ARGUMENT OF LAWYER THAT DRUNKENNESS IS NOT AN OFFENCE

Against the Law—Gananoque Veterans to Parade to Church—S. Cool Prizes Awarded by M. & A. M. Machar.
 Gananoque, July 6.—In the police court, Monday afternoon, William Keyes was arraigned on a charge of drunkenness and disorderly conduct. Keyes was defended by J. C. Ross, who, among his objections gave that drunkenness was not an offence against either criminal or statutory law per se, and as the proof for disorderly conduct was unsatisfactory, requested a dismissal of the case. Judgment was reserved until Saturday next.

Mr. Dolan, of New York, who conducted the one held in the Grand Opera House, last year, is in charge of this and is at work gathering material for one of the largest events of the season.

THE SPORT REVIEW.

Interesting News From the Various Sporting Fields.
 Ottawa Journal: "Marty" Walsh has now broken into baseball, and will hold down third base for Kingston against the Hull nine to-morrow.

At Stratford, the famous pacer, The Eel, owned by Frank Entricken, of Tavistock, made a new half-mile track record for Canada, pacing a mile in 2:05 1/2, in the face of a high wind and in cool weather.
 Kerr, of Hamilton, who went to England to defend his British title, has not shown his last year's form since arriving in England some weeks ago. Kerr has frequently run both the 100 and 220 yards in better time than the winners made on Saturday.
 English referees say that J. B. Joel recently advised an offer of \$175,000 for the four-year-old Your Majesty, by Persimmon-Yours, which was the chief winner on the English turf last year, with a total of \$96,430. The offer is said to have been made by a French owner.

The police authorities at Vancouver threatened to arrest all the players of the New Westminster and Vancouver lacrosse teams on a charge of disturbing the peace if a deliberate foul occurred in the Dominion day match. Result: Not a man was injured throughout the game.
 Toronto World: With competitors all the way from Halifax to Vancouver, the Canadian athletic championships in Winnipeg, Thursday and Saturday, July 15th and 17th, promise to be the most representative ever held in this dominion, and there will be no stall-fed amateurs from across the line to mar the proceedings.
 The French 100 metres record, which has stood for fifteen years, was equalled, last week, at U.S.F.S.A. Paris championships, sports at Colombes. Failliot running the distance in 11 sec. Failliot also won the 400 metres hurdle and 400 metres flat, but in neither of these did he have to exert himself. Record was beaten in the 1,500 metres by Keyser, who defeated Vessel by three yards in 4 min. 6 1/5 sec., after a splendid race.
 Longboat's contract, which was held

by "Pat" Powers, of New York, has been sold by him, and is taken up by Sol Mintz, of Hamilton. Longboat himself now owns probably part of his contract. After the recent litigation he put up a thousand dollars in the hands of W. J. Little, of the Montreal Star, as a forfeit for his new contract with Mr. Powers. He says that he has been well used by the New York manager since the contract was entered into, but he wished to have the management transferred to Canada, and avowed his readiness to pay half the purchase price of buying it from Mr. Powers. Negotiations were accordingly entered into, and, last Saturday, Mr. Little received notice to hand over the thousand dollars deposit to Longboat. Hereafter Mr. Mintz will manage the Canadian champion.



Disappointed in Watertown.

 The defeat of Saturday came as a blow to yachtsmen of the Crescent Yacht Club, as it had been believed that the Crescent would be able to more than hold her own with her competitors this year, she having been overhauled and rigged with a new set of sails. The weather conditions were heavy weather and she had several times demonstrated her inability to beat the Kathleen in light winds. All the races at Kingston were sailed in light wind, and only in the first did the Crescent win. Kathleen's skipper apparently took a chance in that race, being four minutes behind at the end of the first round; all of which but twenty-six seconds he regained before the finish. It is possible that the Crescent will not again figure as a George contestant, as it has been freely stated this year that in case of defeat this season another challenger will be built before another year.

Finish Without Parallel.
 C. H. J. Snider, in the Toronto Telegram, says of Saturday's yacht race here:
 "Old yachtsmen declare the finish is without parallel, and it was the climax of the most exciting race ever sailed on Lake Ontario. It eclipsed both the sensational Beaver-Geposee finish of the Canada's cup in 1899, and the Strathcona-Iron-Squoit finish in the first race of 1903. The race might well have been called a dead heat, for the actual difference in time was really less than one second. Captain Leslie was perfectly right in calling Kathleen the winner, for, from where he stood, directly over the line, half of her bowsprit end came before Crescent's bowsprit end came in the line of vision."
