TOWEL ROUND NECK A YOUNG WOMAN GOT BUSY IN MONTREAL.

Her Attempt at Suicide Was Frustrated And She Has Been Put Up At Police Headquarters.

Montreal, June 19.—Charged with having attempted suicide in Notre Dame Hospital, by tying a towel round her neck in an effort to strangle herself, Mrs. Robinette Howard, a young French Canadian woman, who came here a few weeks ago from Cobalt, Ont., and entered the hospital to undergo an operation, was taken to police headquarters last night. She was first placed in a padded cell, but as soon as Lieut. Morin could get in communication with Dr. Picotte the police surgeon, he had the woman taken to the Notre Dame hospital, where she will be guarded by a policeman until she is brought before the court on the warrant on which she was arrested.

Mrs. Howard would give no reason for the attempt on her life, but it was so evident she was out of her mind that the police did not try to question her. She will be committed for examination as to her sanity.

Honors The Dean.

On Thursday next the degree of doctor of divinity will be conferred upon Dean Bidwell, at the convocation of Bishop's College, Lennoxville. WHY HE GAVE MONEY FORMER SULTAN LIVES IN DREAD OF DEATH

Trembles At the Least Incident, and Has Become Wretchedly Nervous.

Paris, June 19.—The Temps published an interview with Fethi Bey, who is at present the chief guardian of the ex-sultan of Turkey, Fethi Bey describes how he induced Abdul Hamid to give up his vast fortune, deposited in various foreign banks, to the Turkish government. He pointed out to Abdul Hamid that so long as he retained this money under his personal control many people would think he would use it for the purpose of bringing about a reactionary revolution.

Having taken twenty-four hours to consider the matter Abdul Hamid signed orders on various foreign banks for the whole of his fortune to be delivered up. He only asked that Fethi Bey should give him a receipt for the documents.

The ex-sultan, says the Temps, thirst for news of the outside world. He asks constantly for news of the army, the parliament, the new sultan and his former associates. The fear of death still haunts him and he trembles at the least incident.

At times he has fits of depression and anger. He walks about his apartments talking loudly to himself. He is under the impression that he is being slowly done to death, and complains that his allowance is not enough. He smokes cigarettes all the day, and takes great care of his clothes and his personal appearance. Every day he dyes his hair and puts fresh touches rouge and powder on his haggard, furrowed face.

FOURTH ESTATE BEREAVED.

Death Of A Journalist Of Old Time Fame.

The death has occurred at Toronto of A. H. St. Germain, a pioneer newspaper publisher, formerly of the Kingston Herald, and looked upon as the only surviving godfather of the Whig, having seen the first edition in process of production in 1834. He was more proud of his journalistic career than of his success in the gold fields, or his business career. He died in his eighty-first year, bearing respect for an honorable and well-spent life.
