, as in France, shall be of the decree itself.

This means progress in a necessary reform, and it suggests once more that the time is at hand when the Canadian senate shall be relieved of the trial of divorce on two grounds, (1) that the female is not a competent court, and (2) that the expense of a case makes it a luxury which only the wealthy can endure. There is a distinct objection to divorce under any circumstances by one church, but, this objection does not make some people think the more of the marriage relation. Some conditions cannot be tolerated, and a divorce is the only possible relief. It should only be granted in the interest of morality, and not as a result of the social position or wealth of any party to the suit.

MARTIN AS A TROUBLER.

Mr. Martin may see his finish in the decisive defeat which he sustained as a radical candidate in Stratford-on-Avon. It has never been clear how he came to butt into the contest, which began about the time he arrived in England. He has not, apparently any desire for further political glory. On the contrary, he is intimidated, as he was leaving Canada, that he was going out of politics, in which his had been a stormy and sensational career. Some one suggested his name when the radicals were in an extremity, however, and the next thing he knew Mr. Martin was in the running again.

It may have been that there was some show for the government candidate with Mr. Martin out of the field. When he became a candidate the chances of success diminished since he proved an intractable and unapproachable quantity, with a policy peculiarly his own, and with a disposition to collide with every one who did not agree with him. He could not have been familiar with local issues, and had not the time to study them. He, therefore talked free trade, and incidentally gave his impressions of the Canadian preference and confused the people with his extreme and irrational talk. In fact the campaign from start to finish was made exciting through his pugnacity, for he had to be true to his reputation as "Fighting Joe."

The result may have been a victory for protection, for that is the meaning of tariff reform, and it may not. Martin was personally rejected; he was not in favour with the people. The man is able, very able, but he is

extreme in his views. He could have reached distinction in Canada's public life, but he wanted it at once, wherever he happened to be, and he wanted his own way at the same time. In British Columbia he became premier and lost the office because he, as usual, lost his head. He may now be really out of politics, but he cannot be quiet. His restless energy must sooner or later assert itself in some new performance of aspiration.

EDITORIAL NOTES.

Is the Kingston branch of the Humane Society defunct? The question is asked because there are cases about the city which require the agent's attention.

The humane societies are willing that cattle in transport shall remain in cars, without feeding, for thirty-six hours. Who has been working the oracle in this respect?

The new collector of customs beams happily upon the callers at his office. It is alleged that he mellows the strain of official duty with some of Harry Lauder's new Scotch stories.

The crown should give the Kinrade case a rest. The sleuths have failed, and the alienists want a trial. Crime is not, however, to be detected and punished on any theoretical basis.

Farmers are said not to have lost heart over the wet weather and the delayed planting. 'Tis well. The farmers may be a trifle pessimistic at times, and they have a cause.

It may add to the appearance of a horse to check him up so that he must carry his head very high, but it is not a natural position and the dumb animal has feelings which the owner should respect.

The conservative party will put up for a new paper in London, which Mr. Downey will edit. This is the way the Free Press is to be rewarded by reputation—for its long and faithful support of the party.

Well, if the member for Frontenac was not reflecting upon the officer in command of the Kingston military camp, in his attack in parliament, pray, who was he reflecting upon? The question grows in interest.

The provincial secretary should change the phraseology of the official letter when dealing with "public executions." It cannot be that the lieutenant-governor is "pleased" to order the decapitation of any official, even that of a five-dollar-a-year issuer of marriage licenses.

The Chesley Enterprise is warranted in making fun of the ponderous machinery by which its editor was removed from the office of issuer of marriage licenses. The fees ran from \$3.60 to \$5.40 per year, and Col. Clark, M.P.P., a brother editor, caused the execution. He ought to be ashamed of himself.

The liberal-tariff policy is a tariff for all parts of the dominion, and it is generally just to all parts. The conservative party advocates a high tariff policy, which does not meet the acceptance of even itself—or a part of it. The western conservative members are decidedly in opposition to the high tariff eastern wing of the party, and are prepared, in the interests of their constituents, to support the tariff-revenue policy of the liberal government, which suits all sorts and conditions of men; except a few extremists or a few seekers for special favors at the expense of the mass of the people.

SCHOOL OF MINING.

Two Assistant Professors to Be Secured. The annual meeting of the directors of the School of Mining was held on Saturday evening, Hon. William Harty, M.P., was re-elected, chairman, and D. M. McIntyre, K.C., vice-chairman. J. K. Robertson, M.A., of Toronto University, was appointed lecturer in physics. A committee was appointed to secure an assistant professor in mineralogy and an assistant professor in geology.

NEWS FROM ADANA

REV. F. W. MACCALLUM WRITES HIS CHILDREN

Hatred of Islam to Christianity—the Cause of the Massacres—The Armenians, Too, Boasted Foolishly.

Rev. Frederick W. MacCallum, of Marash, Asiatic Turkey, has been heard from by his two children living here with their grandparents, Rev. D. and Mrs. MacCallum, Alfred street. The missionary writes from Adana, on April 18th, and says:

"Before this reaches you you will have heard of the massacre here, which seems now to have come to an end. It began the morning after Miss Ainslie, Miss Salmond and I arrived here, for our annual meeting. It is hard to understand just how it began but Wednesday forenoon, about ten o'clock, a terrible fusillade broke out all over the city. As far as we can learn the Turks have been planning an attack on the Armenians for some months now. The Armenians defended themselves as well as they could but they are very few comparatively (about one to eight in Adana). Plundering and burning soon followed the shooting. We were left without a guard but were greatly cheered by the coming of the British consul, Major Doughty-Wylie, who came up from Mersina as soon as he heard of the outbreak. He went through the streets with a posse of soldiers trying to quell the disturbance, and he was shot in the arm himself. He is laid up with it now at the railway station.

Thursday morning a fire was started near the Girls' Seminary and three of our young men went out, bravely, in spite of bullets, to put out the fire. It was extinguished. Mr. Maurer, a Mennonite from Hajin, and Mr. Rogers, who came only seven months ago to Tarsus, were both shot by the Turks.

Toilet accommodations for men and women is provided for at the north and south entrances, with drinking fountains at all of them.
