The marriage service was read by Rev. H. G. Gowen, of the Episcopal church. Quite a large number of invited guests were present.

The bride wore her travelling gown of pastel blue serge, with trimmings of rich Maltese lace, the latter a present from her aunt in Dorset, England, and a large black plumed picture hat. She carried a shower bouquet of bridal roses and maiden-hair ferns, and was attended by her sister, Maude. Robert Grass acted as best man.

An informal reception was held immediately after the ceremony in the apartment home of the bride's brother, Edward S. Sears, and the young couple received the congratulations of their friends. 

MARRIED IN NEW YORK.

Hamilton, Ont., June 29.—The following letter, written in New York, yesterday, and signed by T. L. Kinrade, was received in a local newspaper office this morning:

"The marriage of Miss Florence Belle Kinrade, daughter of T. L. Kinrade, principal of Cannon street school, Hamilton, Ont., to Clare Montrose Wright, B.A., of Victoria university, Toronto, took place Monday, June 28th, 1909, in New York city.

The ceremony, which was very private, only the nearest relatives being present, was held in the Madison Avenue Methodist church and was performed by Rev. Wallace McMullen, D.D.

The bride, who was handsomely gowned in white, was given away by her father.

"Mr. and Mrs. Wright left the city on their honeymoon soon after. It is understood they may spend some time in England and European cities."

This marriage precludes all chance of Mr. Wright joining the Methodist ministry, local preachers say. According to the Methodist discipline a man studying to enter the ministry cannot marry until he has been ordained.

At Work In Cathedral.

All the scaffolding in St. Mary's cathedral was completed on Saturday and the decorators are now hard at work. The sanctuary carpets have been raised, and it is probable that hereafter they will not be used in the cathedral, as it is the intention to lay a hardwood floor and make other important improvements and alterations in and around the sanctuary.

Returned From Watertown.

The Salvation Army band returned Monday evening from Watertown, N.Y., after a two days' visit with the army corps there. Have Changed Their Minds.

Queen's University local trustees, to whom was assigned the duty of choosing sites on the university grounds for the two new buildings for the School of Mines, are undecided. Two weeks ago, they decided to adopt the positions on the Union street campus, as recommended by John Nolan, the landscape architect of Cambridge, Mass. Since then, they have been reconsidering their decision, and the matter is now held up. Until the trustees make final decision, plans and specifications for the buildings cannot be prepared. The new buildings are liable to be placed on another portion of the grounds.

WATERWORKS' COMMITTEE

Engages H. Holder As Concrete Shaded Overseer.

A meeting of the water works' committee was held on Monday afternoon, in attendance being Alds. Craig (chairman), Tovey, Clugston and Hoag.

The settlement of the lease to the Donnelly Wrecking company of the water works' wharf was left to the chairman, the superintendent and the city solicitor, with power to act.

Tenders were ordered to be asked for the labor of painting the water tank inside and outside. The department will supply the paint. The chairman and the superintendent were given power to have the work done.

H. Holder was engaged at four dollars a day to superintend the work of constructing the concrete roofless shed to be erected on the water works' wharf for coal. His assistant will be allowed \$2.25 a day. The engaging of additional labor was left to the superintendent.
