A FIFTY DOLLAR TAX PUT ON LAUNDRIES BY THE CITY COUNCIL.

Chief of Police Made Bread Inspector—Board of Works Hears About Concrete Mixer That Will Save Money on Walks.

The city council met last evening and had a two hour session. It is customary to adjourn for three months at this time, but no such prorogation took place for there's much important business to come before the council before any holidays can be taken. There are likely to be a couple of meetings during the next fortnight.

The chief business transacted was probably done in two minutes, or just before the council adjourned. It was the placing of a license for fifty dollars on laundries and charging twenty-five dollars for transfer of business. This, it is understood, is aimed at the Chinamen, to keep them under control.

R. Meek, secretary House of Industry, asking that the health officer be required to report each week as to patients in that institution.

O. V. Bartels and other residents of Alfred street north, asking to have the nuisance from an open sewer grate removed.

Thomas Cooke, asking to have his dog tax struck off.

Agnes Wood, asking to have a tree removed on Concession street.

H. W. Newman Electric company, asking permission to place an electric sign over their premises on Princess street.

Robert Lipman and others, re gramophones in theatriciums.

Alexander J. O'Brien and others, re by-law prohibiting the use of gramophones in theatriciums.

Smythe, King and Smythe wrote regarding the removal of certain vessels sunk in the lower harbor, and stated that the Montreal Transportation company was anxious to do anything to improve the harbor. Some of its sunken barges were for use. Before further action is taken by the council, the solicitor asked to be notified.

City Solicitor McIntyre reported that the harbormaster had secured the signatures of a number of marine men to a petition to be presented to the minister of marine and fisheries asking that the city clock tower light be continued for the benefit of mariners coming into Kingston harbor. The petition would first be sent to the Dominion Marine Association.

Reports Presented.
The mayor reported that the Bell Telephone company would renew its agreement with the city under the same terms as the one about to expire—that is \$7500 a year for the franchise and also fifteen telephones at a reduced rate. The old agreement was for five years.

On motion of Alds. Givens and Chown, the matter of renewing the Bell Telephone franchise was referred to the finance committee with power to act.

The finance committee recommended that a by-law be passed to stop gramophones playing where the horns of the same are exposed to a public street or square; also that Herbert Hemstock be released from his contract with the city in regard to establishing a sulphuric acid plant on the angle site.

The clause regarding gramophones was referred back to the committee, and the second was adopted.

Dr. J. H. Bell advised the council and asked the privilege of building porticos in front of his houses on Cherry street, and encroaching a little on the street line.

The board of works had a recommendation in its report refusing this request, but as the clause was not sufficiently signed, it was dropped from the report, and is still in the hands of the committee.

The finance committee made these recommendations: That John Elmer, deputy chief, be allowed two months' leave of absence, the date to be determined by the chairman. That the committee on purchasing horses be authorized to incur any reasonable expense necessary to employ a man to go outside of this district to purchase horses.

This report was adopted.
The city engineer wrote the chairman of the board of works that the London Concrete Machinery company had written him concerning a concrete mixer, which it would like to give a trial here. By purchasing two mixers, \$225 would be saved on this year's walk, and the machines would also be paid for out of the total saving. The matter was referred to the board of works.

Other Business.
On motion of Alds. Elliott and Free, it was decided to appoint Ald. McCann chairman of the industries committee, as its representative to join the delegation of city councils and Boards of Trade from Winnipeg to Prescott, to wait upon the dominion government with reference to deepening the Welland canal.

Ald. McCann, that the request of Dr. J. H. Bell, for permission to build porticos over the street line on Cherry street west, be granted. The mayor, however, ruled the motion out of order, as that matter has not been reported upon by the board of works, to which it was referred recently. There was a brief but hot discussion upon the ruling, but it was terminated by Ald. Clugston's motion to adjourn.

Advices Not To Pay.

City Solicitor McIntyre has advised the council not to pay the claim of Chief of Police Graham, Napanee, for the statutory reward of \$200 allowed those who assist in catching a horse thief. Chief Graham caught one who was afterwards convicted in Kingston police court, and he asked for the reward. City Solicitor McIntyre says he does not think the statute applies to police officials. Furthermore, the city has passed no by-law allowing of rewards of this kind. The solicitor further points out that Kingston police have never asked rewards from the town of Napanee for work they have done in connection with wrong doers, and thinks there should be reciprocity between the two places in regard to crime.

Tenders For Gas Tank.

The light, heat and power committee has received two tenders for rebuilding the concrete foundation of the gas tank. It is understood that the amounts are reasonable. No award has been made as the committee wants a little more information from one of the tenderers. The information may be secured within a few days.

The city solicitor has advised the committee not to accept \$733 of force (without prejudice) by J. M. Campbell, Rochester, N.Y., in full of all liability in connection with the present concrete foundation.

A CANADIAN NAVY

MOST IN FAVOR WITH THE GOVERNMENT.

Hon. Mr. Brodeur Thinks Quebec the Best Place for a Dry-Dock—Congratulating the Managing Director.

Montreal, June 22.—In discussing the question of a dry dock for Montreal with Hon. Mr. Brodeur, yesterday, a deputation from the Chamber de Commerce also incidentally brought up the question of Canada's participation in imperial naval defence. With reference to a dry dock, Mr. Brodeur told the delegation that, as between Montreal and Quebec, the latter city seemed to afford a more advantageous location for the shipping of the St. Lawrence as a whole. On naval defence, Mr. Brodeur intimated that the policy of a Canadian navy was most in favor with the government. Three propositions were open to Britain, for a couple of breadnoughts, to give a straight amount of money, or build our own navy. As he had, as expressed himself in favor of the latter alternative.

The case of Jules Fournier, editor of Le Nationaliste, recently sentenced to three months' imprisonment for contempt of court, seems likely to brew a case celebre. Armand Lavigne, M.P., a prominent nationalist, declared, to-day, that the case would be carried to the privy council if necessary. Judge Carroll has granted the petition for the issuing of a writ of habeas corpus which is returnable to-morrow. Fournier, who is now in the jail infirmary, will be remembered, strongly criticized the action of the quebec courts in the case of Oliver Asselin, who was sent to jail for striking Hon. Mr. Taschereau as the result of some statements made on the floor of the legislature about Asselin. Mr. Lavigne claims that there was no contempt of court in the Le Nationaliste, as the cases were all concluded and the court was not sitting at the time the article was published.

Hon. R. Haldane, secretary of state for war, has cabled from London to F. W. Thompson, managing director of the Ogilvie Milling company. 'Congratulations on your patriotism in giving extra holidays to your militia employees. Such an example stimulates and encourages us here.' Lord Roberts had already cabled his congratulations, personally, but this comes direct from the British government.

WATERING CARTS INJURED.

Driving Over Rough Bridge—Fire On The Bridge.

Street Watering Contractor McFadden, perhaps best knows the miserable condition of Catarqui bridge, in which some boards are two and three inches above others. The city waters the bridge, up Barrieffield hill to the military camp ground, and water has to be carried from the corner of Queen and Ontario streets over the bridge. On Monday, Contractor McFadden says that three of the city carts sustained injury in being driven over the 'corridor' bridge. A five-ton wagon, full of water, requires an even surface to escape injury. One of the carts had a spring broken. About 3:30 o'clock, Monday afternoon, a mounted officer galloped over the bridge to Mr. McFadden, who was driving across, to tell him that the living arched, to tell him that the banking two-thirds of the way over towards the Pittsburg shore was afire. Mr. McFadden was soon at the spot, and extinguished the flames by opening the watering cart sprays. Had he not been there, there assuredly would have been considerable damage done.

AT THE POLICE COURT.

Three Cases Occupied Attention Of Magistrate.

Three cases occupied the attention of Magistrate Farrell this morning, but the session was a brief one. A city dealer was fined \$5 and costs, or fifteen days, because he did not remove a gasoline holder from the wharf at the foot of Clarence street, when requested to do so. Frederick Watkins was fined \$2 and costs, or twenty days in jail, on a charge of drunkenness, and Patrick McEvoy, who has been before the magistrate many times, was up on a similar charge. McEvoy pleaded hard for another chance, stating that if the court allowed him to go this time he would leave the city. With McEvoy it was a case of 'out again, in again,' as he was only released from the jail a week ago. He was given the chance, the magistrate stating that if he came before him again he would send him to jail for the rest of the summer.

New Members Initiated.

The Daughters of Rebekkah initiated a number of new members, last night, and the affair took the form of a 'social gathering,' which was most delightful to all who were present. Fifty members came up from Gananoque for the occasion, and took part in the proceedings. After the business there was dancing and refreshments. Crosby & O'Connor's orchestra provided the music.
