

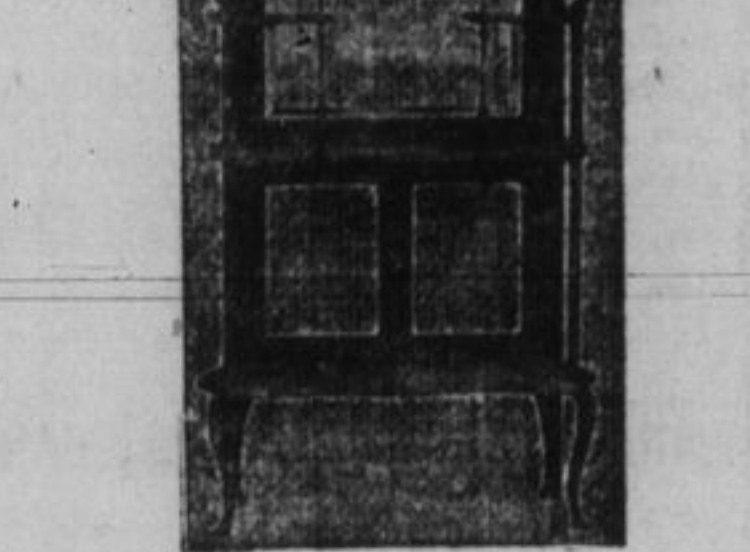

Officers of the Company Not Agreed—The President Opposes Them While the Secretary-Treasurer Would Run Them.

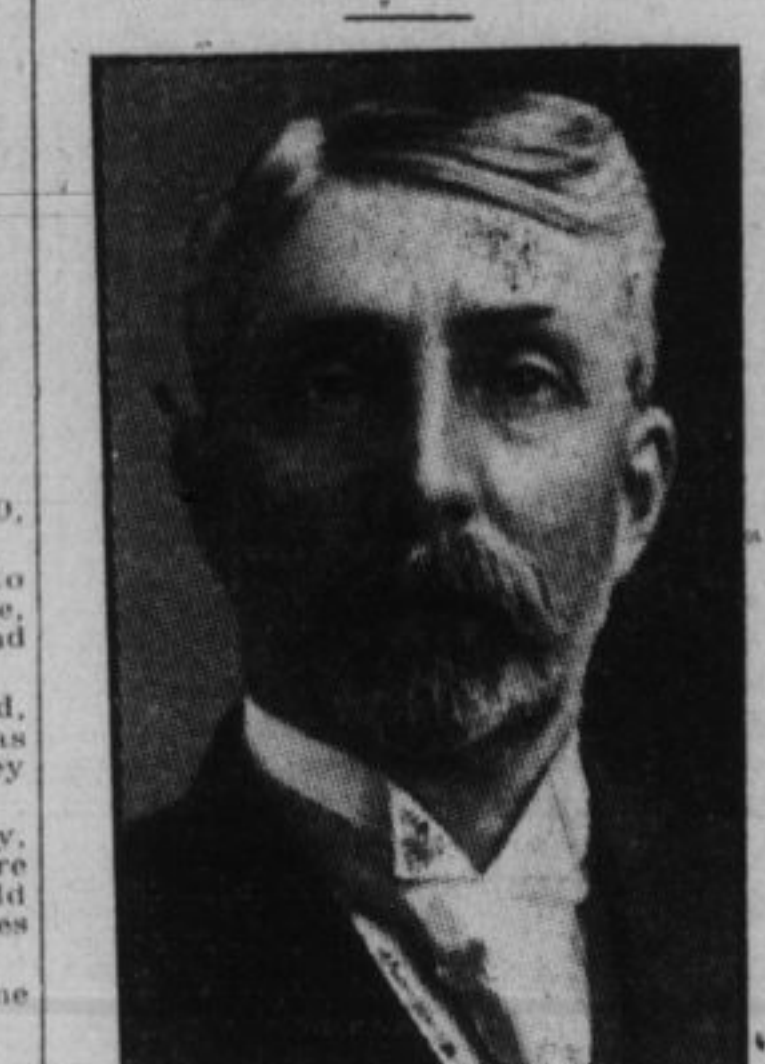
It is understood that Sunday street cars would be run here if the company's officers were agreed upon the matter.

FOLLOWS IN ITS TRAIN

NO QUORUM OF CITY PROPERTY COMMITTEE.

Chairman Was Absent—City Dome Clock Remains Unlighted Owing to Negligence of Aldermen.

The city property committee is evidently trying to equal the light, heat and power committee's "no quorum" record. A meeting of property was called for yesterday afternoon but only three members were under the city dome fifteen minutes after the hour.

Chairman Alderman Angrove, the late Ald. Toye, marched in. As the chairman Alderman Angrove was not present to conduct the deliberations the committee members could not proceed without a shepherd.

Ald. Nickle took occasion to remark that the three-year aldermanic term seemed to be responsible for the negligence of council members to attend to committee work.

City Clerk Sands expressed the view that the best civic work was done through the council, and that the aldermen and the chairman of committees had power to transact much of the business.

Until the property committee meets nothing can be done in regard to lighting the city dome clock, which will remain in darkness for a while longer.

TEACH THEM TO SHOOT

Instead of Useless Sham Battle Manoeuvres.

An old military man, who has been in action and knows how to shoot, says that the manoeuvres carried out on Barriefield heights on Tuesday evening by the 14th Regiment and the military college cadets, were of little benefit to the corps.

There shouldn't have been any firing at all. The township of Kingston council will let the city sue it for the bill of over \$500 rendered for taking care of small-pox patients, and with J. L. Whiting, K.C., as its lawyer, the small-pox hospital matters of last year might get an unpleasant sifting and plastering.

It is also conceded by business men that the proper way to have issued the bills for treatment at the fort hospital was to have fixed a rate by the day or week for maintenance and attention, and not divide the total cost of equipping and maintaining the hospital among the eighty-five or so patients.

It is suggested that the board of health fix a charge of two dollars a day for every patient treated.
