**PETITION TO COUNCIL
TO ALLOW GRAMOPHONES
TO OPERATE**

In Front of Theatroids As Usual
—Theatre Owners Declare the
Petition Against Them Con-
tains False Statements.

The following petition was presented
to the city council last evening
in regard to the theatroid gram-
ophone by-law which is to be consid-
ered:

"To the honorable the mayor and
common council of the city of King-
ston:

"The petition of Robert Lipman,
Gordon Staley, A. Burrows and the
King Edward, of the city of Kingston,
humbly sheweth:

"That your petitioners are engaged
in business as exhibitors of moving
pictures, and are dependent for their
livelihood and subsistence upon the
said business.

"That the prosperity and well being
of their said business is grievously
threatened by a bill now pending
before your honorable body, operating
to deprive your petitioners of the use
of gramophones as a means of at-
tracting patronage to their several
exhibitions.

"That the said gramophones are
essential to the prosperity of your
petitioners, and that their prohibition
will operate to render their said oc-
cupation unprofitable and to cause their
ruin.

"That your petitioners were granted
licenses by your honorable body,
and paid therefor the full sums de-
manded by your honorable body, and
invested large sums in their several
exhibitions with the faith, belief and
expectation that your honorable body
would not restrain them in the pur-
suit of their business, but, on the
contrary, would encourage and protect
them as business men operating under
licenses from your honorable body.

"That the use of gramophones by
merchants has been permitted by
your honorable body in the same
manner as practiced by your petition-
ers, for many years, and that for
many months before any of your peti-
tioners engaged in their present busi-
ness, a certain alien and foreign cor-
poration, to wit the United States
Show company, of the city of Water-
town, in the state of New York, one
of the United States of America, then
operating the theatroid known as
"Wonderland," was licensed by your
honorable body and was permitted to
use a gramophone for the before men-
tioned purpose, without let or hind-
rance by your honorable body.

"That your petitioners, on the con-
trary, are loyal, born Canadians and
bona fide residents of the city of
Kingston; that in addition to your
said license they pay a heavy business
tax and also a provincial tax, and
that your petitioners engaged in this
said business and became your licen-
sees with full faith and belief that
your honorable body would not de-
prive them of a privilege essential to
their welfare and which had been free-
ly allowed to aliens and strangers,
and which had already been enjoyed
for so long a time.

"That the certain petition praying
for a prohibition of the said gram-
ophones, and signed by a minority of
less than 30 per cent. of house and
store holders of the neighborhood,
does not express the general opinion
of the neighborhood, or the actual
opinion of many of the signers.

"That many of the signatures there-
to were obtained by means of pers-
uasion, and that the writers of these
said signatures have no personal ob-
jections to the said phonographs.

"And your petitioners further assert
that some of the proponents of the
said petitions have circulated certain
untrue statements calculated to pre-
judice your honorable body in favor
of the said proposed bill, to wit:

"That your petitioners are in the
enjoyment of large profits from their
business. That the prohibition of the
said gramophones will not materially
injure the business of your petition-
ers. That some of your petitioners
are willing that the said gramophones
should be prohibited. That the gram-
ophones are operated until midnight.
That the gramophones create sickness
among the public.

"Your petitioners aver that the
above statements all and several are
untrue and that the contrary is the
case, and your petitioners further
aver:

"That the said gramophones are
not a nuisance to persons in ordinary
physical and mental health, and that
if they are a nuisance to any persons
it is only to those in a condition of
nervous debility, persons to whom
all street noises are of necessity ob-
noxious and who in their own inter-
ests should not reside in a business
thoroughfare.

"Your petitioners beg your hon-
orable body that you will not do the
great injury to their business involved
in the proposed by-law, and your
petitioners, as in duty bound, will
ever pray.

To the Honorable the Mayor and Com-
mon Council of the City of King-
ston:

We, the undersigned, being informed
that a by-law is pending before your
honorable body to prohibit the use of
gramophones in and about theatroids,
and that the same is regarded as a
nuisance, beg to inform your hon-
orable body that we have no objection
to the said gramophones, and that we
do not believe it in the best interests
of the city that the said by-law
should be adopted by council.

The petition needs 125 signatures as
against 56 signatures in favor of the
by-law, the same territory being can-
vassed by both parties. Among the
