EAT GUN COTTON

OMAHA GIRL'S ATTEMPT TO COMMIT SUICIDE.

She is Now Strapped to a Mattress So That She Cannot Move a Muscle—Doctors Using Chemicals to Dissolve the Explosive.

Omaha, June 15.—Helen Wells, a twenty-year-old girl, on Sunday night attempted suicide by eating a quantity of gun-cotton. All day Monday she has been resting on a heavy mattress, with a double set of springs and tied in such a manner that she cannot move a muscle.

In the meantime she is being dosed with chemicals in an effort to dissolve the explosive. Late Sunday night the girl was attacked by a woman roommate and was severely beaten. She was later placed on the bed with springs. Unless she explodes in a day's time the doctors hope the explosive will have become dissolved and the girl lie out of danger.

PHENOMENAL GROWTH.

Wheat Fully As Far Advanced As Last Year.

Winnipeg, June 15.—The statement made by the Canadian Northern railway agent at Aberdeen, Sask., in the company's crop report, is most significant in showing the phenomenal growth made by wheat since seeding. "The crop is two weeks ahead of last year at this time," he writes. When it is remembered that seeding was considerably later than last year, and that in 1908 the crop made fair progress at the beginning, the significance of this assertion can be appreciated, and Aberdeen is not a solitary instance, for from such widely separated points as Mundare and Carberry reports come that the crop looks as well as in any previous year at this time. The Canadian Northern railway crop report covers the whole west pretty thoroughly, and there is not a complaint from a long list of stations. The general report is that the weather has been most propitious, and that all the grain is coming on at a remarkable rate.

The height of wheat at a large number of points is said to average from eight to twelve inches. Some places report an average height of from four to six inches. Everywhere, it is said, the farmers are confidently looking forward to an abundant crop.

The feature of the report is the statement from Saskatoon, to the effect that the prairie land is in splendid condition for breaking, and that a very large area of virgin soil will be turned over this season.

DEATH OF MR. HUXTABLE.

Veteran Secretary of Dominion Alliance Passed Away.

Montreal, June 15.—Rev. G. G. Huxtable, secretary of the Dominion Alliance, died in the General Hospital on Monday morning. Although seventy-seven years of age, he had up to within a few days of his demise, been extremely busy, and in the recent Methodist conference at Pembroke the remark was general that for one so advanced in years, he showed marked vigor and interest in the proceedings. His speeches always command respect, and as late as a week ago yesterday he gave a rousing address before his brethren at Pembroke. Last Tuesday he contracted a chill, which affected one of his legs, which was very sore two years ago, and, gangrene setting in, he passed away in the presence of members of his family at two o'clock on Monday morning. He was born at High Bay, North Devon, England.

Mr. Huxtable is survived by his widow, three sons, William, of Cherterville, Ont.; the Rev. Charles, of West Shefford, and Robert, of Vancouver, B. C.; and two daughters, Mrs. W. J. Lewthwaite, of the Annex, and Miss Margaret Huxtable, at home. He was a former pastor of Cataract circuit.

A PRESBYTERIAN STALWART.

Reminiscences of the Late Rev. Dr. Bayne.

Saturday Night.

Reminiscences of the late Rev. Dr. Bayne have been told at the Presbyterian general assembly. Hon. James Young recalls him as a little boy, then in adult life when on week days he kept nineteen clay pipes alternately in commission, so that to enter his study was to imagine that a conflagration was in progress, with considerable damage from smoke. Nevertheless, he was one of the earliest clergymen to take a stand against the liquor traffic. It must be remembered that the total abstinence movement is a purely modern one, borrowed less than an hundred years ago by Christians from the teachings of Mahomet. It is said that temperance was sorely needed among the settlers whom Dr. Bayne came to comfort because whiskey was then only twenty cents a gallon, and before the days of agricultural machinery was a part of the hired man's perquisite on the harvest field.

Dr. Bayne was commissioned by the synod of Upper Canada in 1842, to visit Scotland and obtain ministers for the growing Presbyterian faith in this country. He arrived there to find the disruption movement, headed by Chalmers (which has passed into history, but which has not ended yet in Scotland), in full growth of its youth. He threw in his lot with the so-called "Free Church" and on his return to Canada endeavored to induce his brethren here to throw off the connection with the Established Church of Scotland. When the general synod of Canada met at Kingston, in 1844, he led out many laymen and twenty-three ministers to establish a Free Church in Canada. He could be hardly called a judicious man, for the Upper Canada of his day demanded religious instruction in conduct much more than theories as to church government. Perhaps it was due to his impulsive dis-
