HAD BROKEN FENDER SCORED FOR LETTING IT LEAVE THE BARN.

Little Tot Was Killed—Only Handbrakes Were Used—Coroner Thought Motorman Was to Blame.

Winnipeg, July 8.—The coroner's jury investigating the death of little Alice Day, aged three, killed by a street car, on July 1st, found that the motorman did his best with the means at hand to stop the car, but scored the Winnipeg Electric Railway company for permitting the car to leave the barn with a defective and dilapidated fender, and also for the brief training and inexperience of the company's motorman.

The coroner disagreed with the exoneration of Motorman Lewis, and, indeed, charged heavily against him.

The evidence showed that the little tot was playing on the boulevard and ran in front of the car, which was an old-fashioned, single-track car, equipped only with hand-brakes, and which was also drawing a trailer. The motorman was horror-stricken, and reversed and threw the circuit-breaker without avail. The fender apparently rolled the child and passed over it, but several state witnesses testify that it would permit quite a large body to go through. The motorman testified that he protested against using the fender, but was told it was all right. The motorman had a fortnight's tuition from other motormen, but has been running cars since February.

MEXICAN MILLIONAIRE.

He is Condemned to Death for Murder.

El Paso, Tex., July 8.—The supreme court of the state of San Luis Potosi, Mexico, has confirmed the death sentence of Barrio Gonzalez, the millionaire who was convicted of the murder of his brother-in-law, Manuel Iturre, in addition to confirming the death penalty, the court has issued a decree requiring Gonzalez to pay to the widow of the man he murdered the sum of \$200,000. The prominence, popularity and wealth of Gonzalez was relied upon to secure for him a lighter sentence.

BOY'S PERILOUS TRIP.

Caught By Balloon Ropes and Carried to Sea.

Santa Cruz, Cal., July 8.—Jesse Wynne, a ten-year-old boy, was caught in the ropes of a balloon which was sent up here to celebrate the Fourth of July. The boy was carried 500 feet into the air and then out to sea. As the balloon drifted over the ocean, the boy was thrown out of it and fell into the water. The man in charge of the balloon, a Mr. [Name], was horrified and immediately started a launch from the naval training ship Albatross, which had followed them all the way.

HURT HIS FEELINGS.

Convict's Excuse For Killing Deputy Warden.

Edmonton, July 8.—G. Barrett, the convict who murdered Deputy Warden Stephens recently, and who is now under sentence of death for that crime, to hang on the 14th inst., is writing a long statement giving his excuse for the crime. He will charge the late warden with ill-treating him, with failure to recognize the Mason sign, and with sneering at him.

A STORE COLLAPSED

A SERIOUS DISASTER IN QUEBEC ESTABLISHMENT.

It Has Caused a Serious Loss—Four Floors Suddenly Fell In—Two Killed—Men Had Miraculous Escape.

Quebec, July 8.—An accident, which caused a considerable amount of loss, occurred yesterday afternoon, in the large wholesale dry goods establishment of the Garneau company, limited, on Dalhousie street. The building has been undergoing considerable alterations and repairs for some time, iron beams and pillars being put in to replace the wooden ones. About four o'clock, yesterday afternoon, when a large number of workmen were engaged in the establishment, four floors in the main building suddenly collapsed and fell into the basement. The noise of the falling floors caused considerable excitement among passersby. It was most miraculous that none of the men were carried down with the wreck, as the portions of the floors which fell measured about fifty feet each in length, by fifteen in breadth. The only injury any of the men received was several scratches. It is impossible to form anything like a correct idea of the loss.

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BLEW UP THE SAFE

BURGLARS GOT BUSY IN ZURICH VILLAGE.

They Used Nitro-Glycerine and Blew Out the Fronts of Various Establishments About the Block.

Zurich, Ont., July 8.—About one o'clock, this morning, burglars entered the office of Edmund Zeller, conveyancer, of this town, and succeeded in blowing up his large safe, the nitro-glycerine being used. The store front of the Herald printing and telephone office, also owned by Mr. Zeller, was blown to atoms, part of the safe being driven through the telephone cabinet. The cracksmen, however, got nothing for their work. The loss will be considerable. Mr. Zeller's fine gold watch and chain were not taken. A number of citizens were awakened by the report of the explosion but the burglars escaped.

PUNCHED A DEPUTY.

Riot Nearly Developed in the Chamber.

Rome, July 8.—The political parties have been waging a hot war for the last few days on the Mercantile Subsidies bill, which is causing uncommon agitation in the shipping industry. The temper of the deputies has often been at white heat, and it almost led to a riot yesterday. Signor Colajanni, republican, said the ministers responsible for the subsidies ought to be prosecuted, whereupon Signor Schanzar, minister of posts and telegraphs, rushed at Colajanni and punched him. Pandemonium broke out. The minister's friends pulled him from Colajanni, tearing his coat in doing so. Schanzar escaped, and made another rush at Colajanni, but was stopped.

The struggle was repeated four or five times, Schanzar all the time in a furious rage. The republicans taunted him, and the public in the galleries shouted rival epithets, according to their views. The president was unable to quell the uproar and suspend the session. The ministerialists flocked around Schanzar, and embraced and applauded him. The incident seemed to have caused a reaction in the government's favor.

FRONTENAC CHEESE BOARD.

Sales Made on the Board on Thursday.

At the meeting of the Frontenac cheese board, on Saturday, there was boarded 315 boxes of white cheese and 931 boxes of colored as follows: White—Cataragi, 15; Model, 60; Grath's, 60; Sand Hill, 50; Silver Springs, 95; Sunbury, 35; Wolf Island, 40; McGrath's, 60; Collins Bay, 60; Sand Hill, 50; Ontario, 48; Morning Star, 28; Latimer, 60; Batters, 60; Elm Grove, 45; Cataragi, 45; Arigan, 40; Gold Springs, 70; Excelsior, 30; Glenburnie, 60; Glenvale, 60; Gilt Edge, 60; Rose Hill, 60; total, 931.

The bidding opened at 11c, and sales were made as follows: At 11 1/2c, Mr. Murphy secured the colored cheese of these factories: Argan, Cataragi, Elm Grove, Gold Springs, Glenburnie, Latimer, Morning Star and Collins Bay, at 11 1/2c. Mr. Lancaster secured colored cheese of Batters, Excelsior, Glenvale, Gilt Edge, Hinchbrook, Rose Hill, Ontario, St. Lawrence, Wolfe Island and McMurphy, at 11c. Mr. Alexander secured white cheese of Silver Springs and at the same price Mr. Lancaster secured Sand Hill.

Before the sale of cheese Mr. Gibson referred to the last meeting of the board, and held that at that session he had been unfairly dealt with, as he had made a bid for Mr. Murphy's cheese, but the latter had given the preference. He wished to know what the feeling of the board was on the matter, as he had been told by other members of the board, who were present, that he had made his bid first.

President Valleau said that he was very sorry that there had been any trouble in the bids, but that he had offered the bids in the order they had been given to him by Secretary Pillar. Since the last meeting, however, Mr. Pillar had told him that he had made a mistake, and that Mr. Gibson's bid had been first. The mistake had been purely accidental, and had been made owing to the rush of bids.

Mr. Pillar stated that he had found, after the meeting, that he had made the mistake, but it had been done by mistake. If there was any blame, he alone was the one to be criticized, and not the president.

This explanation being given, the matter was allowed to drop.

There was also a very lengthy discussion as to whether the present rule of the board, that all cheese should be settled for at each meeting, should be adhered-to, or that it be paid for by cheque from Montreal, which is the custom of the Montreal firm represented by Mr. Gibson. Upon a vote being taken, it was decided that the present rule be sustained, and that all cheese must be settled for at the board.

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NEWS OF THE WORLD

OCCUPIED SERBIAN ISLAND.

Austrian Soldiers and Gendarmes Arrested.

London, July 8.—A Belgrade despatch to the Daily Mail says that 200 Austrian soldiers and fifty gendarmes, who were found occupying a Serbian island, in the river Drina, have been formally arrested. The Serbian government has protested to Vienna. Everybody is very much excited over the incident, and there is much discussion of the problem of what to do with the captives.
