## A STOCK RE-ACTION LIQUIDATION IN CATTLE MARKET.

Over a Million Shares Traded in Daily-Harriman Lines and Baltimore and Ohio Buying Steel Rails.

Letter by Reginald Burton. New York, June 11.—The process of liquidation which began during the early part of the week continued until the close of business on Friday. Transactions on the exchange since the first day of June have averaged over one million shares only. A few issues, such as Southern Pacific, United States Steel, Union Pacific and Reading, which, in activity, ranked in the order named. On the other hand there were some of the specialties quite active like Great Northern, Erie and Brunswick Dock, the latter reaching a new high level. Some say this is due to the probability of the receiver for the Atlantic, Birmingham and Atlantic being discharged, while others contend that there is so much shipping from Brunswick to Europe and South America by the cotton growers in the south, that it is destined to be one of the largest southern shipping centres. A rumor which probably had much to do with the decline in the latter part of the week was to the effect that a controversy had arisen as to what section on the Paris United States Steel should be traded in. Some of the French banking interests contended that the trading should be confined to the parquet or the colosse of the Bourse. The colosse in Paris is similar to our curb markets in New York and Boston.

It is reported that the Harriman lines have been large buyers of steel rails, taking 110,000 tons, while the Baltimore and Ohio railroad is now in the market for 135,000 tons. Prior to this improvement in the rail business had been expected that each month of the summer months would fall below the May business, for seasonal dullness can be expected in June, July and August in normal years. A continuation of the increased demand for rails may bring about a revision of this prediction, and as far as the current month is concerned the demand for rails has already been sufficient to indicate that the month's total will be larger than that of May. One of the heaviest operators in steel shares is known for Europe Wednesday, having closed out a big line of steel common, held by himself and associates.

In the cotton market there seems to be continued liquidations of the outside long and short interests in old crop options; however, it is not believed that the outside buyers of contracts will be permitted to reap the benefit by the advance. What influence the support of the Southern continent had on the market has been withdrawn. It is practically admitted on the floor of the Exchange that the long interests in July contracts for 50,000 bales have been sold to local spot interests for the same amount of October, the Southerners paying a premium of ten points in the trade. This deal has undoubtedly strengthened the local cotton situation. Favorable reports are being received concerning the trade conditions abroad. The weather is favorable over a greater part of the south, and crop advices are somewhat better, and the bears are very cautious about taking heavy risks on the short side.
