IS THIS PROPER PLACE TO ESTABLISH TUBERCULOSIS HOSPITAL?

General Hospital Governors to Consider the Question of Building One—Suggest Affiliating Nurses' School With Queen's. This afternoon, the general hospital governors will consider the question of establishing a tuberculosis hospital, an institution that is very much needed in Eastern Ontario. If government aid can be secured—both from the dominion and provincial governments—there is a likelihood that the hospital will be built. More than a fund for the erection of the building is required. The money for maintenance is the chief thing, for it costs a great deal to maintain a white plague institution. The diet alone is an expensive thing.

WOULD INCREASE RECEIPTS OF THE STREET RAILWAY TWENTY-FIVE PER CENT.

A citizen who is in favor of extending every possible consideration to the street railway company with regard to cheap power, says that the road is not earning what it should earn. If he was in charge of it, he would guarantee that he would increase the earnings by twenty-five per cent. The first thing he would do would be to engage married men as motormen and conductors, even if more wages had to be paid to them, for he claims, it would pay to do this. Married men would be more careful in every way than unmarried men. The citizen in question says that hundreds of passengers are lost to the cars by carelessness and thoughtlessness. Alert motormen and alert conductors are needed. There are some of these on the road, but they are not in the majority, he says.

Now Citizen Of Calgary.

Andrew A. Moore, business manager of the Morning Albertan, the leading liberal newspaper of Calgary, is in the city to spend a week or so. He was formerly with the Kingston Times and News. Since going to the far west he has succeeded well, as so many of Kingston's sons do when they seek their fortune in new fields. Mr. Moore expects that within five years Calgary will have a population of 50,000 and ten years hence it may embrace 100,000 inhabitants. Before joining the staff of the Albertan, Mr. Moore was associated with the celebrated "Dan" McMillen, on the Calgary News, a paper established three years ago. The Albertan is seven years of age.

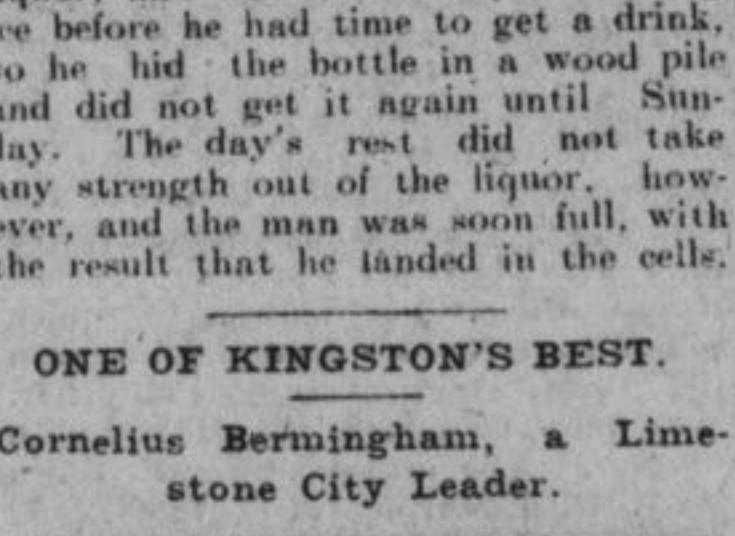
