HEARD THE REPORTS OF WORK OF WOMAN'S MISSIONARY AUXILIARY.

An Interesting Review of the Meeting With Happy Details. The Impressions of Delegates.

More than a hundred people took advantage of the invitation of the president of the Woman's Auxiliary of the diocese of Ontario, Miss Macaulay, to meet at her house, on King street, on Tuesday, and hear brief reports of the Prescott annual meeting. Miss Annie Macleod, president of St. George's cathedral branch, was in the chair. Mrs. Havelock Price, the new diocesan recording secretary, gave a talk on the meeting in general, which by its informality gave opportunity for the mentioning of interesting details which would have been omitted in a written report.

Various diocesan officers spoke on their respective parts of the work, and Mrs. Thomas Tandy and Mrs. F. Welch, of St. James' church, gave their impressions. The former dwelt on the delight her hearers felt at Mrs. Heber Hamilton's talks. Mrs. J. O. Crisp, from St. John's, Portsmouth, and Mrs. R. S. Forneri, diocesan treasurer, from St. Luke's, spoke of the encouragement the annual meeting had brought to their branches.

Miss Macaulay touched interestingly on several points and asked Canon Starr to close the meeting. Before doing this he said he had been much struck with the simple directness of the reports given, and of the appeals made, and especially commended the spirit of prayer in which the auxiliary's works are carried on.

After the meeting, which was enthusiastic and enjoyable, those present had a cup of tea, Miss Deacon presiding at the table, and some of the younger auxiliary workers, there, assisting her.
