Synopsis of Canadian North-West Land Regulations.

ANY person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency, or by any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties.—Six months' residence upon the cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of the homestead, or occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price, \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in the year from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate the same.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.

HIS FIRST ADDRESS

"FOR WHAT INTENT YE HAVE SENT FOR ME."

His Mission is to Preach the Gospel, which Alone Can Transform Mankind and Reform Wrongs.

Rev. Samuel Sellery, M.A., B.D., was very apt in his remarks at the opening service of his ministry in Queen-street Methodist church on Sunday morning. He is a bright speaker, up-to-date in his thinking and practical in his presentation of truth. His address, brief and timely, was from Acts 1:22:

"Therefore came I unto you without guile, as soon as I was sent for: I ask therefore, for what intent ye have sent for me?"

After speaking of the church's cordial invitation, and the concurrence of conference he asked to believe that his selection was of divine appointment. That being so, his inquiry was that of Paul, "I ask for what intent ye have sent for me?" What is my mission and how best can I fulfil it? He took it that he was sent to help to save mankind; that is the mission of the Christian. And this was to be accomplished by preaching the gospel. It was the first step, the first step, the first step, that regenerated and sanctified man; that created holiness of heart and life. The gospel of Christ was the reforming power, and the salvation of man brought with it the redemption and improvement of the race.

If the church was really evangelistic in work and life, it would reform society, hence, while other themes might profitably be discussed, yet the great theme must be the fundamental and vital principles of Christianity. The soul of all reformation was the reformation of the soul. The practical character of the pulpit, to-day, it was never more real and enlivening. He said he might not be able to preach as his successors, people might not agree with all he said, but he only asked that he be given credit for honesty in all his convictions. He regarded his pulpit work as of first importance, but in it alone all his work could not be done. He enjoyed pastoral work, he sought to know his people, to get into close touch with them. His duty was to care for the sick and shut-ins. He asked his people to keep him in close sympathy with them. He could not know all who suffered, but he wanted to be told about them and he would lovingly and with joy seek to comfort and help them. He hoped for a happy and successful term here; in the past twenty-five years, his ministry had been full of joy; he prayed God that it might be so here. He did not ask for an easy time, the best often came through strenuousness. He prayed for power to do his best; for strength and health so that he might be equal to his task. He asked co-operation and sympathy; he asked that his people speak to him; bid him who they were, even a half dozen times, for it was really hard to call 400 or 500 people by their right names after one look.
