

AFTER RED MURRAY MAN SAYS HE WILL NOT BE TAKEN ALIVE.

Crack Shot From Montana—Red Has Also Achieved Fame As a Horse Ruster and Jail-Breaker and Sharp Fight is Expected.

Humboldt, Sask., June 19.—The Humboldt detachment of the Royal North West Mounted Police are having a hot chase after a Montana bad man, who is working the country to the north of here, literally armed to the teeth.

A few days ago he rode into Vico, "lifted" six valuable horses, which he drove northwards with him.

According to a report received, a posse of twelve Mounted Police are within half an hour's ride of him and momentarily word is expected of a fight which will last until the ruster is either killed or put out of business.

As far as can be learned this man, "Red" Murray, alias Ryan, escaped from the provincial jail in Winnipeg some two years ago, and has since made his headquarters in the vicinity of the Big Muddy river, Montana.

It is understood the state of Montana has offered a big reward for his capture on account of his rustling operations in that state.

When he escaped from Winnipeg jail he was awaiting trial on a charge of horse-stealing, and the Montana authorities were also after him at that time on a similar charge, but he has since added to his crimes many times over and the police of Montana and the Mounted Police are more than ever anxious to lay their hands on him.

MISTAKE DREW FIRE. Captain of Steamer Unaware of Prohibited Zone.

Stockholm, June 19.—Coyne, the fireman on board the British steamer Woodburn, of Newcastle, that was fired upon in Pitkanas Bay, Wednesday night, by a vessel of the Russian squadron patrolling the rendezvous of Emperor Nicholas and Emperor William, sustained only slight injuries and will probably be able to leave the hospital, where he was removed, in a few days.

He declares that three other members of the crew sustained slight injuries from the Russian's fire. Further details of the occurrence show that the Woodburn steamed during the night within the prohibited zone of navigation in the vicinity of Pitkanas Bay.

CRAMMED INTO TRUNK. Was the Body of a Murdered Woman.

New York, June 19.—The body of a young white woman, who had been strangled to death, was found early last evening, crammed into a trunk in the room occupied by William L. Leon, a young educated Chinaman, at 732 Eighth avenue.

VOTED THEM DOWN AMENDMENT IN REGARD TO PRINT PAPER.

Canada to Prevent the Export of Logs or Wood Pulp—Want a Duty So High That Plan Will Be Frustrated.

Washington, June 19.—The Senate late yesterday afternoon, voted down several amendments relating to the duty on print paper and accepted the finance committee's amendment, which increases the duty from \$2 a ton, as fixed in the bill by the House of Representatives, to \$4 a ton, which is two-thirds of the present rate in the Dingley law.

Explaining that there was a great international question pending before the Senate which did not exist when the House passed the tariff bill, Mr. Aldrich said Canada had adopted a policy, announced by the premier, by which it was intended effectually to prevent the export of logs or wood pulp.
