

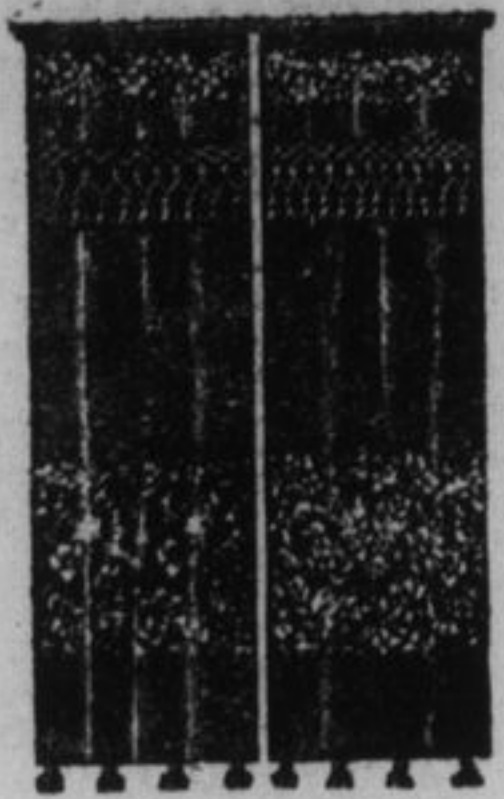

LEASING OF A WHARF DISCUSSED BY THE WATERWORKS COMMITTEE.

Proposition is made to the Donnelly Company, including the Cost of the Repairs Necessary at the Dock.

The leasing of the water works dock to the Donnelly company, was the chief matter up for consideration, at a meeting of the water works committee, held yesterday afternoon.

A letter was read from the Donnelly company in regard to the matter. The company stated that in reference to the new lease of the water works dock, they felt that the price set, \$300 per annum, was too high.

The chairman gave it as his opinion that the matter had been played long enough, and that it was time that something definite was reached.

The chairman said that it was his opinion that the dock could very easily be rented, and as he had hopes of the Welland canal being widened, he did not think it wise to lease the dock for more than two or three years.

The city proposes that a lease be granted to the Donnelly company, for a term of three years, from May 1st, 1909, at an annual rental of \$250, payable quarterly.

COMPLETION OF THE REPAIRS.

John C. Hunter petitioned to have the water main on Patrick street, extended from Montreal street, to Ragan Road. As all the necessary steps have been taken the committee will recommend that the petition be granted.

James Compton, who has a contract for watering lawns in the city, asked that the time not be limited in his case, as he could not cover his work in the hours allotted by the by-law. He guaranteed that there would be no waste of water.

Ald. Tove said that similar cases had been up for discussion on several occasions, and in view of the fact that these were others engaged in the same work as Mr. Compton, thought that the present by-law might be amended.

It was stated that the hours for watering lawns was not from 6 to 9 a.m. and from 4 to 8 p.m.

It was finally decided that a by-law be drawn up, which would call for the granting of a permit for the watering of lawns from four to eight hours, for the sum of \$3, and over eight hours up to fifteen at \$5 per annum.

Superintendent Hewitt was instructed to submit particulars of the new coal sheds, to be erected, for the next meeting, which will be held on Monday night.

NO STREET PARADE.
The Wild West Will Not Give a Street Pageant.

For many reasons the management of Buffalo Bill's Wild West and Pawnee Bill's Far East has decided to abandon the street parade which has, in the past, been the usual thing with travelling organizations of this size and character. It is set forth in many instances the late arrival of the trains bearing the paraphernalia makes it impossible to give a parade and start the afternoon performance on time. Through this delay the public is compelled to experience a tedious wait, while the work of preparing for the performance goes on. Again, it is considered an unnecessary hardship to compel men and horses to parade for two hours before beginning the afternoon exhibition, especially when it is considered that two shows every day are the rule with this exhibition.

By going away with the street pageant men and horses are fresh for their performance, and it would seem that the public is entitled to a perfect performance, which it pays for, rather than to a free street parade which gives, at best, but a poor idea of the magnitude of the exhibition. Another reason which has served to influence the decision is the fact that merchants in the cities visited object to parades because they interrupt business and interfere with general traffic. So strenuous is this objection that in many cities a permit to parade cannot be secured, and in other places the fee demanded is set at such an exorbitant rate that it practically prohibits street pageants.

In any event the management is satisfied that the public prefer an afternoon performance given with snap and vigor displaying the best efforts of the participants, rather than to have their entertainment interfered with through the fatigue of the participants after two or three hours of street parading in all sorts of weather. The public is reminded, however, that in moving the properties and paraphernalia of the exhibition from the railroad to the ground, will, in itself, constitute a parade of greater interest and vastly more novel than any other organization can offer. The engine and cars used in "The Great Train Hold-Up" will be accompanied through the street by a mounted escort, and the sight will be one which has never been seen in this or any other country save in conjunction with this exhibition. The Indians and Roughriders will ride their horses to the grounds and the sight will be an ample reward for the preparation of the hackman's Painless Corn Extractor, in twenty-four hours. Try it.
