



COMPLETE PROGRAMME IS GIVEN.

Military Review and Parade in the Morning—A Day of Splendid Entertainment Arranged For the Citizens.

The general committee meeting of the Victoria Day celebration was well attended on Friday evening and now all is complete except some minor details. The men in charge of the different departments have taken hold well with the result that every one is remarkably well pleased and everything is running fine. The programme is practically completed but some small changes may be made in it. Mayor Couper presided at the meeting. The morning events were fixed as follows:

9:15—Automobile parade.
9:30—Motor boat races.

10:30—Lacrosse match, cricket field.

11—Marathon race.

The automobile parade is the first thing in the morning for numerous reasons. The cars will meet at a point down town and go to the Orphans' Home, where they will take on the children. They will then go over the following course: Union street to Livingston avenue, to King, to Queen, to Brock, to Wellington, to Princess, to University avenue, to the home. This will give the children a good long drive around the principal streets and will give them a fine chance to see anything that is going on around the city. Each child will be provided with flags and bunting by the automobile club.

The motor boat races commence at 9:30 o'clock from the Martello tower, in front of the city buildings. The races will be around a triangular course, from the tower to Garden Island, to Macdonald Park, to the tower. There will be four events and all will be interesting. Handsome cups have been given and many fast boats have entered.

At 10:30 o'clock the lacrosse match will begin at the cricket field between Brockville and Kingston.

The military parade route is given elsewhere. The troops will assemble at Barriefield, and after the review will return for the parade of the city, about eleven o'clock.

The Marathon race will start and finish at the Market Square. The start will be made at eleven o'clock sharp. The course will be from the Market Square to Princess street, straight out to the five-mile house, and return. The road has been carefully measured off and every mile is marked. So far there are twenty-five entries and nearly twice that number are expected before the pistol is fired.

The following judges were appointed: Starter, W. P. Nickle, judges, John Morris, Ald. Harty, Ald. Robertson; medical examination, Dr. Bearance; of the course, W. Bearance and Con. Millan. Everything is arranged for this race.

2:30—Mounted military sports.

2:30—Auto sports.

The above programme was blocked out for the afternoon events and is a good one. At two o'clock the horse races will commence, there being four events to run off, the 2:14 class, 2:20 class, 2:35 class and named race. They will all likely fill.

The baseball match between Victoria and Young Irishmen will also start at two o'clock and should be a peach. At 2:30 o'clock the mounted military sports will be run in between the heats of the horse races and will consist of lemon slicing, bareback wrestling, heads and posts, Victoria Cross race and other interesting events.

During the day music will be furnished by different bands. The Kingston Kilties band has been secured for the morning, the R.C.H.A. band for the fair grounds in the afternoon and the Salvation Army band at night. The evening band concert will be given on the market square. Beside these bands one will be here from Alexandria Bay and one from Watertown with the 39th regiment.

The United States soldiers will be quartered at the hotels around the city and this will all be attended to before they arrive. The Fourteenth regiment will meet the Yankee troops on their arrival from Cape Vincent Sunday at one o'clock, after attending service in Sydenham street Methodist church. The civic celebration committee is composed of Mayor Couper, Alds. Kent, Carson, Ross Harty and Nickle, W. C. Martin, United States Consul Van Sant and W. R. Givens. The visitors will be royally entertained while in the Lime-stone city.

The above is the main programme of events as it stood after the committee meeting but some changes may be needed. Many items were fully discussed and everything was given the fullest consideration before it was adopted. Everything is being

DISTINCTIVE PAPERS

USED BY MERCHANTS FOR THEIR PARCELS.

McKelvey & Birch Have the Most Unique, of An Agate Type What Several Other Business Houses Use.

Piled up in the Kingston & Brockville station almost any Thursday afternoon may be seen a large collection of goods purchased by the excursionists who come in during that day from all points along the railway.

It indicates that considerable business is done with the merchants but what strikes one most in looking at the collection is a distinctive colored paper which wraps up some of the goods purchased. It was a blue mottled paper, resembling agate ware, and on enquiry it was found that McKelvey & Birch owned the paper, and that they took this means of advertising. It certainly was most effective. Wherever the mottled paper is seen the firm's name rushes to the mind. Enquiry was made of the firm in regard to the matter and they remarked that while it cost them considerable money to provide the special brand yet they found it an excellent advertisement; it gave them a trade mark that was valuable.

The incident led a reporter to make inquiries if other concerns in the city had distinctive features associated with their business such as the above progressive firm had and it revealed quite an interesting condition of affairs. It was found that the enterprising and up-to-date druggist, T. L. Best, tied all his parcels with a burnt orange colored cord. It was a little thing but it gave prominence and his goods can always be told by the colored string about the wrappings.

At Waldron's big store pink paper was used for the wrapping up of the parcels and the delivery wagons go out piled up with goods tied up in this kind of paper.

Brown paper is used for parcels at Laidlow's, not common brown paper, but of a first-class quality, which gives excellent service. He also uses all his parcels.

At George Mills & Co.'s store every parcel is stamped "George Mills & Co." and every box is also stamped in a similar manner.

Every box and parcel leaving the big store for the wrapping up of his parcels. This sheet contains about a dozen bright advertisements of his goods.
