FINED \$40 AND COSTS CONFECTIONER CHARGED IN POLICE COURT.

Samuel Levine was found guilty of selling ice cream and fruit on Sunday last—Considerable Evidence was Taken—Constable Arnie Laid the Charge.

At the police court this morning Samuel Levine, confectioner, Ontario street, was fined \$40 and costs, or one month, for selling ice cream and fruit on Sunday last.

The first witness in the case said that last Sunday, between 2.30 and 4 o'clock, he went into Levine's store, which was open on Sunday.

A third witness said he was acquainted with Levine's store. He was in the store Sunday afternoon, between 2.30 and 4 o'clock.

Witness told Mr. Rigney that he noticed cakes being served to customers. "My instructions are that this man should not sell anything but ice cream unless you were served with a meal," said Mr. Rigney.

Sgt. Snodden said he was in Levine's store at 3.45 p.m. last Sunday. He noticed several young men in the store, some of whom were having ice cream soda.

The witness smiled. He said that he served him eggs and beefsteak. He sold his sandwiches at 5c. each.

Witness said he did not see any fruit to the men who had given evidence. He denied telling any of the witnesses that he could not serve ice cream unless they had sandwiches.

The lady clerk in Levine's store was also called. She told of being at work on Sunday afternoon last but did not remember any of the previous witnesses being in the store.

Witness said there was a card with the goods for sale and Mr. Levine acted as cook. To Mr. Whiting witness said that when customers asked for ice cream she told them that they must have sandwiches with it.

Magistrate Farrel said that from the evidence it appeared quite clear to him that a pretence had been made at serving meals. He was satisfied that the three men giving evidence had told the truth and that they had been served with ice cream and fruit.

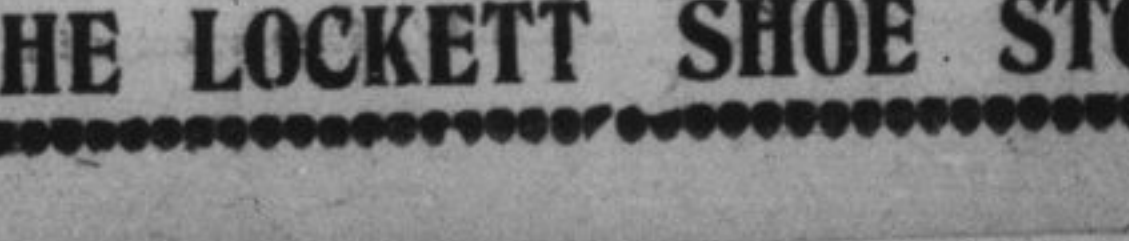
