 A novel and interesting travelling show for cheap admission prices is at Douglas Harbor, Isle of Man—the convict ship, "The Success," a notable relic. The massive hull speaks eloquently of the horrible conditions under which those unfortunate were confined. There are seventy-two cells, to which no light, and but very little air, is admitted. One is the "Black Hole," in which the prisoner was confined for a period of from one to twenty-eight days, fed on bread and water, and chained to a ring in such a position that he could neither stand up or lie down. Desperate characters were also imprisoned in what was known as the "Tiger's Den," from which they were not permitted to go until the whole of their sentence was completed.
