OCCURRENCES RECOUNTED IN BRIEF FORM.

Matters That Interest Everybody
—Notes From All Over—Little of Everything Easily Read and Remembered.

The Congregational church will open new churches in Toronto, Montreal and other centres.

The French navy council has decided that the battleships units, in the fighting line of the French navy, shall number forty-five.

Toronto board of control has awarded to John Wagner, Cleveland, contracts for the construction of part of Toronto's trunk sewer.

Gignac & Beland's saw mills, Quebec, are after. The mills and the buildings of the Parisian Corset company will be reduced to ashes.

George Finlay, eight years old, son of Policeman Finlay, Ottawa, died, on Wednesday, from the effects of injury received in falling from a ladder.

The Spanish government considers that the Cuban debt was not repudiated by the treaty of Paris and the claim will be followed up.

Cear Nicholas has abandoned his plan to include Italy in the itinerary of his forthcoming European tour through fear of assassination.

At Quebec, Oliver Asselin was released from jail, Wednesday morning, having completed fifteen days' time for assault of Hon. L. A. Taschereau.

The Port Hope Baseball Club asked the town council to "skin" the field. It ploughed it ten inches deep and now the club cannot use the ground.

At St. Thomas, Ont., E. H. Millington, superintendent of telegraphs on the Michigan Central railway, at Detroit, lies in the hospital, unconscious, the result of a nervous ailment.

The application of the C. N. railway for approval of its plans of entrance to Ottawa, for the lines from Toronto to Montreal comes before the minister of railways on the 18th inst.

At Windsor, Ont., following unsuccessful attempts to negotiate with the striking workmen, the tunnel contractors have settled their labor trouble by arranging to bring in a large force of men.

At Sandwich, Ont., true bills against John and Charles Little, the Maidstone hotelkeepers, charged with subordination of perjury, in connection with a recent liquor law violation, have been returned.

IN SPECIAL EMINENCE.
Queen's University the National Life.

Toronto World.

It is unlikely that a careful report by a competent commission, after a full consideration of all the circumstances involved, will be set aside by the general assembly of Queen's University church next year. The resolution to refer the status of Queen's University to a commission must, therefore, be regarded as a wise and practical one. It removes many vexed issues from the arena which, even distinguished, as few are, for its moderation and calm sense, is not adapted for the examination and discussion of such detail as the university problem involves.

There will be no question of the trust and confidence reposed in the commission, nor of the faithfulness with which it will observe the responsibility laid upon it.

Great things depend upon the universities of Canada, and among them Queen's stands in a place of special eminence, inspired as it is with the ideals of an historic church, whose standards of upright dealing, high-minded and magnanimous thinking, and spiritual stability, have happily tintured Canadian character.

The union of such characteristics with the high type of scholarship associated with the traditions of Queen's is something of national importance, and the preservation of these ideals vividly underlies the intentions of those responsible for the movement for expansion.

Those who hold the nationality of Canada dear will rejoice at the existence of so strong, an effective a factor in the national life as that influenced by the determined and progressive scholarship cultivated by Grant and now fostered by Gordon.

British American, Chicago.

The suggestion was made in London not long ago that, in return for our observance of Empire day, there should be a celebration of "American day" by British admirers. Last week at the city of Kingston, Ont., two New York State regiments participated in the Victoria day exercises. The generation now in its knickerbockers is going to take a kindlier and more cordial view of the aforesaid international boundary than its forefathers did, and these exchanges of courtesy and goodwill are sure to become very common.
