NO CAUSE FOR IT

ARRANGEMENTS SHOULD NOT BE DISTURBED.

As the Order was Issued More Than a Month Ago—Asking for Commutation of the Death Sentence.

Ottawa, June 3.—City tax receipts for May, the last month of the discount period, were \$675,000. This is greatly in excess of the returns for the same month last year, when the receipts were \$384,000.

In answer to complaint from the London district that camp arrangements had been seriously interfered with by the order reducing the camp strength of the regiments, it was officially stated at the militia department, yesterday, that there was no cause for complaint as the commands had been informed of the new order more than a month ago.

The department of justice is being asked for commutation of the death sentence passed on Samuel Asseby, who is to hang at Hawkesbury, on July 23rd. It is contended that nothing more than a verdict of manslaughter is justified by the evidence. Justice Cassels goes, next week, to New Brunswick or the exchequer court. In one county there are nearly 150 appeals against the N.T.R., in connection with its right of way.

Militia orders, to-day, announce that commanding officers will be held responsible for persons entering camps this year who are not properly protected from smallpox by vaccination.

NO SIN TO SMOKE.

Clergyman Criticizes Assembly's Attack on Tobacco.

Cleveland, June 3.—"I smoke and I'll not give it up. Such actions do more harm than good."

That was the statement made ament the anti-tobacco resolution adopted at the recent Presbyterian general assembly by Dr. A. B. Meldrum, pastor of the Old Stone church, which is Cleveland's most prominent Presbyterian church.

"The assembly had too much to do to waste time on such matters," he said. "Such action does more harm than good. There is always some one who seeks notoriety by such resolutions. The use of tobacco is a matter of individual conscience. I will not bring the matter before my congregation. The members are entitled to their own opinion in the matter. It is no sin to smoke. I use tobacco, and will continue to do so."

DOINGS AT DENBIGH.

Clergyman Receives Word of Mother's Death in Germany.

Denbigh, June 1.—George James, of Plevna, and Miss Ada Vines, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Vines, of this place, were quietly married at the home of the bride's parents, on the 26th ult. Rev. Mr. Lyons, of Plevna, performed the ceremony and also took time with Mrs. Lyons to make a call on their friends and former neighbors, Dr. and Mrs. Adams, James Madden, our county judge, held division court, here, in Beebe's hall, on the 27th ult. Charles Both was away a few days assisting in the organizing of some lodges of the Chosen Friends in Renfrew county.

Mr. Lockhead, of Enterprise, D.D. master of the I.O. Society, spent a couple of days here assisting the organization of Loyal Orange, No. 376, which had been dormant for some time.

Mr. Adam McLellan, of Matawatchan, is spending a few days again here, visiting relatives and old friends. D. A. Hebit, public school inspector, made one of his official visits to the schools in this municipality.

Court of revision was held at the Chateau house, on Saturday, 29th ult. The attendance was very large, there being twenty-six appeals against the assessment, and the session, as was anticipated, was a very stormy one.

J. S. Lano is again engaged with a gang of men to repair that new piece of the Addington Road, built on the west shore of Massena lake, which had become impassable this spring having been damaged by excessive high water. William Blackley has received a grant from the provincial government to report the Addington Road between Denbigh and Raglan, and intend to commence his operations next week.

Rev. J. Reble received the sad intelligence of the unexpected death of his mother, who died suddenly in Kropp, Germany, of a paralytic stroke. He had all arrangements made for a more joyful occasion, as he was expecting his bride over from Germany. She has in the meantime arrived at Arrnprior, where he went to meet her, and they were quietly married there, on the 26th ult., by Rev. William Kuyper, a personal friend and fellow-student.

The two clergymen will start to-day for Preston, Ont., to attend the forty-ninth annual session of the Lutheran synod of Canada, and Rev. J. Reble and his bride will not be able to arrive here until June 10th.

SEQUEL TO RISING

"ANGEL OF LEGATIONS" MARRIES HER CHAUFFEUR

Has Had Stirring Career—Received \$450,000 From Allied Powers For Heroism During the Peking Siege.

San Francisco, June 3.—At Redwood City, Mrs. Ann McCarthy was married to Gus Rhenstrom, her chauffeur. The bride was the widow of August Chamot at the time of the Boxer rebellion in China, and she and her husband were instrumental in saving many lives in Peking. Chamot was an interpreter at the court and also kept an hotel for foreigners adjoining the legation grounds. When the uprising came Chamot was found to have the only good stock of European provisions in the city, and this stock he enabled the legation prisoners to draw upon. He was a skilful chef and cooked for the sick and invalid. His wife was a crack rifle shot and took her place with the men in defending the legations. During the siege of Peking it was the heroism of the Chamots that saved hundreds of besieged foreigners from starvation and death at the hands of the Boxers. Mrs. Chamot was called "the angel of legations." In return for their service in Peking the couple received \$450,000 from the allied powers, many rare jewels and gifts, and August Chamot was made mandarin of China, one of the first Europeans to be accorded this honor.

At Peterboro, Wilson McCarthy, a young Englishman, was sentenced to a year in the Central prison. He was discovered trying to break into Andrew Laidlaw's clothing store.

H. B. Crawford was fined \$50 and costs for the theft of electric fluid from the Ottawa Electric Light company. Crawford had for some time been trapping supply wires leading from the street to the metre in the houses, and connecting these by means of another wire beyond the metre.
