Timely Object Lesson.

Nowhere about 1879 Sir John A. Macdonald, decided to build the Canadian Pacific railway from Montreal to Vancouver. That road cost Canada one hundred and fifty million dollars. He supposed that the amount of money in battleships and cruisers would have done more for the defence of the empire? Is not the C.P.R. to-day a greater asset in imperial defence than fifteen or twenty battleships and cruisers of the vintage of 1879-1880? The National Trans-continental and Grand Trunk Pacific which will cost Canada in pledged credit and cash nearly two hundred million dollars, are an equally important link in imperial defence? These two railways will enable Canada to defend itself more effectively if it will ever call itself more to do so. They will enable British troops to be moved across the North American continent if it is ever necessary that they should travel in that direction. They connect the British forces on the Atlantic coast with the British forces on the Pacific coast. They are truly imperial contributions.

Abdul Is Not Happy.

All deposed monarchs have had a sorry time making themselves comfortable in exile. Napoleon III after his downfall, could not be happy. Like Abdul Hamid finds the days a burden. A visiting correspondent, permitted to see him in his villa at Salonicia, reports that he is still nervous, and does not know what to do with his enforced leisure. He visits the harem, gives orders, goes over to the kitchen, watches the preparation of the food, returns to his rooms, lies down and sleeps on the sofa, walks a little, accompanied by his eldest son, and then returns to the house to pass some little time in his favorite occupation—that of wood-carving. He scarcely receives anybody, and he speaks little.

Gas At Thirty Cents.

Welland, Ont., July 2.—The by-law granting the Provincial Gas company a franchise for the town of Welland was carried to-day, by a majority of 291. Only nine votes were polled against. This ensures gas at thirty cents for the next five years, forty cents for the following ten years. The provincial company will now dispose of the surplus.

Seized Net And Skiff.

Belleville, July 2.—Captain Hunter, fish and game warden, with the patrol boat, Naranch, coming up the river, discovered a gill net, and seized it. It is nearly 1,500 yards in length. A skiff was also taken near the scene and brought to the city. Several prominent farmers along the Rideau will be charged with catching and selling bass during April.

Synopsis of Canadian North-West Land Regulations.

ANY person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon site of the land in each of the first three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Pre-emptive entry (including the duty) for six months in each of six years (irrespective of date of homestead entry) may be required to earn homestead patent and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$2.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$200.00.
