A SHOWER OF NAILS

Rained on Passing Street Car in Philadelphia.

Philadelphia, Pa., June 2.—The first ordinary business, yesterday, since the beginning of the street car men's strike here last Saturday morning closed with conditions practically unchanged. The traction company notified its men that those who had been discharged for striking on Saturday would be taken back if they reported for work at once. Men who had been discharged for refusing offers in the past were also welcomed back. With these men and recruits hired in other cities the company was able to run 700 of its 3,000 cars until midnight, when no further attempt was made to continue the traffic until this morning.

The first disturbance in the central part of the city occurred when men employed in erecting a high building showered nails and other missiles on a passing car.

Real rioting began, to-day, and but for the intervention of the marine guard of the League Island navy yard, hurriedly despatched to prevent injury to government property, a force of city police would have been overwhelmed by a mob. As it was the police used their revolvers and clubs, but no one was killed. Members of the mob and police, however, were bruised before order was restored.

BURGLARS SCARED AWAY.

Had Removed Goods From Brockville Home.

Brockville, Ont., June 2.—At an early hour Tuesday morning burglars were detected in the house of Nathaniel Gaffney by two lady occupants, one of whom was awakened by a thud in the kitchen. The cellar had been rifled, and the contents removed to the lawn. Thinking the members of the household were absent the burglars were planning to make a visit upstairs when the women gave the alarm by raising a window. Their calls for help brought assistance, but by this time the burglars had escaped. The women were unable to furnish the police with a description of the burglars.

TROOPS SENT OUT

To Quell the Lawlessness of Strikers.

Sacramento, Cal., June 2.—Five companies of California militia were sent to-day to McLeod, Siskiyou county, where 4,000 striking lumber men have been terrorizing the city. They have seized the powder house near the town, taking possession of many pounds of high explosives, and threaten to wipe out the town. Sheriff Howard and his deputies had a number of clashes with the strikers, but had the worst of it. He telegraphed, last night, that the lawless element was beyond his control.

OCCURRENCES RECOUNTED IN BRIEF FORM.

Matters That Interest Everybody—Notes From All Over—Little of Everything Easily Read and Remembered.

J. C. McNaughton has been appointed deputy collector of inland revenues, at Port Hope.

The Ritz hotel, Montreal, will be built at the corner of Sherbrooke and MacTavish streets.

The court of appeal refused to grant a stated case, on behalf of Maurice Ryan, sentenced to be hanged at North Bay to-morrow.

J. L. Benoit, a switchman for the Canadian Northern railway, was cut to pieces, to-day, by a train in the east end yards, Montreal.

Maxime Plouffe, a conductor on the Ottawa electric railway, was held up and robbed of nearly \$20 in money and tickets. He was on his way home.

Miss Jennie Bonnar, Ottawa, committed suicide, on Wednesday morning, at the residence of her brother-in-law, Frank Williams, Union street, Toronto.

S.S. Dominion, inward, 200 miles east of Cape Race; S.S. Laurentian, sailed for Boston, from Glasgow; S.S. Mongolian, sailed from Philadelphia for Glasgow.

At Ingersoll, A. M. Kerr succeeded George Carruthers as manager of the local branch of the Merchants' Bank. Mr. Carruthers takes charge of the branch at Windsor.

St. Catharines council is taking steps to prevent frauds in the sale of milk. It is also proposed to establish a garbage collection and disposal system in the near future.

A Vancouver, B.C., despatch states that Vancouver City, yesterday, sold \$1,297,000 worth of forty-year four per cent. bonds to Amelius Jarvis & Co., Toronto, for \$8.25.

Henry McCallister, aged eleven, son of a temperance hotel keeper, was instantly killed at Kirk's Ferry, on Monday night. He was passing along the street and picked up a live wire.

It is within the bounds of possibility that the government will not appoint a successor to the late Col. J. B. Rankin, K.C., Chatham, former drainage referee for Western Ontario.

Percy Sellen and Alfred Shrubbs have settled their differences over the distance of Saturday night's race at Hamilton's Point. The race will be twelve miles.

In Toronto the value of the building for which permits have been granted this year is almost double that of the permits issued in the same period of 1908.

Twenty minutes after arriving in Toronto, Angelo Sciolino was arrested, on the request of the police of Silver Creek, N.Y., on the charge of attempting to murder his wife and daughter at that place.

John Francis Waters, M.A., LL.D., aged fifty-six years, died suddenly, in Ottawa, on Wednesday morning, collapsing as he was going into his office in the secretary of state department.

THE SPORT REVIEW.

Interesting News From the Various Sporting Fields.

Toronto University lacrosse team tied the Crescents in New York, at 1 to 1.

The Regina Capitals received almost \$6,000 from the Minto cup lacrosse games.

Regina defeated Vancouver in an exhibition lacrosse match by a score of 8 goals to 7.

Gotch will wrestle Jenkins in Des Moines, on June 11th, and after that will go to Minneapolis for an operation on his nose.

Sellen and Shrubbs have been matched to run at the island, Toronto, Saturday night. The runners are at odds over the distance, Sellen holding out for fifteen miles, and Shrubbs asking for twelve.

Henri St. Yves and John D. Marsh will run a fifteen mile race at Happyland, Winnipeg, on June 5th. The management completed arrangements with the runners recently. They will compete for a large purse.

At New York, in a listless race, which degenerated into a walking match by the time the twentieth mile has been run, Louis Orpheo, of France, took the measure of fourteen competitors and won a \$10,000 professional International Marathon, run at Brighton Beach, finishing the 26 miles 385 yards in 2 hours 59 minutes 57 seconds, or twenty minutes and ten seconds slower than the record, Edouard Cibet, of France, was second; Patrick Dineen, of Boston, third; William Davis, of Canada, fourth, and Patrick White, of Ireland, fifth. Of the fifteen starters seven dropped out under the strain.
