GIVES GOOD START

OPPORTUNITIES OF CIVIL SERVICE NOT GRASPED.

Few Men Are Applying—Plenty of Women Write on the Examinations—Chance For University People.

"C. F. H." in Toronto News. Ottawa, June 17.—The civil service commission has been in office long enough to form some idea of the work before it, and for the people here to get some idea of how it is going about its duties. On the whole, its first few months of office have been devoid of sensational events.

The incident which has aroused most comment was the lack of competition at its first examination for the higher posts. A white paper, Prof. Shortt in a public address, seriously advised young Canadians to turn their attention to the civil service, and the careers and prizes which it henceforward will offer. For this he was rebuked by a newspaper whose foible is omniscience. Prof. Shortt, his critic observed, would know if he were not inevitably ignorant that for every government job there are fifty applicants, and for him to advise young Canadians to seek for government positions was absurd. Well, the first examination under the rules of the new civil service competitions has taken place and there were not enough candidates to fill the higher positions which were vacant. Thirty-five clerks for the second division were needed; it was stipulated that all were to be men, and there were only fourteen competitors.

The critic had forgotten one condition. There are fifty applicants for one government job when there is no competitive examination applied. When you must meet real qualifications things are different.

The circumstances are interesting. There were ninety-five vacancies for the third division, where the work is of a routine nature, and the prospects of promotion exceedingly slight. Women were allowed to compete, and there were plenty of competitors. But there were very few men; the number who tried the examination for the third division was thirty-one, or 32.6 per cent. of the positions vacant. For the thirty-five vacancies in the second division, which is expressly designed to be the training ground for the future leaders of the service, there were fourteen competitors, or exactly forty per cent. Had women been allowed to compete for these clerkships, as it was, several university women, who, on the ground of scholarship, could easily have qualified for the second division, wrote for the third. It may be noted that the clerkships in the second division, for which competition was invited, involved duties such as travelling, which women, it was deemed, would find unbecomingly.

The situation thus seems to be that the men of the country are reluctant to enter the service, and that there is no dearth of applicants among the women. This situation has been developing for some time, and the introduction of competitive examinations has merely brought it into sharper relief.

It may be interpreted that little or no inconvenience is expected to follow the lack of applicants. Some cases are not urgent, and in any event re-organization in some departments would enable them to get on with their present staff.

The examination which was set for the second division, on the whole, was of about second year university standing.

It is not to be thought that competition for these examinations is restricted to university students. Any Canadian who are of suitable age can compete, but men who are in a position to have special advantages in preparing for examinations which are a test of general knowledge rather than of special aptitude. It is probable that when the university students of Canada really grasp the fact that a place in the service, with a fair prospect of promotion, and an interesting and honorable career, can be got by the simple process of passing high enough in an examination such as they must face every year, they will begin to pay attention to the matter. This year the notice which was very brief and it is doubtful whether the students as a body really grasped the situation.

A gradual stiffening of the examination is of course to be expected, although it is not likely to come for some little while yet. The next step will be to draw up a program of studies, the university already are making preparations to prepare men for the test.

The Commission must choose between what may roughly be described as the English and American ideas in regard to competitive examinations. The American idea, which is likely to command the assent of the average man at first sight, is that when a position falls vacant the test should deal with the special information which the occupant of that office will need; if he is to be a geologist, let him be tried in geology alone; if he is to add up figures, or his arithmetic education, it is argued, and yet be unsuited to the requirements of the particular post to which he is assigned. The English theory, which was laid down long ago by Lord Macaulay, is that what is wanted is a man of good general education and intelligence, who can fill, not merely the position for the moment vacant, but others, which may offer themselves in the course of his career. Then, a man who knows only one thing, and not really know that, for he is unable to relate his special subject with other branches of the world's activities. Again, it is only just to the competitor so to arrange the examination that if he fails he will not have lost his time; an unsuccessful candidate for the Indian Civil Service, say, can turn to face the world with an education which will be of value to him in almost any walk of life.

On the whole, it may be said that the Commission leans to the English idea. There are necessary limitations, however; if a position is absolutely technical, and if the man who fills it is likely to remain there all his life, the arrangements for holding a purely

BURGLAR PROOF GLASS.

Firm is Now Engaged in Making It.

The glass under consideration is manufactured at St. Gobain, in this district, and in reply to a communication from this consulate requesting particulars, the manager of the works writes as follows: "It was on account of an extra audacious robbery committed in a jewelry store at Marseille that a trial was made to utilize our extra strong, polished plate glass as a greater protection against the smashing of the show window. While an ordinary plate glass, such as is usually put in jewelers' show windows, was smashed to atoms by one single stroke with a metal trimmed mallet, the same attempt to break the 'dalle polie' furnished by our works proved entirely fruitless. They then proceeded to throw a large piece of cast iron with extreme violence at the show window, and all they succeeded in doing was to make a small hole into it measuring only a few centimeters. Thereupon several shots of a revolver with steel case balls were fired at the window with no further damage to the window than the entering of the balls into it to the depth of a few millimeters. The plate glass which will stand all such usage is ordinarily made of a thickness of from twenty to twenty-five millimeters (0.787 to 0.984 inch); but, if desired, a heavier plate can be made without in the least diminishing the transparency of the glass."—United States Consular Reports.
