WRECKED SLAVONIA'S PASSENGERS.

Operator Coles Sent Out the Mess-Up By the Prinzess Irene, Which Hastened to the Scene.

Punta del Gada, Azores, June 12 .-Wireless telegraphy played a prominent part in the saving of the crew and passengers of the Cunard line steamer Slavonia, which, to-day, is a total The auxiliary gates at the Soo cawreck two miles south-west of Flores nal have been safely closed. Island. The wireless feat of the Mrs. William Jacobs, aged eightysteamer Republic was equalled, if not five years, was found dead at Brockexcelled.

The steamer Prinzess Irene was 180 miles away, when the thrilling call, "C.Q.D." was picked up. Immediately on receipt of the message of distress the operator flashed back his answer and learned the location of the stricken ship. The Prinzess Irene then hastened at full speed to the rescue, and every soul on board the Slavonia was

New York, June 14.-S. Coles, wireless operator of the wrecked steamer Slavonia, is the "Jack Binns" of the latest sea drama.

It was the "C.Q.D." message of Coles, sent toward midnight on Wednesday night, which was picked up by the Prinzess Irene, 180 miles senward, and which brought her to the rescue of the 410 passengers aboard the

wrecked steamer. The Marconi company has little data concerning Coles, except that he is an Englishman, and one of their most expert wireless men.

The first cablegram from Capt. Dunning, of the wrecked steamer Slavonia, was received, to-day, by the agents of the Cunard line in this city.
