HOT DEBATE Over Queen's Separation Question.

SENTIMENT REIGNED IN THE ARGUMENT OF THOSE OPPOSED.

Principal Gordon Presented the Case For the Trustees—G. M. Macdonnell, K.C., Kingston, Made a Great Speech Against Separation.

Hamilton, June 3.—"People of many nations are flocking into Winnipeg faster than we can deal with them. If they are allowed to segregate themselves on this principle of denominational education, we are going to have a divided Canada. Many of those people love their religion just as much as we love Presbyterianism. We must look at this question from a national, and not only a Presbyterian, point of view."

Principal Gordon introduced this question in a speech apparently pitched in an intentionally low key. A resolution set forth in the printed report one even far less debatable, and at the close of Dr. Gordon's clever address it seemed as though all opposition to the proposal for a commission was silenced.

The Moderator Reminds. The situation at once grew tense, so that the moderator remarked how very brotherly and peacefully they were getting along and how little doubt he entertained about the preservation of harmonious atmosphere.

west, by an adroit exhibition of special pleading and the use of all the arts of a trained and gifted speaker, to consolidate the opposition. No one could say just how Mr. Macdonnell construed facts to another purpose and threw a different light about Principal Gordon's arguments, but he managed to build up a considerable body of sympathy, and laughter and applause were frequent, while cheers broke out upon his quotation from the university charter, that the purpose of Queen's was to give instruction in the Christian religion and arts.

Mr. Macdonnell concluded by moving an amendment: "The assembly, while reaffirming the resolution of 1904 and 1908 as requested by the trustees, appoint a commission to consider in co-operation with them whether it would be advisable to limit the relation now existing between the churches and the university to the departments of arts and theology, and to provide that the other departments now or hereafter existing may be otherwise constituted. Such commission to report to the next assembly."

The original motion is as follows: "The trustees of Queen's university having expressed their deliberate judgment that further changes in the constitution are necessary for the welfare of the university, the assembly resolve to appoint a commission to confer and co-operate with the trustees regarding the changes suggested, to consider all the interests involved, and to report their judgment in the whole question to the next assembly."

Principal Gordon's Argument. Principal Gordon began by pointing out that Queen's was not founded as a sectarian college, but in protest against the sectarianism of King's college, Toronto, the precursor of the present university.

The removal of denominational tests for the professors was sought by twenty-seven of the thirty-seven had to be Presbyterians, and the principal must be a Presbyterian minister. Relaxation of these conditions was sought. The death of Principal Grant had stopped the proceedings in parliament, and Principal Gordon's situation was so perfectly hopeless and complicated, he was unable immediately to grasp it.
