

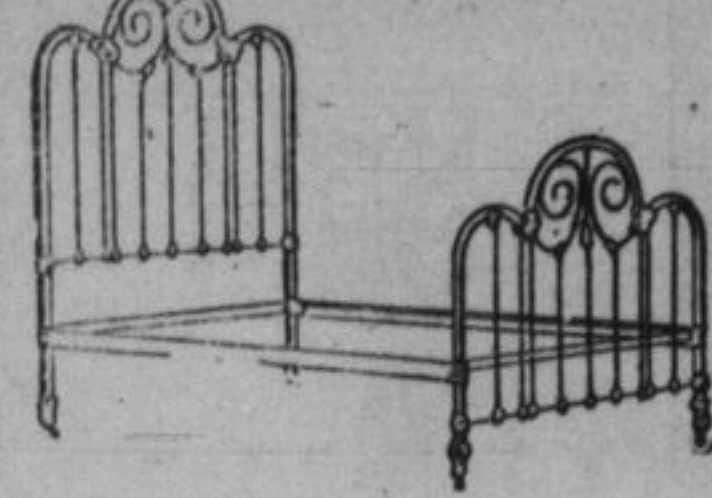

QUIET MILITARY CAMP WILL LIGHT THE DIALS 14TH REGT. ON PARADE OF CITY HALL CLOCK AT INSPECTED BY GEN. LAKE AT CRICKET FIELD. HALF THE COST

Particular Attention Paid to Musketry and Sub-target Practice—Very Little For the Army Medical Corps to Do So Far.

The Barrieffield camp still goes merrily on. The Heights is certainly a busy place these days, and when one is told there are only 1,200 men in camp he cannot believe it when he sees it from a distance. The camp is now all laid out, everybody settled and at regular work. The different units are still vying with one another which lines are to be the finest and kept the best. They are all very neat and clean, especially those of the regulars.

The different regiments paraded for musketry practice to-day, using the new rifle ranges for aiming and firing. The different battalions were divided up, in half-companies, one half company shooting at a time.

The sub-target guns will also be used by the men again this year. They are now all in place, under a big tent, far away from the camp proper, over near the ranges. There are five machines in place.

The new water lines are the pride of the camp. Every unit in camp has pipes running through its lines and there is no scarcity of water at any time or place, even for the watering carts to water the roads.

The 4th Hussars are a good looking squad this year, and Lt.-Col. Holmes can be proud of them. It would not be camp without the old 4th.

The army medical corps had very little to do, as the boys at camp are all healthy fellows, and take no chances of getting their arms and legs broken in any way. The medical boys have lots of drill every day to keep them going.

Many infantry officers from the camp went over to the Royal Military College, this morning, to attend a lecture by Major de Bury. Lectures will be given to the volunteer officers at different times during the camp session.

The shooting at the new rifle ranges opened on Wednesday afternoon, Col. Gordon, camp commandant, scoring the first bulls-eye. The range has been in active use ever since.

No accidents were reported since camp opened of a serious type. Everything is running smoothly.

The camp medical officer to-morrow is Maj. W. W. Sander, range officer, Lieut. N. McLeod, A.M.C.; veterinary officer, Vet. Lieut. McCormack, 5th Battalion.

The wearing of plain clothes by the troops in camp is strictly prohibited, and steps will be taken to see that the order is strictly enforced.

The following medical officers will constitute the standing medical board for the camp: President, Lieut.-Col. E. Kidd, 4th Hussars; members, Maj. H. H. Alger, 49th Regiment; Capt. F. E. Eberington, No. 111, Cav., E. A. unit.

All units or detachments in camp that have not a medical officer on their establishment, parade their sick at the Cavalry Field Ambulance, at 6:30 a.m.

These regiments will parade for musketry on Friday: 16th, 49th and 4th Hussars.

Lieut.-Col. V. A. S. Williams, inspector of cavalry, will inspect the 4th Hussars in camp on the 21st.

WILL HAVE A TRIP.

The 14th Regiment will have a trip, in spite of the fact that the proposed outing to Elmira, N.Y., has been called off. The men appear to be rather disappointed over the calling off of the trip, and the officers have taken the matter up, and have decided that another trip will be arranged for, and this will be good news for all the "soldier boys." The place for the outing has not yet been decided upon, but this matter will be discussed, at a meeting to be held in the course of a few days. Niagara Falls has been mentioned for the trip.

The Men Were Given a Drilling Which Lasted For An Hour and a Half—Large Crowd of People View Manoeuvres of City "Soldier Boys."

The members of the 14th regiment, P. O. R., were out on parade, last night, and were inspected at the cricket field by General Lake. The city "soldier boys" were given a drilling which lasted for an hour and a half. As usual, a large crowd of citizens turned out to see the parade and the manoeuvres at the cricket field, and from a spectator's standpoint the regiment made a most creditable showing.

The regiment formed in line at the armories shortly before eight o'clock, and marched to the cricket field via Montreal, Princess and Bagot streets, and General Lake, who arrived in the city early in the evening, was met by officers of the Eastern Ontario command and taken direct to the cricket field, the men being formed up when the party arrived. Both the brass and bugle bands were out, and the regiment was in full trim. Lt. Col. Cunningham being in command. There was a march past, with various other manoeuvres, all of which was most interesting. General Lake went through the ranks and made a most thorough inspection.

It was 9:45 o'clock when the regiment formed in line for the return march to the armories, and the route was via Barrie, King, Clarence and Montreal streets. The soldiers in camp had the opportunity of witnessing the parade of the regiment, and a great many of them took advantage of it. The evening was fine and cool for drilling and the men appeared to enjoy it.

The showing made by the bugle band, under Sergt. B. Simpson, called for favorable comment at the inspection. The band is in better shape this year than ever before, and it is due to the untiring efforts of the sergeant in command.

Remarks Of Gen. Lake.

Upon the return of the regiment, to the armories, Gen. Lake addressed the men briefly, stating that the men had made an excellent showing, and that he was well pleased with the work of the entire regiment, and would report accordingly to the minister of militia.

Gen. Lake referred in particular to the company drill, stating that the work was very good. The improvement, no doubt, was due to having each officer in charge drilling the men, instead of a special instructor. A company officer, who became well acquainted with the men, could get far better work from them.

After the dismissal of the regiment, Gen. Lake was entertained by the officers of the 14th Regiment, together with officers from the 40th and 49th Regiments in camp.

OF CITY HALL CLOCK AT INSPECTED BY GEN. LAKE AT CRICKET FIELD.

The dials of the city hall dome clock will be lighted at less than half the cost of those in the old dome. This was the announcement made yesterday afternoon to the city property committee, by the chairman, Ald. Angrove, who said that, acting on the advice of the clock expert and the architect, the dial sections inside the dome had been painted white. An electric wire had been run up, and experiments made by electric lamps. It was found that two ten-candle power lamps give better light than ever was got before, and, therefore, the new dials can be lit for less than half the cost of what the dials in the old dome cost. Altogether it would cost only about \$300 to instal the lighting. What remains to be done, will cost about \$20. The chairman was instructed to have the work completed, which will be done in a few days.

The chairman was requested to take up with the city engineer the question of making the masonry of the city buildings waterproof, and to have the necessary work proceeded with as soon as possible.

He was also instructed to get the lower section of the dome base, just above the stone walls, painted to the galvanized iron above. At present it is almost black, and a little grey paint will cause a big improvement. The galvanized iron work can't be painted this year, as the paint won't adhere till the iron is exposed to the weather.

A letter was received from F. W. Spangenberg, stating that the city dome clock had been completely installed. The sum of \$350 is held by the city on the contract, until a certain time expires.

Ald. Nickle asked the chairman if he knew that the weather vane sticks. The chairman said he did not. "Well it does," said Ald. Nickle and Toye, who asked that it be fixed. The chairman promised to attend to the matter. Ald. Nickle said that on Tuesday the wind was blowing from a certain direction, and the weather vane was pointing three-quarters in the opposite direction.

In attendance at the meeting were Alds. Angrove, Nickle, Toye and Tweedell.

Partial Eclipse To-Night.

A partial eclipse of the sun, visible in this part of the world, will take place just before sunset this evening. The moon will pass across the sun's northern limb, covering about half of it. As sunset comes a little after eight o'clock, the end of the eclipse will not be seen here, but west of the great lakes the partial phase will be seen in its entirety.

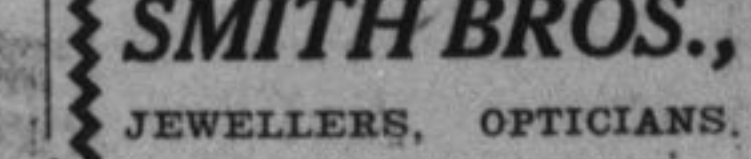
