POWER AT TRENTON

ARRANGEMENT FOR DEVELOPMENT NEARING END

Local Company Favors the Proposition—Trenton to Get Power at Sixteen Dollars Per Horsepower—To Go to Ottawa. Toronto Globe.

As the result of the conference held yesterday between the municipal authorities of Trenton and the Toronto Electric Light company an arrangement has practically been completed by which that town will have developed the water power existing on dam No. 2 at the Trent Valley canal.

Mayor Funnell was very optimistic as to the venture when interviewed at the Iroquois Hotel. He said the proposition laid by the Trenton municipal council before the office of the local engineer, which was a matter of some interest both in Trenton and Belleville, had been very favorably received. The whole matter is to go before the minister of railways and canals at Ottawa in the near future, and he is hopeful that the entire scheme can be satisfactorily arranged.

At the present time the government is building this dam at a cost of \$100,000. The Trenton officials are desirous of having the power plant constructed now, because it could be done simultaneously with the dam at much less cost than if it were done later on. The chief magistrate estimates that the power plant will mean an expenditure of \$150,000. Of the four thousand horse power to be developed, the town, under the agreement, will get a block of 2,000, and the remainder will be sold to the neighboring districts. He admits that the town can hardly use the whole block at the present time, but an extensive advertising campaign will be conducted through the United States in the hope that manufacturers can be induced to come there and establish factories. The power is agreed upon will only cost Trenton \$16 per horse power. What the developing company sell outside out of the block they have obtained, will return them a royalty of a dollar a horse power, and the Dominion government will also reap a royalty from the proposition.

ENGLISHWOMAN'S CHARITY.

Lady Aberdeen's Adoption of Five Slave Boys.

Lady Aberdeen, who has added another to her many good works and deeds by founding a new monthly journal to help in the campaign against consumption in Ireland, figured in a dramatic incident thirty-two years ago. She and her husband went to Egypt for their wedding tour, at a time when Gordon was trying to suppress the slave traffic. Four slave boys who were offered for sale excited Lady Aberdeen's compassion and the slave-dealer was invited to bring them on board Lord Aberdeen's dahabiyah, where he hoped to find a purchaser. When the man stepped on deck with his human chattels, Lord Aberdeen and she were first to claim them. These boys are from the Sudan. Afterwards, however, he compensated the slave-dealer and Lady Aberdeen returned to England with these four boys and another whom she had rescued. Three of her adopted children died, but two were educated and set to useful work.

NEVER RECOVERED.

Another Victim of Tragedy of Loss of Steamer.

New York, May 12.—Never having recovered from the shock of losing his wife and two children in the disaster to the steamboat General Slocum in Long Island Sound in 1904, Louis Bauman, fifty years old, died last night at the home of a friend in this city. He had grieved almost constantly and to-night he failed to get up. There have been several instances of death directly attributed to grief over the loss of relatives on the General Slocum.

Sleep in Free Lodging House.

New York, May 12.—In New York to collect a legacy of \$50,000, two women who arrived from New Orleans, Friday night, were forced to seek food and shelter at the municipal lodging house last night, because of their failure, after a two days search, to locate the lawyer with whom they were to arrange for a collection of the \$50,000 legacy. The two women were Mrs. Lotie McCall, a widow of forty years, and her daughter, Elizabeth, nineteen. They were well dressed and evidently persons of refinement.

Scarlet Fever in Family.

Watertown, N.Y., May 12.—Contracting scarlet fever, it is thought, from moving into a house in which several persons suffered from the disease some months ago, has now resulted in Rev. L. M. Lawrence and family, Dexter, being under quarantine. Mr. Lawrence is the new Presbyterian minister and only went into his new field a few days ago from Sohier Point. So far as is known there are no other cases of the fever in Dexter.

Found Dead at Home.

Cape Vincent, N.Y., May 12.—James E. Howard, a prominent citizen of this village, was found dead at his home at five o'clock this afternoon. Death was due to heart disease, it is said. He is survived by one son, Mark Howard, who is in the employ of the government; one daughter, Mary Howard, of this village, and a sister, Mrs. Levi Anthony.

Would Not Stand For It.

Watertown, N.Y., May 12.—Charles Young, bartender at McCoy's, got thirty days as the result of a fight occasioned, so Frank Eng claims, by the habit of a certain class of "spongers" walking up to the bar whenever a man wants a drink alone. Eng paid for his drink, but refused to settle for the drinks of the loungers. A fight ensued.

Milwaukee, May 12.—As a result of a poll of Wisconsin's schools, it was announced today that the children had voted for the violet as the state's official flower.
