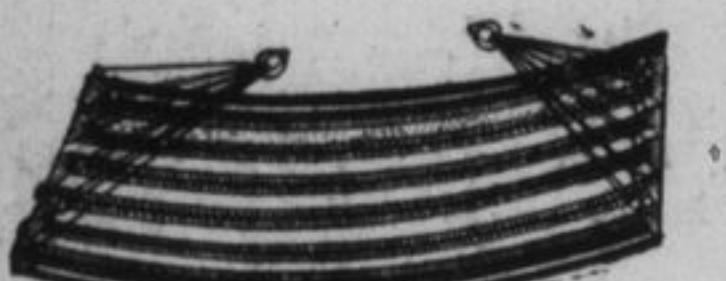

A SAD DROWNING

FREDERICK CATTERMOLE
SANK IN DEEP WATER.

Attended Picnic With Wife and Family at Wolfe Island—Body Was Recovered But Too Late to Save Life.
 Frederick Cattermole, aged thirty-three, employed as a gardener for Mrs. George Robertson, Sydenham street, lost his life in a drowning accident, about a quarter of a mile beyond Staley's grove, Wolfe Island, on the holiday. With his wife and family of three children, Cattermole left here to attend the picnic held by the Salvation Army. The accident occurred about six o'clock. Cattermole went in bathing with a couple of friends. The point selected was off an old wharf. The water at this place is very shallow for a few feet, when it reaches a depth of about sixteen feet. Cattermole could not swim, or if he could, but very little, and had a pair of water wings on. He got beyond his depth before he had realized it, and his companions were shocked to hear a splash and a cry. Help was called for, and Frank Pollitt undressed and went in after the body, as speedily as possible, but when the body was taken out life was extinct. His body had been in the water about four minutes. The first time under the water Mr. Pollitt brought up the water wings. Cattermole had used Adjutant Parsons, who, by the way, is an old sailor, worked over the body, but the result was fruitless, every spark of life having departed. Dr. Spankie was also called, and he, too, applied restoratives, but it was too late. A fact which added much more sorrow to the affair, was that deceased's wife was sitting on the bank nearby when the accident occurred, and was one to raise the alarm. Her grief can well be imagined.
 Dr. Spankie being acquainted with the facts of the case, said that an inquest would be unnecessary. The body was brought to the undertaking parlors of R. J. Reid, and later removed to his home on King street.
 Deceased was formerly a member of the Salvation Army band. He is survived by his wife and three children, the youngest being a month's old baby. He had been out from England three years. He was a member of the First Congregational church.

MET UNTIMELY DEATH.

Sad Mishap to William Marshall, at Watertown, N.Y.

Fuller particulars from Watertown, N.Y., tell of the untimely death there on the railway, of William Marshall, aged about thirty-five years, who was a son of Samuel Marshall, of Prince street. He was struck and instantly killed by an engine, in the Watertown yards, some time during Tuesday night. His body was found in a heap beside the tracks and it is supposed he was struck by a shifter, while walking the tracks.
 Deceased was well known in Kingston, but had been out of the city for some time. He was unmarried. The body was identified by Daniel O'Connell, a boyhood schoolmate of deceased. The first word of the accident was conveyed to the police and Constable Craig notified the relatives. Interment will probably take place in Watertown.

FUNERAL AT WATERTOWN.

The remains of the late William Marshall, of Kingston, who was killed in Watertown, N.Y., will be interred in that city. His father, Samuel Marshall, went over for the funeral. Deceased was for a time employed as a telegrapher by the Citizens' Telephone company, in Watertown. His father is totally blind and broken-hearted over the sad accident.

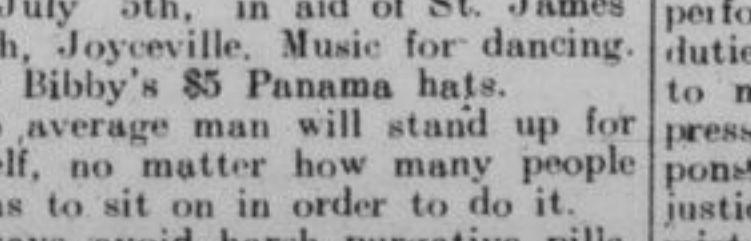

HIGH LAUNDRY TAX

WILL FORCE SOME CHINESE MEN OUT OF BUSINESS.

T. F. Harrison Asks the City Council to Reconsider Its By-Law.

Kingston, June 29.—(To the Editor): "Feeling is a general against the high tax on laundries."
 Under the above heading, on Monday, an article appeared in your paper giving some reasons actuating our council in imposing a \$50 tax on the laundries. It was a very fair presentation of the case. Fairly permit a reference to some of the statements made:
 First, that this question was before the finance committee and the council for six or seven weeks. If this is correct it is regrettable that such a unjust measure should result from so much deliberation, and at the same time it must be a matter of congratulation to the Chinamen that the consideration was not longer delayed, as if it started in with a proposed to tax them one or five dollars, and finally grew to this, evidently the longer it was discussed the worse it grew. However, the writer is of the impression that it was one of these measures that was pigeon-holed and pulled out at the last moment for hasty action. It is hard to believe that it was a deliberate action.
 It is stated that the aldermen express surprise that no opposition was made to the proposition in its earlier stages. The Chinamen cannot read our papers and evidently their friends were not aware that anything more serious than that first mentioned, a one or five dollar fee, would be imposed, but even admitting our laxity, is that any excuse for a failure to give the ordinary British fair play to every citizen, as the oath of office requires every alderman to do?
 Your article further reads: "Our reason for the high fee is that the Chinese laundries employ only Chinamen and can make more money than the whites." The fact that they are making money to any extent is disputed, and they tell me that five or six of their laundries will be forced out of business if this fee is insisted on, and crushed out by a club of injustice in the ultra British loving city.
 Further, I contend these men are rapidly being Canadianized, in living, dress, customs and in their buildings and to-day are paying more taxes than has ever done and patronizing our stores to a much greater extent than ever. Your article further states that they pay no wages. If this were correct then their shops are their homes and are not to be assessed as business places as they are to-day, paying both land and business taxes.
 On Monday, July 5th, the aldermen met and we are expecting that some members actuated by a sense of fairness will move the re-opening of the question, and then give it, not a too hasty consideration as before, but new it from a citizen's standpoint. There is no body of men on earth performing the onerous and ill-paid duties of a civic council but are apt to make an occasional error, when pressed by private and municipal responsibilities, but the obligation to do justice is never annulled by such a mistake and was never plainer than in the present premises.—T. F. HARRISON.
