Mallorytown Jottings.

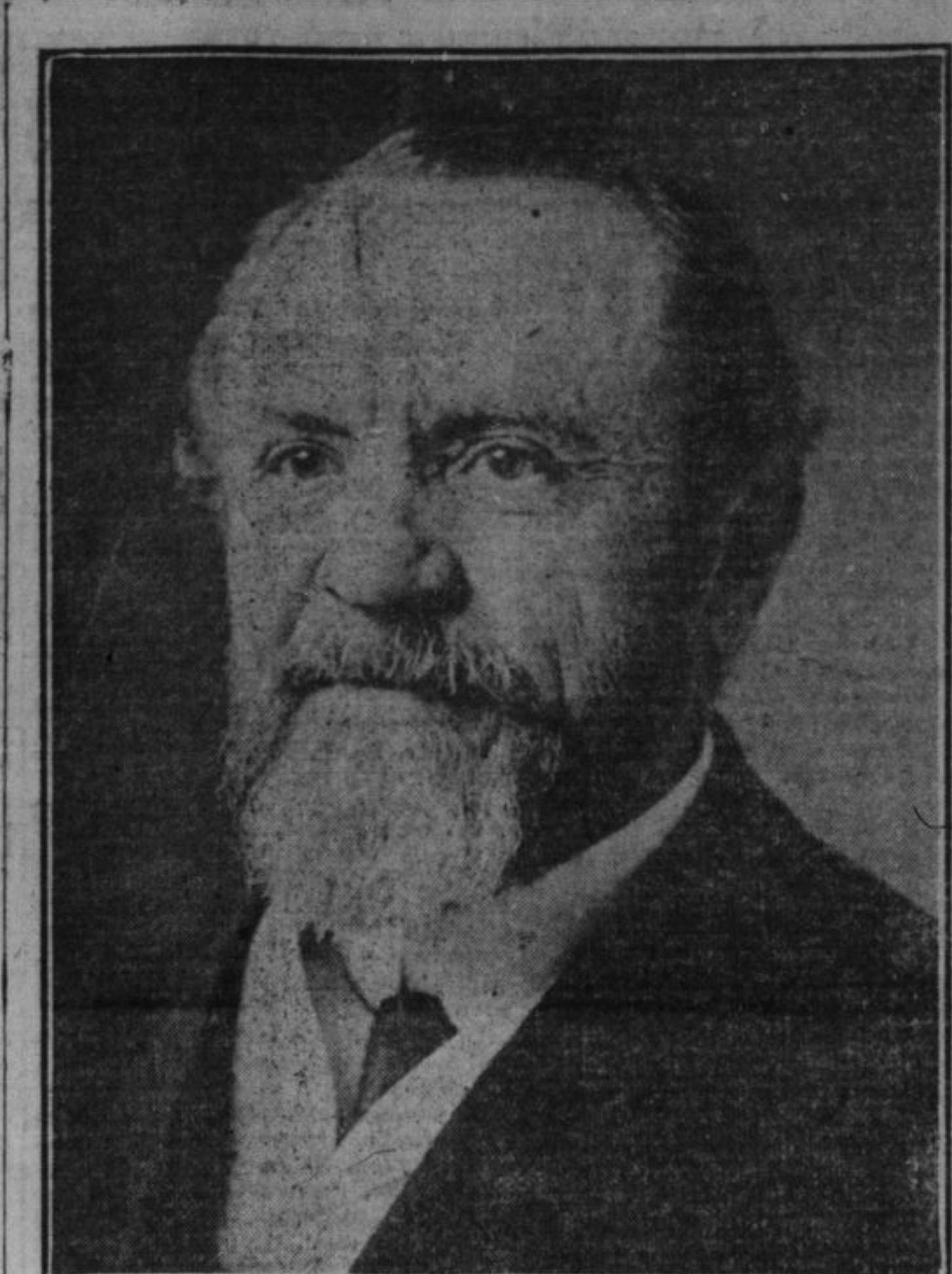

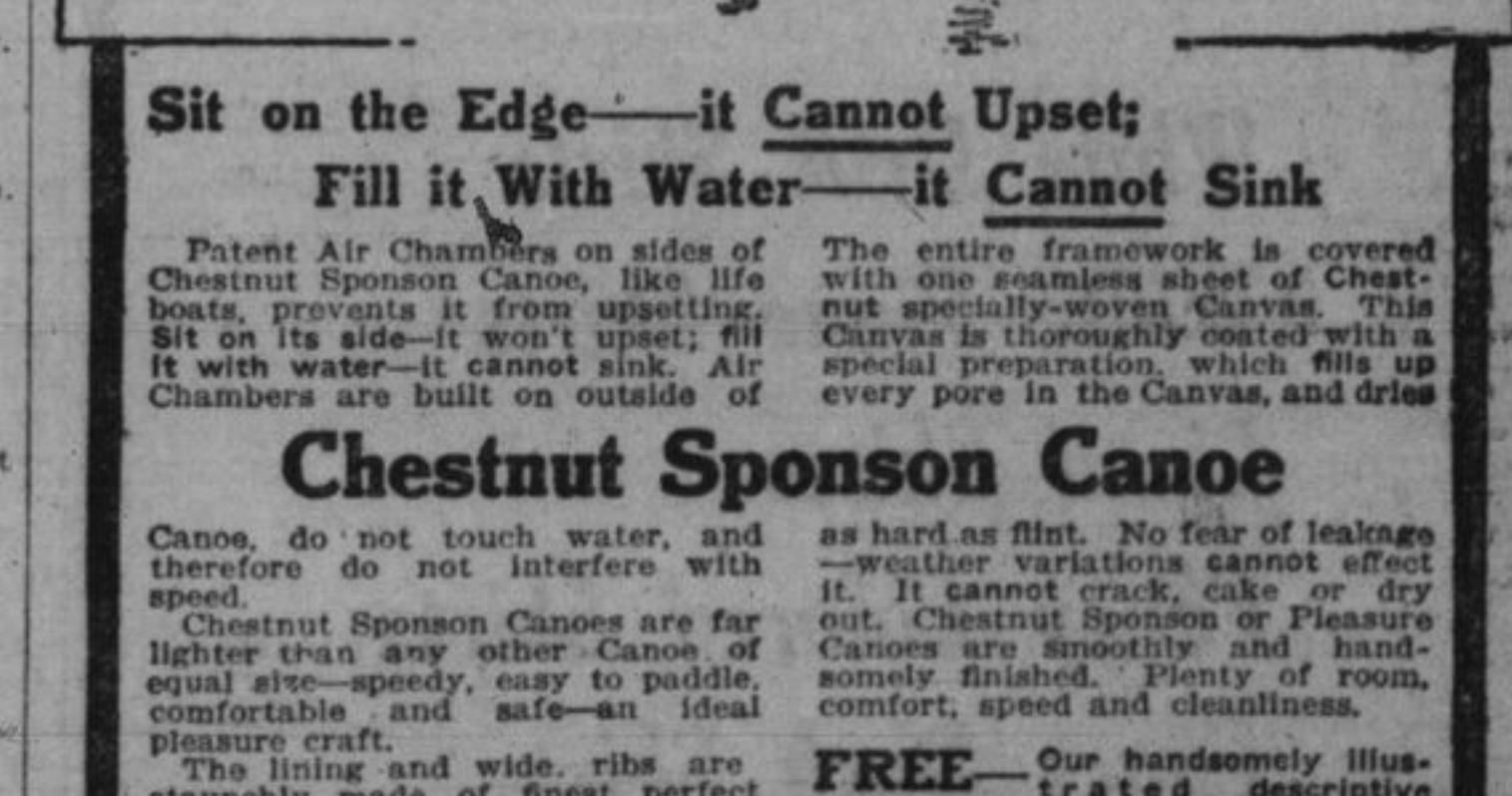
