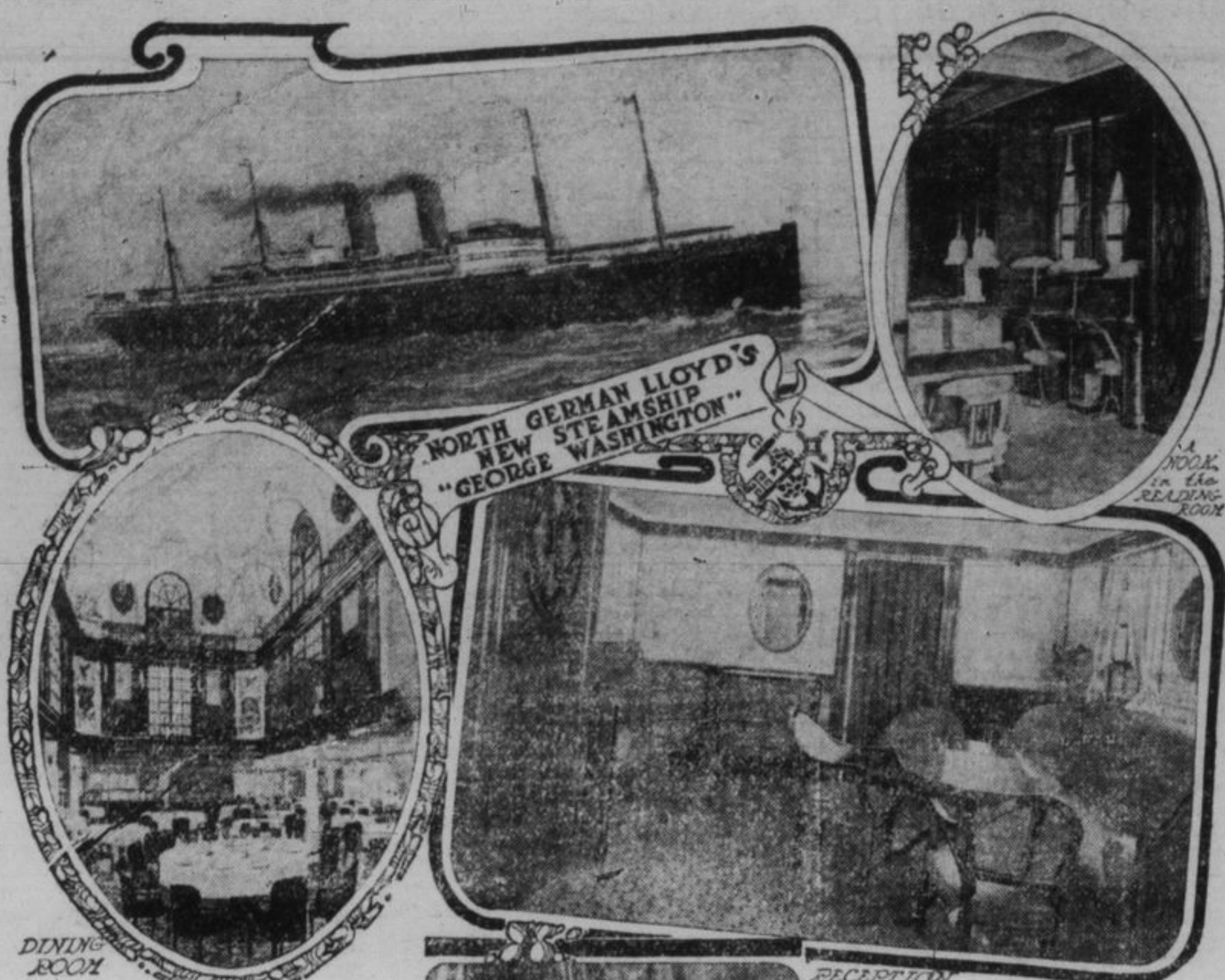

NAMED AFTER FIRST PRESIDENT.



New York, June 28.—The steamship George Washington, named in honor of the first president of the United States, and the largest German trans-Atlantic liner afloat, has arrived in New York.

The George Washington is the latest addition to the fleet of the North German Lloyd and extraordinary efforts have been made by the company to make the new steamship in every way worthy of its great name. In striving to carry out this plan one of the greatest decorative artists of Germany made a special trip to the United States for the sole purpose of studying Washingtoniana, that the magnificent pictures which adorn the great assembly rooms of the steamer might be authentic and in keeping with the name and fame of General Washington.

The American ambassador to Germany, Dr. David Jayne Hill, christened the George Washington and with his secretaries was on board at the successful trial trip a few days ago, when the George Washington made an average speed of twenty knots per hour over a measured course. At the time of the launching, President Roosevelt and H. M., the Emperor of Germany, felicitated the North German Lloyd—on the building of the great ship and each expressed the hope that the great ship would have a long and prosperous career in uniting two friendly peoples.

The daughters of the American Revolution of the New York State Chapter, headed by the honorary state

gent, Mrs. William Cumming Story, and the state vice-regent, Mrs. Samuel Lyman Munson, unveiled a bronze memorial tablet erected in honor of President Washington on the steamer.

The George Washington will remain in port until July 1st, when she starts on her maiden trip from New York for Plymouth, Cherbourg and Bremen.

The George Washington is the first great trans-Atlantic liner to be decorated in the new style of applied art. The architects of interior decoration and design were given the utmost freedom, and have produced the most exquisite results. In the interior of the George Washington it is admitted that German applied art has achieved its greatest triumph.

Some of the innovations of the George Washington are the elimination in the cabins of the first-class of upper berths, great number of rooms with baths, children's playroom, two electrically worked elevators for passengers, a great solarium or lounge, sumptuously fitted and furnished, and covered by a great vaulted dome of

cathedral glass; complete electrical equipment, extraordinarily wide berths, great two-storied smoking room for passengers of the first class, magnificently equipped gymnasium, electric light baths, hot and cold fresh and salt water at all times, running water in rooms, dark room for the use of amateur photographers, and on the boat deck are specially constructed dog kennels, in charge of a competent kennel master, where the pets of passengers may be placed during the trip and at the same time receive the best of care.

Some idea of the colossal proportions of this ocean giant may be had from the following dimensions of the vessel: Length, 722 feet 5 inches. Beam, 78 feet. Depth from upper saloon deck, 54 feet. Depth from awning deck, 80 feet. Speed, 18.5 knots. Displacement at 33 feet draught, 37,000 tons. Gross registered tons, 27,000. Horse power, 20,000. Cargo capacity, 13,000 tons.

GIRL BROUGHT RESCUE PARTY.

New York, June 28.—Although they were not aware of the fact, and probably will not be until they read the story of her acts, the pretty sun-browned thirteen-year-old daughter of Capt. Jackson, of the Quogue Life Saving Station on Long Island, played an important part in the rescue of the 462 passengers and the crew of 135 of the steamship Antonio Lopez, that went aground in the fog a mile west of the Point o' Woods Life Saving Station recently.

It was Ivy Jackson who received the first message that the ship was ashore and that the seas were breaking over her. She was the first, then, to transmit the news to New York and issue a call to the Merritt-Chapman Wrecking company for the sending of the wrecking tug Relief to go to her rescue and to send other boats to her aid. Miss Jackson was forty miles away from the wreck at the time but in the Quogue Life Saving Station is the telephone through which Capt. Baker and his life saving crew at Point o' Woods, reach the outside world. She was near the telephone on a lookout for passing ships and listening to fog horns when the bell tingled. That was after eight o'clock at night. "No, he is not on patrol," he heard the blowing of a fog horn down the

beach and has gone to investigate. This is Ivy. "Ivy, this is Capt. Baker. There's a big ocean liner ashore a mile to the west. We can't make her out. She's being pounded hard. She is high. Can't reach her in a lifeboat. Tried to shoot the lines, but can't get them over. She's in a bad way. Hunt the 'Cap' up and tell him to get New York on the wire with the news. We'll try to save the passengers."

"All right, 'Cap,'" said the girl as she rang off. "A mile away Ivy knew she could find her father. Minutes were valuable at that time. She would not hunt for him. She had heard him call New York when other ships were being pounded to pieces before her own eyes. So she called herself. She told them all Capt. Baker had told her. "It's all fog down here. We're forty miles away and we can't see more than a few rods to sea, so I guess Capt. Baker can't see her to find out who she is. There is a big sea on at our station and there must be a big one at Capt. Baker's. Send boats down right away," said Ivy to the man at the other end of the wire. In response to that news the Chapman-Merritt Wrecking company sent the Relief, which steamed to the wrecked vessel with all possible speed.
