Gordon, O.C., E.O.C., Major Hooper, Montreal, and Messrs. Wanklyn, Montreal, and Macklin and Mackenzie, of Toronto, were also present. A very pleasant time was spent by the company at the festive board. Songs were sung by Lieut.-Col. Taylor and Prof. Lanos, and piano solos given by Capt. Russell Brown. The governor-general was very much pleased with the rendition of old French songs by Prof. Lanos, who has a fine tenor voice.

At eleven o'clock, the cadets brought out their war canoes and paddled Earl Grey and his staff across the calm, moonlit harbor to the foot of Johnson street, where his private car was waiting to take him to Ottawa at midnight.

Occurrences in The City and Vicinity—Other Brief Items of Interest Easily Read and Remembered.

Y.M.C.A. ATHLETIC EVENTS.

Some Held Last Evening—Wednesday's Schedule.

The Y.M.C.A. events for Wednesday evening are running broad jump and half mile run.

The features of last night were the rivalry between Bearance and Summers in the 100 yards dash.

The best throw of the twelve pound hammer at Bellville was 35 feet 10 inches. Last night "Billy" Bearance threw the fourteen-pound hammer 54 feet 10 inches.

100 yards—First heat, McCartney, scratch, 1st; Hafner, 8 yards; 2nd; Fleming, 10 yards, 3rd. Time, 11 3-5 seconds.

Second 100 yards' heat—Bearance, 6 yards, 1st; Summers, 7 yards, 2nd; Max. Orr, 13 yards, 3rd. Time, 10 4-5 seconds.

Third 100 yards' heat—Edgar, 13 yards, 1st; F. Birch, 12 yards, 2nd; Bearance, 6 yards, Summers, 7 yards; tied for 3rd. Time, 10 3-5 seconds.

Bearance defeated Summers in the run off by three inches.

The handicap was too heavy for McCartney, who ran in good form in the finals, being only one yard back at the finish.

High jump—Allan Hafner, with a handicap of 8 inches, was first, with 5 feet 3 inches. McCartney, from scratch, Summers and R. Edgar with 8 inches, were tied for second, with 5 feet 1 inch. W. Bearance was third with 4 feet 11 inches.

MARINE INTELLIGENCE.

The Coal Boats Are Anxious to Get to Work.

The steamer Jeska arrived from Oswego to-day.

The government steamer Scout was in port on Monday.

The steamer Sowards cleared for Oswego Monday afternoon.

The schooner Ford River cleared, Monday, for Charlotte with feldspar.

The schooner Keevatin cleared from Swift's for Oswego, after unloading coal.

More than one launch has run upon the obstruction, with damage and annoyance, because of it. A week ago promises were made to buoy the rock, but so far this has not been done.

HONORABLY ACQUITTED.

Charles Steers Wrongly Taken Into Custody.

Edward Randall appeared again before the magistrate, this morning, charged with being drunk while on the "Indian" list. His case was again remanded for a day, as he told an entirely different story.

On Monday morning, Randall said that he met an Englishman named Charles Steers on the railroad track and that Steers gave him the liquor. The case was then adjourned for a day, and P. C. Bateson succeeded in locating Steers and brought him to the station. He was taken before Randall and the latter said he was not the man, so Steers was honorably discharged. The man whom Randall implicated is a hard working, honest man, one who is a credit to the city, and he cannot see why Randall should bring him into the affair, as he did not even know him. Steers was at work when arrested, and felt his position very keenly until it was fully explained and he found he was the victim of a statement given by Randall to try and save himself.

This morning, Randall gave another name, not exactly the same but very near it, and as the man has appeared in court before he may be the one.

THE ANNUAL MEETING

Of Kingston, Smith's Falls and Ottawa Ry. Co.

The annual meeting of the Kingston, Smith's Falls and Ottawa Railway company was held on Tuesday morning at the local G.T.R. office. This road is now controlled by the Grand Trunk railway company, which was represented here by its treasurer, Frank Scott, of Montreal. The directors were re-elected. It is expected that within two years the G.T.R. will construct its proposed line from Kingston to Ottawa so as to get direct connection between Toronto and the capital. The road would have been well under way now, according to General Manager Hays, only for the financial depression of last year. The G.T.R. company required to put all the money it could raise into the Grand Trunk Pacific road. As soon as the latter line nears completion the Kingston, Smith's Falls & Ottawa road will be proceeded with. The company built a tiny section near Kingston Mills last year in order that its charter would not lapse.
